EMPLOYMENT SITUATION IN GENERAL IN MAHARASHTRA STATE FOR THE MONTH OF AUGUST 1973.

The position in respect of placements recorded by employment exchange in August, 1973 as compared to the previous month was static. Vacan notified to Employment exchanges during the month under review, howedeclined considerably as compared with the last month.

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

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The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class

The Bombay and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of September 1973 (base year 1960=100) were 228, 261 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Poona and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of September 1973 (base year 1961=100) were 288, 311, 249 and 294 respectively.

Industrial Disputes

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During July 1973, there were 76 strikes involving 25,805 workmen and a time loss of 1,89,905 working days, as compared to 99 disputes in June 1973 involving 30,346 workers and time loss of 2,25,428 mandays. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages 358 to 359 and 382 to 390 of this issue.

Absenteeism

During August 1973, the average absenteeism in the textile industry in seven textile centres in the State viz. Bombay City, Nagpur, Sholapur, Jalgaon, Nanded, Akola and Aurangabad amounted to 15.69 per cent as against 18.66 per cent in July 1973. For further particulars see page 361 of the issue.

Production of Cotton Yarn Spun and Manufacture of cloth

During May 1973, Mills in Bombay City produced a total of 1,55,72,000 Kgs. of yarn, 2,94,000 Kgs. of Miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery goods and knitted fabrics and packed 39,75,000 metres of cotton mixed with silk, wool, terene, etc. and packed 9,98,77,000 metres wearable and non-wearable cloth and those in rest of Maharashtra produced 53,66,000 Kgs. of yarn 93,000 Kgs. of miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery and knitted fabrics and packed 2,60,62,000 metres of wearable and non-wearable cloth. The total production of cotton yarn, miscellaneous goods and mixed with silk, wool, terene, etc. packing of wearable and non-wearable cloth for the whole State of Maharashtra amounted to 2,09,38,000 Kgs., 3,37,000 Kgs. 41,70,000 metres and ,12,59,39,000 metres respectively.

Current Notes

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National Arbitration Promotion Board Reconstituted

The Government of India have revised the composition of the National Arbitration Promotion Board. This has been done by the Department of Labour, as a number of changes have taken place in the membership of the Board, during the last few months.

The All India Trade Union Congress which has been boycotting the Board, has since nominated its representative to serve on the Board. This has necessitated the addition of another representative of employers, in order to maintain a parity with the workers on the Board. Accordingly, the All India Organisation of Employers, have also nominated a second representative to serve on the Board. Keeping in view the policy of rotation of State Governments, the representatives of the states of Rajasthan and Haryana have been replaced by the representatives of State of West Bengal and the Union Territory of Delhi.

The INTUC is represented on the Board by Shri R. Rengasamy and Shri H. N. Trivedi.

Shri N. P. Dube, Additional Secretary, Ministry of Labour and Rehabilitation will act as chairman. Besides chairman, the Board will have members from employing ministries and public sector, undertakings, State Governments, employers and workers.

New Pattern of P. F. Investment

The Government of India has decided to invest 25 percent of the net accumulations out of provident fund contributions in the State Government securities and State or Central Government guaranteed securities and 75 percent in post office time deposits and small savings for a period from October 1, 1973 to March 31, 1974. This applies to exempted and unexempted establishments under the Employees' Provident Fund Act.

The new pattern of investment has been laid down to enable the Employees' Provident Fund to earn higher rate of interest on its investment for distribution among its subscribers.

About Rs. 1,750 57 crores have been invested in securities by the end of March 1973. The Employees' Provident Funds Act covered 56,939 establishments and 66,92,887 employees during the same period.

Wage Rates For Forestry Works

The Government of Maharashtra has sanctioned non-statutory minimum rates of daily wages for the labourers engaged on forestry works for the year 1973-74, commencing from July 1, 1973.

The daily wage rates per head for 8 hours working for heavy unskilled light un-skilled and for a boy or a girl, respectively, are—Thana Rs. 3.50, Rs. 2.75, Rs. 2.25; Nasik—Rs. 3.20, Rs. 2.40, Rs. 2; Poona—Rs. 3.50,

Rs. 2·75, Rs. 2: Aurangabad -Rs. 3·25, Rs. 2·25, Rs. 1·85; Chandrapur—Rs. 3·20, Rs. 2·50, Rs. 2; Nagpur—(excluding Nagpur city) Rs. 3·25, Rs. 2·25, Rs. 2·50, Rs. 2·50, Rs. 2·25.

State Board For Small Scale Industries Constituted

The Government of Maharashtra has constituted a 60-members State Board for Small Scale Industries to advise it on matters relating to policies, programmes and procedures to be followed for achieving meaningful development of the small scale industries under the chairmanship of the Minister for Industries. The Minister of State for Industries is its vice-chairman.

The Joint Director of Industries Planning and Public Relation is the member secretary of the Board.

The State Board will also constitute standing committees for raw materials, ancillary industries, finance and marketing.

The Board will meet once in six months to discuss various matters relating to the development of small scale industries and to make suitable recommendations to the Government. The standing committees will meet once in three months.

Maritime Industries Donate to Scarcity Fund

Shri Raj Bahadur, Union Minister for Shipping and Transport handed over cheques amounting to Rs. 8,64,989:70 to Shri V. P. Naik, Chief Minister of Maharashtra towards the Scarcity Relief Fund on behalf of the maritime industries in the city at 'Varsha', Bombay on 26th September 1973.

Bulk of the amount came from the Shipping Corporation of India which donated Rs. 5,91,505.

The Chief Minister expressed gratitude for the generous donation. He also took a brief review of a number of productive works completed during the scarcity period.

Describing the scarcity in Maharashtra for the third year in succession as unprecedented, Shri Raj Bahadur lauded the efforts of the State Government in mobilising all its resources to combat the difficult situation.

The State under the leadership of Shri Naik had turned the calamity into an opportunity by building up assets that would bring prosperity, Shri Raj Bahadur added.

Shri Rajani Patel, Chairman of the Scarcity Relief Committee expressed his happiness over the efforts of the maritime industries in Bombay who had come forward and extended help at a time when it was most needed.

Also present on the occasion were Shri V. B. Patil, Minister for Irrigation and Power, Shri A. R. Antulay, Minister for Buildings and Communications and Shri C. P. Srivastava, Chairman of the Shipping Corporation of India.

Self-Employment For Graduate And Post-Graduate Doctors

The Government of Maharashtra has modified its earlier scheme of according training to integrated doctors and para medical personnel under the Centrally sponsored special programme of absorption of educated unemployed persons in jobs or self employment.

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of I- According to the modified scheme, 100 compounders (dispensing assistant will be imparted training for a period of six months from October 1, 19). The prescribed qualification is intermediate science, preferably 'B' groof equivalent qualification. The trainees will be paid a stipend of Rs. 100 exper month. After the training the candidates will be designated as 'dispensionassistants' and absorbed in the existing vacancies, particularly in the rural are

Under the self-employment scheme, 200 doctors (M.B.B.S.) and paraduate doctors will be paid stipend of Rs. 300 per month each for a per of six months upto March 31, 1974.

Under another scheme for doctors, a maximum of 40 dental surgeons be paid stipend of Rs. 250 per month from October 1, 1973 and the seed mo of Rs. 3,000 in the current year.

The Government will take necessary bonds from these doctors to settle practice in the mofussil area in small towns with population ranging between 50,000 and 50,000 for a minimum period of five years. For post-grad doctors, the population should range between 50,000 and 1,00,000.

Employees In Wooden Photo or Picture Industry-Minimum Wage Rates fix

The Government of Maharashtra has fixed with effect from October 1, I the minimum rates of wages payable to the employees in wooden photo picture frames making and other similar work or any work incidental to process, throughout the State.

The necessary notification giving out the details of the minimum rate wages payable to different categories of workers in the three zones in M rashtra has been published in Part I-L of the Government Gazette, Exordinary, of September 18, 1973.

Asian Labour Ministers' meet Concludes

Labour Ministers from 17 Asian countries concluded their three conference on October 3 after adopting a joint communique calling for effective of the huge manpower resources in Asia.

The fourth Asian Labour Ministers' meeting centered on the role functions of labour administration and the development of employment

The communique called for "effective use of the huge manpower resonance in Asia" so as to make it "contribute immensely to the peace and prospos the world."

The communique said the "gravest problem" facing Asian countries twas "poverty and unemployment" and stressed the need for expansion employment opportunities "without discrimination" as the first step to solving the problem.

The countries which took part in the conference were Australia, Bangla Fiji, India, Indonesia, Iran, Japan, Khmer South Korea, Malaysia, New Zealand, Pakistan, Phillippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam.

The fifth conference was scheduled to be held in Australia in the s of 1975.

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Shri K. V. Raghunatha Reddy, Minister for Labour and Rehabilitation, speaking at the Fourth Asian Labour Ministers' Conference in Tokyo on October I, said that greatest challenge to out times was the eradication of poverty and developing countries of Asia had to carry forward their still, unfinished revolution in this direction.

Shri Reddy said that our endeavour should be to overcome the economic, technological and intellectual consequences of colonialism and in this task we must rely increasingly on our own resources and greater regional and mutual co-operation among Asian countries. At the same time, larger assistance of organisations like ILO was not ruled out, but the developing countries of Asia would like the ILO to be more active in giving practical help rather than prescribing norms

Significant Change

Shri Reddy also said that in the developing countries new economic and social policies had led to a significant change in the role of Labour Administration which had shifted from the protective laiasez faire policy to a policy of promotion and involvement aimed at securing social justice and a fair deal for the Labour. Labour was more than a more factor of production; it was the primary source of material and non-material values in human society, he added.

About economic growth, Shri Reddy said, "Benefits of growth should not only be equitably distributed among various sections of the population but in fact these should increasingly accrue to the weaker and underprivileged sections of the community, if the wide disparities prevailing in our society are to be narrowed. It is our endeavour to secure a redistribution of the nations wealth in such a way that labour gets a fair share and a fair deal so that he may participate enthusiastically in the national endeavour for economic advancement."

Appropriate Technology

Shri Reddy added, "we must be cautious about the introduction of highly sophisticated technology. It should be discouraged where it tends to displace human labour without any appreciable impact on productivity. Technology which has become obsolete in the advanced countries, should not be imported into the developing countries in the guise of appropriate technology. What we need is not the outmoded obsolete technologies of the developed countries, but innovative technologies, that is, technologies specifically adapted to the requirements of these countries in different stages of development."

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PROMOTIONS AND INCREMENTS.

An attempt is made in this article to review the policy of promotions and increments in industry.

We will first examine the policy of promotions. Promotion is a transfer from a job to a higher job, usually accompanied by monetary gains to an employee. The practice of promotions differs in different organizations. But broadly promotion depends upon the existence of a vacancy in a higher category and the availability of a suitable man. Usually seniority and merit are taken into account. Promotions usually help to promote morale, increase efficiency, provide opportunity for loyal employees and promote better industrial relations.

Messrs. Scott, Clothier and Sprigal in their book "Personnel Management—Principles, practices and Point of View" mention the following reasons:—

(1) Promotion is the stepping up of an employee to a position in which he can render greater service to the Company and derive increased personal satisfaction and income from his work.

(2) The knowledge that deserved promotions are being made, increases

the interests of other employees in the Company.

(3) Such knowledge causes employees to remain with the Company and reduces the labour turnover.

(4) It creates a feeling of content with the present conditions and encourages ambition to succeed within the Company.

(5) It increases interest in training and self-development as necessary

preparation for promotion.

as are selections from within the Company are not so apt to be mistaker

We will now examine one by one the problems that managements have to face in respect of promotions.

The opportunities for promotions are more in an organization which is developing very fast and which is comparatively very young in its age. Employees originally employed by such organization usually get rapid promotions. Opportunities for promotion depend upon size, age and prosperity of an organization.

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It is more likely that a big organization has numerous categories of and there are, therefore, more changes of promotions from a lower to a category. While a small organization, having a few categories has les for giving opportunities of promotions to its employees. Here the ve of the organization becomes a determining factor in evolving promotion

Next factor is the age of the organization. As the organization becomend stabilises, the policy of promotions gets more stabilised. In such a single the employees who already occupy higher posts by their promotions in yage keep less scope for new entrants for rapid promotions. The frequencements of the promotions therefore, slows down with the age of an organization.

The most important factor from the point of view of both the mana and employees is the prosperity of an organization and its developmential. A fast developing organization has usually to create new cope up with the development many of which are in higher categories.

The development rate of an organization depends upon the nature of in which it is engaged and the state of the econmoy on the whole. An exation facing prolonged hadships cannot affored promotions at the which a prosperous organization can.

Retirement age of employees is one more determining factor. The the age of retirement, longer will be the period that employees will occup and the vacancies will occur at a slower rate.

With the mortality rate going down and the average age of a man increase is a general tendency to enhance the retirement age. In India during last 25 years, the retirement age has been generally raised from 55 to 60. Though this slows down the promotions on the whole, the indubenefited by the services of an experienced man. On the other hand as remains longer in employment, he still has more chances for promotion would have been the case otherwise.

The state of employment in an economy deserves some consideration a situation of full employment or near full employment, employees are to be attracted by better prospects available outside the organization not generally wait for their turn to come for promotion in their own zation. 

A cane turned out by institution or who desires change of employment carries with ideas and techniques which many times are much more helpful to the manner in increasing its efficiency. Here the management has to make a construction between its old employees as against candidates from outside. This obscomes more important in filling vacancies in higher categories who gen manage the organization and who are responsible for its growth. The category vacancies can be filled in purely on the basis of promotions.

Ambition of a man does not necessarily go hand in hand with his a While a man's ambition may be limitless, his ability has a certain limit he may not recognize but which must be recognized by the organization, an employee reaches this limit, there should be an end to his promo irrespective of the number of years he has to serve in the organization, doubt the ability of a man increases with training, experience and promobut at a certain stage it reaches the final limit beyond which an employed likely to develope.

Age of an employee and the number of years of service he has to put organization are also important factors. Some organizations prefer to rapid promotions to an employee in his earlier years of career findin suitable to bear more responsibilities. But the sound policy of promoshould be that promotions of an employee should be spread uniformly over whole period of career of an employee. If an employee gets rapid promotion his earlier years of career and then the management is left with no opportunities to offer to the employee in his rest of the career, a situat likely to arise where the employee expects to continue to get promotions rate at which he got in the past and the management has got nothing to anymore. The choice is therefore for the management to lay down prompolicy in such a way that generally the promotions are spread over through career of its employees and not clustered in a particular age group, again depends upon other factors.

The chances of promotions depend on the type and level of education which an employee enters his career and also on the chances available the for further education either in his own organization or outside. Some of eactions provide for in-plant training to its employees in which case ambiguous avail of such opportunities. In case of educational facilities of the organization a number of factors come in the picture such as the copen to the employees, the timings of institutions offering such course working timings of the employees, educational aids they can get, do circumstances, time spent in travelling, etc. This all depends upon the structure in which he is working. In a country like ours as more and educational facilities are being provided by the Government and educational facilities are being provided by the Government and educations employees today stand in far better position for self-develop than what was the case in the past.

Similarly management has to face the problem of choosing employed promotions which will keep to the minimum the discontent amongs



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aspiring employees. Seniority and merit are generally taken as the criteria for But both do not go together always. In such case management has to take decisions. It is generally felt desirable that at lower levels in the hierarchy of employees preserence should be given to seniority as most of the jobs carried out are of routine nature and the employees can generally pick them up. But as we go higher and higher, reponsibilities become wider and the jobs require to face matters which are not of routine type. In this type of prometion merit should be given priority. Here management has to lay down some policy as to recruitment by promotions from within and recruitment from without of newly qualified and trained personnel. Entrance of new blood certainly is desirable for the development of an organization.

To some extent promotions depend upon the branch of the organization like technical, commercial, administrative, sales etc. In some cases by the very nature of jobs in a particular line the chances of promotion are limited to a very great extent. We may call this as the blind end. Here the problem comes as to what the management can do in such circumstances. Managements solve this problem by various ways like giving additional increments or special allowances or giving additional responsibilities to such employees to satisfy their ambition

The industrial relations in an organisation and its agreements with union also come in picture. Both promotions and industrial relations promote each other in that internal promotions create satisfaction amongst employees which helps in bettering industrial relations and good industrial relations with employee encourage managements to offer promotions to its own employees to kee them contented. Promotions have become a subject of collective bargaining

The promotion policy of an organization in the resultant of all these factor which act separately and collectively. While laying down the promotic policy emphasis on factors will differ from organization to organization as that promotion policy will become successful which strikes a good balan amongst all the factors. Moreover with the passage of time the situation will go on changing and emphasis on different factors will have to be change It will have to be constantly reviewed at intervals. There lies the skill a success of a management.

Now coming to the second subject of increments we will examine the variety Increments factors that play a role in awarding increments and what problems are crea out of them.

We can define increment as a sort of promotion of an employee in term money on the same job in the same category. There are various reasons incremental scales are laid down. The most important amongst them (i) the efficiency of an employee goes up with experience and thereby he tributes more to the organization. Increment is an attempt to comper him for this sort of additional contribution. (ii) The needs of an empl grow more and more with his a.g., as he has more and more responsibi The wages which are paid to him, therefore, need to be ra to onable him to meet his growing needs. It is a general pattern that increment are awarded as a routine matter on year to year basis.

The question which I propose to examine here is the payment of increments many times awarded by managements.

Additional increments are awarded to an employee to compensions reasons like batter efficiency and had work, loyalty to the retaining him in the job and to discourage him from leaving the officiency of the organization there are no chances of promotion in the higher category and encourage not only the employee who is awarded additional include induce other employees to do so.

- (ii) The competent authority shall then compute the cost of living allowance in accordance with the directions made under clause (i).
- (iii) The cost of living allowance computed as aforesaid shall be declared by the competent authority by a notification in the Official Gazette in the last week of July when such allowance is payable for each of the months of July to December and in the last week of January, when such allowance is payable for each of the months of January to June:

Provided that, the competent authority shall declare the cost of living allowance payable in respect of the months of October, November and December of the year 1973 immediately after the first day of October 1973.

 - 4. Testing the purity of oxygen and hydrogen.—(1)The purity of oxygen and hydrogen shall be tested by a competent person at least once in every shift, at the following points:—
 - (i) In the electrolyser room.
 - (ii) At the gas holder inlet and
 - (iii) At the suction end of the compressor:

Provided that where the electrolyser plant is fitted with automatic recorder of purity of oxygen and hydrogen with alarm lights the purity of the gases may be tested likewise at the suction end of the compressor only.

- (b) For the existing paragraph 6, the following shall be substituted:—
- 6. Provision of negative pressure switch.—In addition to the limit switch, to switch off the compressor motor, to make it impossible to empty the gas holder to the point causing vaccum inside the gas holder, a sensitive negative pressure switch shall be provided in or adjecent to the suction main for hydrogen, close to the gas holder and between the gas holder and the hydrogen compressor, to switch off the compressor motor in the event of the gas holder being emptied to the extent as to cause vaccum.
- (c) For the existing paragraph 10, the following shall be substituted:—
 - 10. Maintenance of gas pipes, gas holders and compressed gas storage vessels:
- (1) Oxygen and Hydrogen gas pipes shall be pointed with distinguishing colours. In the event of leakage at the joints of hydrogen gas pipe, holder of a storage vessel or in the event of any breakdown, the pipe and storage system after repairs and reconnections carried out as per paragraph 13 of this Schedule and in accordance with the requirements of Puls 73 Chaftha Maharashtra Bactories Rules, 1963, shall be purged of all

- (ii) Before drawing in hydrogen gas in any or existing system not in use every gas holder or compressed gas vessel in the system shall be purged of all air gases using a suitable inert gas.
- (d) For the existing paragraph 11, the following shall be substituted:—
- 11. Electrical wiring and other sources of ignition. —Wherever hydrogen gas is general noressed, transferred, or stored all electrical wiring, apparatus and other instal shall be of flame-proof construction. All sources of ignition shall be prevented being present in the above areas. A warning notice shall be exhibited to that effection prominent places in the above areas.



The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco, etc. group decreased by 1 point to 239 due to a fall in the average prices of supari and chewing tobacco.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 1 point to 211 due to a rise in the average price of firewood.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 2 points to 221 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoties, sarces, shirtings, long cloth, trouser's cloth, mulmul, bush-shirts, vests and shoes (gents).

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 2 points to 181 due to a rise in the average of Dr.'s fee, cinema show, hair oil, utensils and tailoring charges.

In September 1973 the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for Nagpur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 261 being 1 point higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Nagpur City.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco, etc. group decreased by 25 points to 172 due to a fall in the average price of pan-leaf.

NANDED* 311—A fall of 8 Points

In September 1973, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the Nanded Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal 100 was 311 being 8 points lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Nanded Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 14 points to 383 due to a fall in the average prices of rice, jowar, turdal, gramdal, moongdal, uriddal, masurdal, groundnut oil, ghee, tamarind, potatoes, onions (white), brinjals, tomatoes, other vegetables and banana, and a fall in the sub-group index of

fish (dry) and fish (fresh).

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 7 points to 237 due to an increase in the prices of dhoti, saree, cloth for trousers, long cloth and coloured fabric.

The index number for the miscellaneous group decreased by 2 points to 189

due to a fall in the average prices of pan leaf and blade (Bharat).

The index numbers for the fuel and light group and housing remained stationary at 175 and 147 respectively.

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

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JALGAON CENTRE*

288-A rise of 5 points

In September 1973, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Jalgaon Centre with base January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 288 being 5 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 8 points to 355 due to a rise in the average prices of wheat, jowar, mutton, fresh fish, turmeric, dry chillies, zeera and banana.

The index number for the miscellaneous group has increased by 1 point to 181 due to a rise in the average prices of utensils, hair oil and toilet soap.

The index number for the fuel and light group, clothing and footwear group and housing remained stationary at 185, 218 and 137 respectively.

249-A rise of 10 points

In September, 1973, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Poona Centre with base January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 249 being 10 points higher than that in the preceding month. The Index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-69 family living survey at the Poona Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 17 points to 301 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, jowar, milk, turmeric and tamarind.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 2 points to 224 due to a rise in the prices of dhoti, long cloth and coloured poplin.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 2 points to 177 due to a rise in the average prices of utensils, daily mixture and hair oil.

The index number for the fuel and light and the housing groups remained stationary at 199 and 124 respectively.
