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Current Notes

C. M. Lauds West Germany's Industrial progress

The Chief Minister, Shri V. P. Naik, lauded the progress made by Germany in the field of industrial production. He was speaking at a function organised at the Patkar Hall, on 3rd November 1972 in connection with Hanover Fair-Light and Heavy Engineering and Consumer Goods, to be held from 26 to May 4, 1973 and the Second International Machine Tools Exhibition to be held at Hanover, West Germany from September 16 to 27, 1973.

Shri Naik said that the developed countries should help and guide the developing nations in achieving industrial advancement and trade fairs was the best medium to achieve this goal. He said that West Germany's contribution to India's imports was 8 per cent and there was further scope for the two countries to come still closer.

Dr. Frank Wien, General Manager of the International Hanover Fair and Mr. M. Von Busse, General Commissioner of the International Machine Tool Exhibition 1973 (IHA 73) also spoke on the occasion.

Apollo Mills taken over—Shri N. M. Tidke's Announcement

Shri N. M. Tidke, Minister for Industries and Labour, announced on 2nd November 1972 that the Maharashtra State Textile Corporation has taken over the control of Apollo Mills, Bombay from the Court Receiver following an order to that effect by the Bombay High Court.

As regards Seksaria Mills, Shri Tidke said that immediate action was being taken to take over the mill under the new ordinance of Government of India.

Establishments observing power cut—Shops Act suspended

The Government of Maharashtra has suspended the operation of the provisions of section 18 of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948, in

of establishments to which the Maharashtra Electrical Energy (Regulation, Distribution, Supply, Consumption or Use) Order, 1972 applies, for the period during which this Order is in force, subject to the condition that the establishments concerned remain closed on one day in a week specified in Schedule I appended to the Order.

Study Tour in Family Planning Industry Representatives from Seven Asian Countries to Visit India

Representatives of management, trade unions, medical officers of industrial undertakings and government officials concerned with population questions, seven countries of Asia will assemble at New Delhi on Monday for a three weeks study tour of family planning programmes in Indian industries and plantations.

The study tour is sponsored by the International Labour Organisation under an inter-regional project for training, fellowships and study tours funded by the United Nations Fund for Population Activities.

The ILO, with the financial support of the UNFPA, has during the last few years undertaken considerable educational and motivational work for the promotion and establishment of family planning programme in the organised sector.

The present Study Tour, the first of a series of such tours, is intended to acquaint participants with some of the successful family planning programmes which have been in existence in different parts of India. Exchange of views with employer's and workers' organisations are also planned. It is hoped that with practical experience gained from the study tour, the participants will be able to make a fuller contribution to the success of their respective national programmes.

After a briefing session with officials of the Departments of Family Planning, the Team will visit Faridabad, Modinagar, Baroda, Bombay, Madras, Coonor and Jamshedpur. A recapitulation session will be held at Calcutta on the completion of the tour.

Eighteen participants from the following countries will make up the Team : Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Korea, Malaysia, Nepal and Thailand.

TRADE UNION EDUCATION IN INDIA

The trade Unions, with the passage of time, have undergone considerable change, both in their form and functions. Unfortunately, however, they are, in general, regarded as organisations detrimental to the interest of industrial development. The Management, in particular, considers them as obstacles in achieving their objectives. There are quite a few who do not hesitate in putting the entire onus of the present industrial disharmony on the trade Unions. One is of the view that trade Unions are only meant for instigating the workers to go on strikes and for doing such other destructive acts which may compel the Managements to accede to their unreasonable demands.

It is not that what the Management feels or thinks is entirely true ; but the fact remains that the Unions have failed to create a good impression about their legitimate functions on the minds of the Management in particular and the public in general.

Be that as it may, as things stand today, mere criticism of the trade Unions is not going to improve the situation because like the Management they are an inseparable part of the Industry. It is, therefore, ultimately in the interest of the Management and the Industry to understand these in a better way and to make the best possible use of their collective strength. This, however, does not in any way mean the formation of Company Unions, but, on the other hand, helping the Unions to develop and achieve a higher standard, so that they can understand their true role and represent both the workers and the Management, more effectively.

There still appears to be some misunderstanding about the true role of the trade Unions representatives. Some feel that they are only meant to represent the workers. This according to me, is not correct. They are meant not only to represent the workers but also the Managements. This is evident from the fact that once they are convinced about the Management's point of view, it is through them that the Management reaches the workers. This process of talking to the workers and interpreting the Management's thinking is nothing else than the representation of the Management.

Thus, we see that the scope of the trade Unions is very vast ; and it is ultimately the responsibility of the Management and the industry to see that they are developed for effective implementation of the Management's policies.

If we examine the structure of our trade Unions, we will find that at the higher level there are the elected Union executives who may either be from within or from outside the organisation. They are the policy makers of the Unions. At the lower level there are the shop floor representatives elected by the workers of individual units. Their field of activity is confined to the problems concerning their respective departments.

It is, however, the lower level i.e. the shop floor representatives who play a significant role being directly associated with the actual working of the industries. Much, therefore, depends on their skill and ability in understanding and implementing the accepted policies of the Management. Unfortunately, however, due to their poor educational background and limited sphere of knowledge, they on many occasions, fail to appreciate the point of view of the Management and turn down their proposals, though ultimately these may be in the interest of the workers alone. There have also been cases when, due to poor understanding, unnecessary confusion has been created in the minds of the workers. Thus, instead of working as a liaison between the workers and the Management, they become a wall between the two.

Thus we will find that it is the Management which has to ultimately pay the price for the ineffectiveness of their representatives. It is, therefore, necessary for them to accept these as their own responsibility and develop them through systematic training programmes.

The training of the representatives should be a continuous process and as far as possible, be a joint venture of the Management and the Union. The Management should try to associate the Union executives with this training programme so that they may have no doubt or apprehension about the scheme. This would also help to build up their confidence in the Management.

The plan of the course could be chalked out to include *inter alia* important information like history and development of the organisation, its role in the national development, true role of Union representatives in collective bargaining and negotiations, maintenance of discipline in the department, harmful effects of illegal strikes and absenteeism. There could also be some case study on discipline or strikes where the participants could frankly evaluate the merits and demerits. Over and above this the Management should include any other item which it may consider important.

The Management will undoubtedly experience some difficulty in organising these training programmes as there could be more than one Union which may not like to associate with a Management sponsored scheme. Once however, it is made the policy of the Management, the workers are bound to appreciate the spirit behind it.

It will not be out of place to mention that at this juncture, considering the importance of the training, the Government of Maharashtra has already set up a Regional Labour Institute, for imparting nine months training to the Union executives. Then, there is the "workers education scheme" which is making continuous efforts to raise the level of education.

If such schemes are also simultaneously initiated by the Management, I am confident that they will go a long way in ensuring better industrial relations and make our Unions more duty conscious.

Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946.

Industries and Labour Department, No. BIR. 1072/134318-LAB-I, 18th October, 1972.
In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (5) of section 2 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 (Bom. XI of 1947), the Government of Maharashtra hereby directs that the provisions of the said Act, shall with effect from 1st day of November, 1972, cease to apply to the following industries in the Vidarbha area of the State of Maharashtra, namely:—

2. Furniture Industry.
3. Picture Frames Industry.
4. Industry engaged in the manufacture of Soft Drinks such as Coca Cola, Soda water etc.
5. Oil Industry.

Factories Act, 1948

Industries and Labour Department, No. FAC.1962/150247/Lab-III-B, dated 7th October, 1972.
Whereas the Government of Maharashtra has issued Order, Industries and Labour Department, No. SAC-1072/Elec.-II, dated the 4th October, 1972, entitled the Maharashtra Electrical Energy (Regulation of Distribution, Supply, Consumption or Use) Order, 1972, sections 6-A and 6-B of the Bombay Electricity (Special Powers) Act, 1946 (Bom. XI of 1946) staggering the supply of electrical energy to factories specified in the Schedule to that Order,

and whereas, as a result of that Order, the factories specified in the Schedule to that Order are required to stagger their weekly holiday as specified in the said Schedule;

and whereas, the observance of the revised weekly holiday by the factories whose staggered holiday is fixed on Thursday, Friday and Saturday attracts the provisions of section 52 of the Factories Act, 1948 (LXIII of 1948), in respect of Sunday the 8th October, 1972

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Factories Act, 1948 the Government of Maharashtra hereby exempts all factories mentioned in the schedule annexed to the Maharashtra Electrical Energy (Regulation of Distribution, Supply, Consumption or Use) Order, 1972, in the groups for which staggering holiday is fixed on Thursday, Friday and Saturday from the provisions of section 52 of the Factories Act, 1948, in respect of Sunday the 8th October, 1972.

Industrial Disputes Act, 1947

Industries and Labour Department No. IDA. 1468-Lab. II, 21st October 1972.
Whereas the Government of Maharashtra is satisfied that public interest requires the extension of the period specified in Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department, No. IDA. 1468/Lab. II, dated the 2nd May 1972, declaring employment of workmen in Sholapur Municipal Transport Undertaking, Sholapur, to be public utility service;

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by the proviso to sub-clause (vi) of clause (n) of section 2 of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 (XIV of 1947), the Government of Maharashtra hereby declares the said employment to be a public utility service for the purposes of the said Act for a further period of six months from 2nd November 1972.

Minimum Wages Act, 1948

Industries and Labour Department No. MWA. 5672/152072/Lab-III-A, 20th October 1972.
In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 26 of the Minimum Wages Act 1948 (XI of 1948), in its application to the State of Maharashtra, the Government of Maharashtra hereby directs that for a period of three years commencing on the date of publication of this Notification in the Official Gazette, the provisions of this Act shall not apply to the employees employed in handmade paper and handmade paper board manufactories in the State of Maharashtra.

Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1946

Industries and Labour Department No. IEA.-1068/113145-Lab. I, 24th October 1972.
In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) and clause (a) of sub-section (2) of section 15 of the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1946, (XX of 1946), in its application to the State of Maharashtra, the Government of Maharashtra, having consulted the representatives for employers and workmen as required under proviso to sub-section (2) of section 15 of the said Act, made the following Rules to amend the Bombay Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Rules, 1959, the same having been previously published as required by sub-section (1) of section 15 of the said Act:

Rules

1. These rules may be called the Bombay Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) (Amendment) Rules, 1972.

2. In the Bombay Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Rules, 1959 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal rules"), in rule 15,—

(a) for the words and figures, "after items 1 and 7, respectively," the words, figures and letter "after items 1, 7 and 10A, respectively" shall be substituted; and

(b) after the existing (item) 7A, the following new item shall be inserted, namely:

"10B-Medical Examination (including provision for bearing expenses therefor).

3. In schedule I appended to the principal rules,—

(1) In the Model Standing Orders, under the heading "A. For workmen doing clerical or technical work", after model standing order 27, the following new model standing order shall be inserted, namely:—

"27A. Where an employer orders a medical examination of a workman or a person desiring to be recruited as his workman under any law, contract, custom or usage applicable to his industrial establishment or under any award, agreement or settlement binding on the employer and the workman in his industrial establishment, such examination in the case of a female shall be made only by a lady doctor; and the expenses of such examination shall be born by the employer."

(2) In the Model Standing Orders under the heading "B. For workman employed on clerical or supervisory work", after model standing order 25, the following new model standing order shall be inserted, namely:—

"25A. Where an employer orders a medical examination of a workman or a person desiring to be recruited as his workman under any law, contract, custom or usage applicable to his industrial establishment or under any award, agreement or settlement binding on the employer and the workman in his industrial establishment, such examination in the case of a female shall be made only by a lady doctor and the expenses of such examination shall be borne by the employer", and

(3) In the Model Standing orders under the heading "C. For Working Journalists" after model standing order shall be inserted, namely:—

"15A. Where an employer orders a medical examination of a workman or a person desiring to be recruited as his workman under any law, contract, custom or usage applicable to his industrial establishment or under any award, agreement or settlement binding on the employer and the workman in his industrial establishment, such examination in the case of a female shall be made only by a lady doctor, and the expenses of such examination shall be borne by the employer".

Labour Legislation

PAYMENT OF GRATUITY (MAHARASHTRA) RULES 1972

Industries and Labour Department No. PGA. 1072-LAB-IV, 13th October 1972.
of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) of section 15 of the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972, the Government of Maharashtra hereby makes the following rules, namely:

1. *Short title and commencement.*—(1) These rules may be called the Payment of Gratuity (Maharashtra) Rules, 1972.

(2) These rules shall come into force from the 13th day of October 1972.

2. *Definitions.*—In these rules, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context—

(a) "Act" means the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972;

(b) "Appellate authority" means the Government of Maharashtra or the authority specified by the Government of Maharashtra under sub-section (7) of section 7;

(c) "Form" means a form appended to these rules;

(d) "Nomination" means nomination made under section 6;

(e) "Section" means a section of the Act;

3. *Notice of opening, change or closure of the establishment.*—(1) Within thirty days of the rules becoming applicable to an establishment, a notice in Form 'A' shall be submitted by the employer to the controlling authority of the area.

(2) A notice in Form 'B' shall be submitted by the employer to controlling authority of the area within thirty days of any change in the name, address, employer or nature of business.

(3) Where an employer intends to close down the business, he shall submit a notice in Form 'C' to the controlling authority of the area at least sixty days before the intended closure.

4. *Display of notice.*—(1) The employer shall display conspicuously a notice at or near the main entrance of the establishment in bold letters in English and in a language understood by the majority of the employees specifying the name of the officer with designation authorised by the employer to receive on his behalf notices under the Act of the rules.

(2) A fresh notice shall be displayed immediately after the notice referred to in sub-section (1) becomes illegible or requires a change.

5. *Form of notice under proviso to section 2(h)(u).*—(1) A notice under the proviso to sub-clause (u) of clause (h) of section 2 shall be in Form 'D' and sent in triplicate by the employee to the employer, who shall, after recording its receipts on one copy thereof, return the copy to the employee and send the second copy to the controlling authority of the area.

(2) An employee may withdraw the notice referred to in sub-rule (1) by giving another notice in triplicate in Form 'E' to the employer, who shall follow the same procedure as in sub-rule (1).

6. *Nominations.*—(1) A nomination shall be in Form 'F' and submitted in duplicate by personal service by the employee, after taking proper receipt or by sending through registered post acknowledgement due to the employer.

(i) in the case of an employee who is already in employment for a year or more on the date of commencement of these rules, ordinarily, within ninety days from such date, and

(ii) in the case of an employee who completes one year of service after the date of commencement of these rules, ordinarily, within thirty days of the completion of one year of service;

that nomination in Form 'F' shall be accepted by the employer after the specified period with reasonable grounds for delay, and no nomination so accepted shall be valid merely because it was filed after the specified period.

(2) Within thirty days of the receipt of a nomination in Form 'F' under sub-rule (1), the employer shall get the service particulars of the employee, as mentioned in the form of nomination, with reference to the records of the establishment and return to the employee, obtaining a receipt thereof, the duplicate copy of the nomination in Form 'F' duly attested either by the employer or an officer authorised in this behalf by him, as a token of recording the nomination by the employer and the other copy of the nomination shall be recorded.

An employee who has no family at the time of making a nomination shall, within ninety days of acquiring a family submit in the manner specified in sub-rule (1) a fresh nomination required under sub-section (4) of section 6, in duplicate in Form 'G' to the employer, and the provisions of sub-rule (2) shall apply *mutatis mutandis* as if it was made under sub-rule (1).

A notice of modification of a nomination, including cases where a nominee predeceases the employee, shall be submitted in duplicate in Form 'H' to the employer in the manner specified in sub-rule (1) and thereafter the provisions of sub-rule (2) shall apply *mutatis mutandis* as if it was made under sub-rule (1).

A nomination or a fresh nomination or a notice of modification of nomination shall be signed by employee or, if illiterate, shall bear his thumb impression, in the presence of two witnesses, who shall also sign a declaration to that effect in the nomination, fresh nomination or notice of modification of nomination, as the case may be.

A nomination, fresh nomination or notice of modification of nomination shall take effect from the date of receipt thereof by the employer.

7. *Application for gratuity.*—(1) An employee who is eligible for payment of gratuity under the Act, or any person authorised, in writing, to act on his behalf, shall apply, ordinarily within thirty days from the date the gratuity became payable, in Form 'I' to the employer:

Provided that where the date of superannuation or retirement of an employee is known, the application shall apply to the employer before thirty days of the date of superannuation or retirement.

(2) A nominee of an employee who is eligible for payment of gratuity under the second proviso to sub-section (1) of section 4 shall apply, ordinarily within thirty days from the date the gratuity became payable to him, in Form 'J' to the employer:

Provided that an application in plain paper with relevant particulars shall also be accepted, if the employer may obtain such other particulars as may be deemed necessary by him.

A legal heir of an employee who is eligible for payment of gratuity under the second proviso to sub-section (1) of section 4 shall apply, ordinarily within one year from the date the gratuity became payable to him, in Form 'K' to the employer.

(4) Where gratuity becomes payable under the Act before the commencement of these rules, the periods of limitation specified in sub-rules (1), (2) and (3) shall be deemed to be operative from the date of such commencement.

(5) An application for payment of gratuity filed after the expiry of the periods specified in this rule shall also be entertained by the employer, if the applicant adduces sufficient cause for the delay in preferring his claim, and no claim for gratuity under the Act shall be invalid merely because the claimant failed to present his application within the specified period. Any dispute in this regard shall be referred to the controlling authority for his decision.

(6) An application under this rule shall be presented to the employer either by personal service or by registered post acknowledgement due.

8. *Notice for payment of gratuity.*—(1) Within fifteen days of the receipt of an application under rule 7 for payment of gratuity, the employer shall—

(i) if the claim is found admissible on verification, issue a notice in Form 'L' to the applicant employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be, specifying the amount of gratuity payable and fixing a date, not being later than the thirtieth day after the date of receipt of the application, for payment thereof, or

(ii) if the claim for gratuity is not found admissible, issue a notice in Form 'M' to the applicant employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be, specifying the reasons why the claim for gratuity is not considered admissible.

In either case a copy of the notice shall be endorsed to the controlling authority.

(2) In case payment of gratuity is due to be made in the employer's office, the date fixed for the purpose in the notice in Form 'L' under clause (i) of sub-rule (1) shall be re-fixed by the employer, if a written application in this behalf is made by the payee explaining why it is not possible for him to be present, in person on the date specified.

(3) If the claimant for gratuity is a nominee or a legal heir, the employer may ask for such witness or evidence as may be deemed relevant for establishing his identity or maintainability of his claim as the case may be. In that case the time limit specified for issue of notices under sub-rule (1) shall be operative with effect from the date such witness of evidence as the case may be called for by the employer is furnished to the employer.

(4) A notice in Form 'L' or Form 'M' shall be served on the applicant either by personal service after taking receipt or by registered post with acknowledgement due.

(5) A notice under sub-section (2) of section 7 shall be in Form 'L'.

9. *Mode of payment of gratuity.*—The gratuity payable under the Act shall be paid in cash or, if so desired by the payee, in Demand Draft or bank cheque to the eligible employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be:

Provided that in case the eligible employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be, so desires and the amount of gratuity payable is less than one thousand rupees, payment may be made by postal money order after deducting the postal money order commission therefrom from the amount payable:

Provided further that intimation about the details of payment shall also be given by the employer to the controlling authority of the area.

10. *Application to controlling authority for direction.*—(1) If an employer—

(i) refuses to accept a nomination or to entertain an application sought to be filed under rule 7, or,

(ii) issues a notice under sub-rule (1) of rule 8 either specifying an amount of gratuity which is considered by the applicant less than what is payable or rejecting eligibility to payment of gratuity, or

(iii) having received an application under rule 7 fails to issue any notice as required under rule 8 within the time specified therein,

the claimant employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be, may, within ninety days of the occurrence of the cause for the application, apply in Form 'N' to the controlling authority for issuing a direction under sub-section (4) of section 7 with as many extra copies as are the opposite party:

(2) Application under sub-rule (1) and other documents relevant to such an application shall be presented in person to the controlling authority or shall be sent by registered post acknowledgement due.

11. *Procedure for dealing with application for direction.*—(1) On receipt of an application under rule 10 the controlling authority shall, by issuing a notice in Form 'O' call upon the applicant as well as the employer to appear before him on a specified date, time and place, either by himself or through his authorised representative together with all relevant documents and witnesses, if any.

(2) Any person desiring to act on behalf of an employer or employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be, shall present to the controlling authority a letter of authority from the employer or the person concerned, as the case may be, on whose behalf he seeks to act together with a written statement explaining his interest in the matter and praying for permission so to act. The controlling authority shall record thereon an order either according to his approval or specifying, in the case of refusal to grant the permission prayed for, the reasons for the refusal.

(3) A party appearing by an authorised representative shall be bound by the acts of the representative.

(4) After completion of hearing on the date fixed under sub-rule (1), or after such further evidence, examination of documents, witnesses, hearing and enquiry, as may be deemed necessary, the controlling authority shall record his finding as to whether any amount is payable to the applicant under the Act. A copy of the finding shall be given to each of the parties.

(5) If the employer concerned fails to appear on the specified date of hearing after due service of notice without sufficient cause, the controlling authority may proceed to hear and determine the application *ex-parte*. If the applicant fails to appear on the specified date of hearing without sufficient cause, the controlling authority may dismiss the application:

Provided that an order under this sub-rule may, on good cause being shown within thirty days of the said order, be reviewed and the application re-heard after giving not less than fourteen days' notice; to the opposite party of the date fixed for re-hearing of the application.

12. *Place and time of hearing.*—The sittings of the controlling authority shall be held at such times and at such places as he may fix and he shall inform the parties of the same in such manner as he thinks fit.

13. *Administration of oath.*—The controlling authority may authorise a clerk of his office to administer oaths for the purpose of making affidavits.

14. *Summoning and attendance of witnesses.*—The controlling authority may, at any stage of the proceedings before him, either upon or without an application by any of the parties involved in the proceedings before him, and on such terms as may appear to the controlling authority just, issue summons to any person in Form 'P' either to give evidence or to produce documents or for both purposes on a specified date, time and place.

15. *Service of summons or notice.*—(1) Subject to the provisions of sub-rule (2) any notice, summons, process or order issued by the controlling authority may be served either personally or by registered post acknowledgement due or in any other manner as prescribed under the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (Act 5 of 1908).

(2) Where there are numerous persons as parties to any proceeding before the controlling authority and such persons are members of any trade union or association or are represented by an authorised person, the service of notice on the Secretary, or where there is no Secretary,

16. *Maintenance of records of cases by the controlling authority.*—(1) The controlling authority shall record the particulars of each case under section 7, in Form 'Q' and at the time of passing orders shall sign and date the particulars so recorded.

(2) The controlling authority shall, while passing orders in each case, also record the findings on the merits of the case and file it together with the memoranda of evidence with the order sheet.

(3) Any record, other than a record of any order or direction, which is required by these rules to be signed by the controlling authority, may be signed on behalf of and under the direction of the controlling authority by any subordinate officer appointed in writing for this purpose by the controlling authority.

17. *Direction for payment of gratuity.*—If finding is recorded under sub-rule (4) of rule 11 that the applicant is entitled to payment of gratuity under the Act, the controlling authority shall issue a notice to the employer concerned in Form 'R' specifying the amount payable and directing payment thereof to the applicant under intimation to the controlling authority within thirty days from the date of receipt of the notice by the employer. A copy of the notice shall be endorsed to the applicant employee, nominee or legal heir, as the case may be.

18. *Appeal.*—(1) The Memorandum of appeal under sub-section (7) of section 7 of the Act, shall be submitted to the appellate authority with a copy thereof to the opposite party and the controlling authority either through delivery in person or under registered post acknowledgement due.

(2) The Memorandum of appeal contain the facts of the case, the decision of the controlling authority, the grounds of appeal and the relief sought.

(3) There shall be appended to the Memorandum of appeal a certified copy of the finding of the controlling authority and direction for payment of gratuity.

(4) On receipt of the copy of Memorandum of appeal, the controlling authority shall forward records of the case to the appellate authority.

(5) Within 14 days of the receipt of the copy of the Memorandum of appeal, the opposite party shall submit his comments on each paragraph of Memorandum with additional please, if any, to the appellate authority with a copy to the appellant.

(6) The appellate authority shall record its decision after giving the parties to the appeal a reasonable opportunity of being heard. A copy of the decision shall be given to the parties to the appeal and a copy thereof shall be sent to controlling authority returning his records of the case.

(7) The controlling authority shall, on receipt of the decision of the appellate authority, make necessary entry in the records of the case maintained in Form 'Q' under sub-rule (1) of rule 16.

(8) On receipt of the decision of the appellate authority, the controlling authority shall, if required under that decision, modify his direction for payment of gratuity and issue a notice to the employer concerned in Form 'S' specifying the modified amount payable and directing payment thereof to the applicant, under intimation to the controlling authority within fifteen days of the receipt of the notice by the employer. A copy of the notice shall be endorsed to the applicant employee, nominee or legal heir as the case may be and to the appellate authority.

19. *Application for recovery of gratuity.*—Where an employer fails to pay the gratuity due under the Act in accordance with notice by the controlling authority under rule 17 or rule 18, as the case may be, the employee concerned, his nominee or legal heir, as the case may be to whom the gratuity is payable may apply to the controlling authority in duplicate in Form 'T' for recovery thereof under section 8 of the Act.

20. *Display of abstract of the Act and rules.*—The employer shall display an abstract of the Act and the rules made thereunder in English and in the language understood by the majority of the employees at a conspicuous place at or near the main entrance of the establishment.

In October 1972, the Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base : January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 203 being remained stationary than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the 1958-59, family living survey at the Bombay Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 1 point to 221 due to a rise in the average prices of arhar dal, gram dal, moong dal, groundnut oil, vanaspati (loose), milk, curd, pure ghee, turmeric, chillies (dry), chillies (green), onion, coconut, zeera, sugar, jalebi, tea (readymade) and a rise in the sub-group of vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco e.c. group decreased by 1 point to 203 due to a fall in the average prices of supari and chewing tobacco.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 5 points to 207 due to a rise in the electricity charges.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group decreased by 1 point to 195 due to a fall in the average price of dhoti, saree, long cloth, mu'mul, markin, and vest.

The index number for the miscellaneous group and housing remained stationary at 173 and 117 respectively.

In October 1972, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Sholapur Centre with Base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 218 being 4 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Sholapur City.

The index number for the food group increased by 6 points to 239 due mainly to a rise in the average prices of jowar, arhar dal, gram dal, masurdal, groundnut oil, vanaspati, ghee, salt, turmeric, chillies green chillies dry, tamarind, onions, sugar and gur and a rise in the sub group index number for Vegetables and Fruits.

In October 1972, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the Aurangabad Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 228 being 3 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family survey at the Aurangabad Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 5 points to 258 due to an increase in the average prices of rice, jowar, gramdal, moongdal, masurdal, karad oil, vanaspati (dalda), turmeric, chillies (dry), tamarind, onions, brinjals, sugarand gur.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 1 point to 196 due to an increase in the prices of saree and coloured fabric.

The index numbers for the fuel and light and the miscellaneous groups and housing remained stationary at 168, 176 and 189 respectively.

194—A rise of one point

In October, 1972, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Poona City with base calendar year 1961 equal to 100 was 194 being 1 point higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the consumption of a pattern revealed during the year 1958-59 family living survey for Poona City.

The index number for the food group increased by 3 points to 215 due to a rise in the average prices of turdal, gramdal, moongdal, groundnut oil, vana pati, bombil, eggs, dry chillies, turmeric, tamarind, onions, brinjals, ladyfinger, other vegetables, banana, sugar and gur.

The index number for fuel and light group increased by 1 point to 191 due to a rise in the average price of charcoal.

The index number for the housing group remained stationary at 117.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group decreased by 3 points to 183 due to a fall in the prices of sarree and coloured poplin.

The index number for miscellaneous group has remained stationary at 169. Final Index Number :—194.

Fifteen of the total disputes in progress during August 1972 were in the Textile industry 26 in the Engineering Industry and the remaining 50 were in other industries. 68 of the total disputes involving 1,33,370 workers were actually recorded during the month while 23 disputes involving 4,794 workers were carried over from the previous month.

*The word "disputes" in the official sense means interruption of work and it is hereby used in that sense as virtually synonymous with "strike". In compiling statistics of the industrial disputes, however, disputes in which 10 or more persons are involved are included.

Thirty-four of the disputes arose over questions of "pay allowances and issues" 40 related to "retrenchment and grievances about personnel" 16 over hours of works and the remaining 16 were due to other

Out of the 91 disputes that terminated during the course of the month were settled either entirely or partially in favour of the workers 36 in favour of the employers, while the result of the remaining 5 disputes was definite.

PROGRESS OF IMPORTANT INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES IN MAHARASHTRA STATE DURING THE MONTH OF AUGUST, 1972

Bombay

(1) *Shakti Insulated Wires Private Limited, Bombay.*—The lockout in Shakti Insulated Wires Private Limited, Bombay, which commenced from May 10th, affecting 500 workers on account of large-scale indiscipline in the factory continued without any material change throughout the month.

(2) *Jayant Paper Box Manufacturing Company Limited, Bombay.*—Out of the total complement of 162 workers employed in the Jayant Paper Box Manufacturing Company Limited, Bombay, 155 workers resorted to strike from 1st, 1972 protesting against the show-cause notices issued to some workers. The strike was in-progress till the end of the month of August, 1972.

(3) *Bombay Metal and Alloys Manufacturing Company Limited, and its sister concerns, Bombay and Thana.*—The strike in the Bombay Metal and Alloys Manufacturing Company Limited, and its sister concern, Bombay and Thana, which commenced on June 10th, 1972, affecting 609 workers over their demands for higher D.A. and bonus. The strike continued till the end of the month.

(4) *Wadilal Embroidery Unit, Bombay.*—The strike of 235 workers employed in the Wadilal Embroidery, Bombay, which commenced from April 30th, 1972, protesting against the retrenchment of workers ended on August 1st, 1972, through the intervention of Labour Commissioner's Office, Bombay. Due to this strike 17,866 man-days were lost.

(5) *Metropolitan springs Private Limited, Bombay.*—The total complement of 1,000 workers of the Metropolitan springs Private Limited, Bombay went on strike from April 8th, 1972, demanding change of work to the workers. The strike continued till the end of the month.

Thana

(6) *Wellman (India) Private Limited, Thana.*—The strike of 345 workers employed in the Wellman (India) Private Limited, Thana, which commenced from May 30th, 1972, protesting against show-cause notices issued to some workers. The strike continued till the end of the month.

Poona

(7) *Matchwel Electricals (India) Limited, Poona.*—The total complement of 1,000 workers employed in Matchwel Electricals (India) Limited, Poona, resorted to the strike from July 4th, 1972, demanding reinstatement of discharged workers ended on August 17th, 1972 through the intervention of the Commissioner of Labour's Office, Bombay. Due to this strike 33,587 man-days were lost.

ABSENTEEISM STATISTICS FOR THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER 1972 (COTTON TEXTILE)

The Textile Industry

The statistics of absenteeism in the Textile Industry in the State Maharashtra are compiled from the mills at seven important Textile Centres in State viz., Bombay city, Sholapur, Nagpur, Jalgaon, Akola, Aurangabad and Nanded.

Returns were received from 66 Mills i.e. 43.54 per cent of the 79 Mills during September 1972. The average absenteeism in the Textile Industry in these centres amounted to 15.41 per cent. as against 14.28 per cent in the previous month.

The following table shows the average percentage of absenteeism at the seven centres for the month of September 1972, on the basis of information on all working shifts :

At the beginning of October 1972, there were 49 mills in Bombay City working on night shift and the members of men doing night work was 82,195.

LABOUR TURNOVER IN COTTON TEXTILE UNDERTAKINGS FOR SEPTEMBER 1972

In all 69 Cotton Textile undertakings in Maharashtra State employing 243965 workers on an average recorded an average percentage of Labour Turnover of 20.5 for the month of September 1972. The increase in employment of 20.5 per cent (accession) was reported to be 0.93 per cent. Whereas the extent of decrease in employment (separation) registered in the total labour employed in all undertaking was 1.12.

Considering the labour turnover according to centres, it may be observed that the highest rate of labour turnover viz. 6.66 per cent was recorded in Aurangabad Centres, whereas Nagpur area registered the smallest rate of 0.60 per cent.
