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The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of February 1977 with the average price for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 309, 315 and 299 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Pune and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of February 1977 with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 301, 319, 293 and 316 respectively.

Industrial Disputes

During December 1976 there were 35 strikes involving 13690 workmen and a time-loss of 38728 working days, as compared to 33 disputes in November involving 7847 workmen and time-loss of 65755 man-days. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages 809 and 810 of this issue.

Current Notes

Equal Wages Act extended to Food Industry

THE Government of India, by a notification issued on February 5, has brought the establishments manufacturing food products under the purview of the Equal Remuneration Act, 1976 with effect from February 10.

The units covered are:—

1. Slaughtering, preparation and preservation of meat.
2. Manufacture of dairy products.
3. Canning and preservation of fruits and vegetables.
4. Canning, preserving and processing of fish, crustacean and similar foods.
5. Grain mill products.
6. Manufacture of bakery products.
7. Manufacture and refining of sugar other than indigenous sugar.
8. Production of indigenous sugar such as boora, khandsari, or gur from sugar-cane and palm juice.
9. Production of common salt.
10. Manufacture of cocoa, chocolate and sugar confectionery (including sweetmeats).
11. Manufacture of hydrogenated oils, such as vanaspati ghee, etc.
12. Manufacture of other edible oils and fats such as mustard oil, ground-nut oil or til oil.
13. Tea processing.
14. Coffee curing, roasting and grinding.
15. Cashewnut processing, such as drying, shelling, roasting, salting of cashewnut.
16. Manufacture of ice.
17. Manufacture of prepared animal feeds.
18. Manufacture of starch.
19. Manufacture of any other food products.

City Textile Mill may reopen soon

THE Western India Mills, Bombay, closed down for the last nine months, is likely to reopen soon.

Chief Minister Chavan told newsmen on March 8 that according to his information orders had been received (from the Centre) to re-start the mills.

Mr. Chavan, who was replying to reporters' questions, said that some discussions had also been held on March 7 on the issue of re-starting the Madhusudan Mills, Bombay, which has been closed down for the last nine months, rendering nearly 4,500 workers jobless.

Western India, a composite mill with more than 1,300 looms and over 3,000 workers and the Madhusudan are both 'sick units'.

ILO Government Body Approves New Procedures on Resolutions

NEW procedures for preliminary control of resolutions, aimed at ensuring due process, were approved today by the Governing Body of the International Labour Office. The procedures were submitted by the United States. They will now go to the International Labour Conference for final approval.

Under the new procedures, resolutions can be ruled not receivable if they condemn member States on matters not covered by ILO standards, or if they condemn member States on matters so covered without inquiry under established ILO procedures.

Guinea-Bissau joins ILO

THE Republic of Guinea-Bissau has joined the International Labour Organisation. This brings the number of ILO member States to 133.

In a letter received from the Commissioner of State of the Interior and of Labour, Mr. Rui das Mercos Barreto, the Government of Guinea-Bissau informed the ILO that it accepted the obligations of its constitution.

The new procedures provide for examination of resolutions submitted to the International Labour Conference by a panel of independent experts, chosen from the Committee of Experts on the Application of Conventions and Recommendations. The procedures also provide for the right to appeal decisions on receivability to the Officers of the International Labour Conference.

During the discussion, several delegations emphasised the need for giving all member States the protection enjoyed by citizens—the right to objective inquiry into allegations on which a condemnation is sought.

ESI Benefits Does Not Cover Sick Leave

Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948—Scheme of Benefits thereunder does not cover demand for sick leave. Tribunal empowered to award sickness benefit.

THIS case came up before the Supreme Court on two companion appeals, by special leave, against the award of the Industrial Tribunal, Gujarat, to decide whether the scheme of benefits admissible under the Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948, Section 61, covers the workmen's demand for sick leave. The two appeals related to the dispute between the Alembic Glass Industries Ltd., Baroda (appellants) and its workmen (respondents) and Jyoti Limited, Baroda (appellants) and its workmen (respondents). At the instance of the parties, both the appeals were heard together and disposed of by a common judgement.

Broadly speaking, the dispute in both cases related to the workmen's demand for 10 days' sick leave, with retrospective effect, and its accumulation over a period of three years, i.e. up to 50 days. The workmen felt aggrieved because of the first proviso to Section 49 of the Act which did not allow them sickness except in the case of a spell of sickness following, at an interval of not more than 15 days, the spell of sickness for which sickness benefit was last paid. The workmen also felt that the benefit under the scheme of the Act was much less than the normal earnings of an employee and was not beneficial to the workmen.

The workmen's demand was opposed by both the companies (appellants) on the ground that the Act provided more than adequate sickness benefits,

Alembic Glass Industries Ltd., also contended that there was no practice of giving any such sick leave in the industries in Baroda or in the State of Gujarat. Another point raised was that the benefit of sick leave of 7 days per year was initially given to the workmen under an award dated August 29, 1958 which contained a specific direction that it would be automatically discontinued when the benefits of the Employees' State Insurance Scheme would become available to the workmen. It was also contended that the demand would create an absurd position in as much as a worker would receive more wages by remaining absent than on duty. Considering the arguments made on behalf of both the parties, the Tribunal, inter alia, awarded 7 Days' sick leave in a year with full pay and dearness allowance to the workers of the Alembic Glass Industries Ltd., with the facility of accumulation up to 21 days. A similar award was made in the case of Jyoti Ltd., except that the direction regarding 7 days sick leave was given retrospective effect. As a result, both the parties appealed before the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court in its judgement, upheld the workmen's demand for sick leave. Adducing from its two earlier awards, the Court observed that the scheme of the benefits admissible under the Act cannot be said to cover the workmen's demand for sick leave to the extent allowed by the Tribunal. Section 61 of the Act cannot thus, be said to be applicable for the simple reason that the benefits granted by the Tribunal are not similar to those admissible under the Act. The Act does not in fact deal with the question of sickness leave.

Regarding the adequacy of the sickness benefit under the provisions of the Act, the Court observed that the benefits cannot be said to be adequate for it works out to about half the average wage of a workmen, and even that amount is not admissible for the first two days of sickness except in the case of a spell of sickness following, at an interval of not more than 15 days, the spell of sickness for which the sickness benefit was last paid. The Court further observed that a workmen is prevented from earning the normal daily wages during the period of his illness and there is no justification for the argument that the rate of benefit at about half his wage, under the Act, should be considered sufficient so as to deny him the benefit of sick leave on full emoluments for a period of 7 days when he is certified by a competent medical officer to be ill. The Court also rejected the contention of the appellants that the benefits should not be allowed on the ground that it had not been allowed by other companies in the region. The Court further pointed out that it is wrong to believe that the benefit of sick leave awarded by the Tribunal is additional privilege leave for 7 days in the garb of sick leave because, by its very nature, such a leave would be admissible only in the case of actual sickness certified by a registered medical practitioner.

Keeping in view these facts, the Supreme Court, in its judgement, found nothing illegal or unjust in the awards. Nor did it think that the awards would adversely affect the economy or the industrial peace, or lead to imbalance in the conditions of service in other industrial establishments. The Court, therefore, dismissed the appeals except that the awards in the case of Jyoti Ltd., Baroda was made effective from the date of its commencement and ordered the appellant Companies to pay

Rs. 1 crore for Estate Workers' Housing

Under a Centrally Sponsored Scheme, "Subsidised Housing Scheme for Plantation Workers", a sum of about Rs. 1 crore as loan and Rs. 80 lakh as subsidy are proposed during 1977-78 for issuing loan and subsidy to tea planters of Assam for construction of houses, it is learnt.

According to the sources of the Assam State Housing Board, as allocation of the Life Insurance Corporation fund for various housing schemes in Assam is very meagre, the housing schemes for middle and higher income group could not, however, be implemented to meet the demand properly.

As decided by the Reserve Bank of India, the nationalised banks are to finance to the extent of 40 per cent of the total estimated cost for the projects, which meant for economically weaker sections and lower income group people at a differential rate of interest, i.e., 4 per cent per annum. Accordingly, janata housing scheme for rural areas and urban areas have been framed for Rs. 40 lakhs and Rs. 55 lakhs respectively for which Rs. 16 lakh and Rs. 22 lakhs respectively will be available from the bank, remaining 60 per cent are included in the annual plan.

At the insistence of the Rural Housing Wing, Bengal Engineering College, Sibpur, the scheme for reconstruction of cluster of demonstration of houses of weaker sections of the population at an estimated cost of Rs. 2.40 lakhs for construction of 60 houses in three different places of Assam has been framed. The government of India, it is said, will contribute Rs. 0.80 lakh as grant.

A large number of people both in urban and rural areas are experiencing piquant situation in housing, and the official schemes have not indeed touched even a few of them. Even the state housing board is languishing for want of sufficient funds.

In the annual plan, 1976-77, an allocation of Rs. 23 lakhs has been provided for implementation of various social housing scheme. Upto November 1976, an amount of Rs. 8 lakhs had been released to the board under rental housing scheme for economically weaker section, construction of houses for weaker section of the community and environmental improvement of slum areas under minimum needs programme and the funds for further housing the current financial year. As per programme of 1976-77, it is anticipated that total allocation of Rs. 23 lakhs will be utilised in full and anticipated achievement will be 174 houses and 4 slum pockets in general areas.

The total revised Fifth Plan (1974-79) allocation is Rs. 264 lakhs under housing for general areas. During the preceding three years (1974-77) the total expenditure including anticipated expenditure for 1976-77 comes to Rs. 86.97 lakhs.

Making U. K. more attractive for Foreign Investors—Minister stresses role of industrial democracy

The development of industrial democracy will make investment in British industry more attractive to foreign investors, Mr. Edmund Dell, Secretary of State for Trade, said in London on 14th February 1977.

"The improvement in industrial relations generally which we expect to flow from effective participation arrangements, and the reduction in damaging con-

frontation which has too often been our unhappy experience in some sectors, will make the U. K. a more attractive prospect for foreign investors ", he said.

Mr. Dell was addressing a conference on the recent Bullock report on the extension of industrial democracy in Britain ; it was arranged by the Industrial Society, an organisation specialising in industrial relations.

Government policy

Multinational companies had had experience of industrial democracy in Federal Germany and other countries, he said, and I am not aware that in any of these cases there has been any adverse effect on inward investment ".

" I feel sure that multinationals will recognise the movement towards greater worker participation in Western Europe for what it is : a genuine extension of democratic principles into industrial management offering, in the longer term, far greater security for investment in a mixed economy ", Mr. Dell said.

It had been the policy of successive British Governments to welcome and encourage overseas investment in the country's productive capacity and this remained firmly the policy of the present administration.

The Bullock report, published on January 26, resulted from the year-long inquiry of a committee chaired by Lord Bullock which looked into the need for a radical extension of industrial democracy in the private sector of British industry. (The Government is pursuing separate inquiries into the extension of employee participation in the public sector).

A majority on the committee recommended the introduction of legislation to give employees a right to representation on the boards of companies employing 2,000 or more workers. The boards would have three elements : equal numbers of employee and shareholder representatives, and a third independent element co-opted by the first two. Trade unions would decide the method of selecting the employee representatives.

Consultations

The Government is now consulting employers and trade unionists on the basis of these majority recommendations in order to identify as much common ground as possible. Following these consultations, it intends to make legislative proposals on industrial democracy during the present session of Parliament.

Mr. Dell told the conference : " If, after a period of rational and constructive debate, we are able to introduce a system of industrial democracy in this country which commands a reasonable degree of support from all sections of the community, we will have achieved something of solid and lasting benefit to the economic and industrial life of this country."

The majority on the Bullock Committee favoured the retention of the present single-board structure for British companies. A minority of the committee, however, proposed that if employee representation was to be introduced at board level, it should be split into management and supervisory boards, with employee representation confined to a minority on the latter. Employee

Factories Act, 1948

*Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. FAC. 1176/183-Lab-II, dated 25th February 1977.*¹—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 112, read with section 87 of the Factories Act, 1948 (LXIII of 1948), and of all other powers enabling it in this behalf, the Government of Maharashtra hereby makes the following rules further to amend the Maharashtra Factories Rules, 1963, the same having been previously published as required by section 115 of the said Act, namely :—

1. These rules may be called the Maharashtra Factories (Amendment) Rules, 1977.
2. In rule 114 of Maharashtra Factories Rules, 1963, in Schedule XX, in clause 4, in sub clause (c) —
 - (i) for the figures " 25 ", the figures " 10 " shall be substituted ; and
 - (ii) for the figures and letters " 80 mg/m³ ", the figures and letters " 30 mg/m³ " shall be substituted.

Minimum Wages Act, 1948

*Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. MW.A. 1075/761/Lab-7, dated the 31st January 1977.*²—Whereas, under Government Notification, Development Department, No. 2511/48, dated the 4th May 1955 (hereinafter referred to as " the said notification ") issued under section 19 of the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 (XI of 1948) (hereinafter referred to as " the said Act "), certain officers including all persons holding the office of Mamlatdar or Mahalkari and certain other officers holding offices subordinate to such Mamlatdar or Mahalkari were appointed as Inspectors for the purposes of the said Act within the limits of their respective jurisdiction ;

And whereas, under the proviso to sub-section (1) of section 20 of the said Act, it is proposed to appoint Tahsildars, Additional Tahsildars and Naib-Tahsildars to be the Authorities to hear and decide all claims arising out of the payment of less than the minimum rates of wages to the employees employed in agriculture (hereinafter referred to as the " said schedules employment ") ;

And whereas, before the appointment of the aforesaid Officers is made as the Authority to hear and decide such claims, it is considered necessary not to continue them as Inspectors under section 19 of the said Act in respect of the said Scheduled employment ;

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 19 of the said Act, the Government of Maharashtra hereby amends the said notification as follows, namely :—

In the said notification, the words " or Mamlatdar or Mahalkari, " and the words " subordinate to such Mamlatdar or Mahalkari " shall be deleted.

Minimum Wages (Maharashtra Amendment) Act, 1975

*Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. MW.A. 1176/1250-Lab-7, dated the 31st January 1977.*³—In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 1 of the Minimum Wages (Maharashtra Amendment) Act, 1975 (Mah. XXV of 1976), the Government of Maharashtra hereby appoints the first day of February 1977 to be the date on which the said Act shall come into force.

Industrial Disputes Act, 1947

*Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. IDA. 1477/(3416)-Lab-2, dated 1st February 1977.*⁴—Whereas the Government of Maharashtra is satisfied that the public interest requires that the industries specified in the Schedule hereto annexed to be a public utility service for the purpose of Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 (XIV of 1947), in the application to the State of Maharashtra (hereinafter referred to as " the said Act ").

Minimum Wages Act, 1948

Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. MW.I. 5376/1267-Lab-7, dated 3rd February 1977.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 26 of the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 (XI of 1948), in its application to the State of Maharashtra, the Government of Maharashtra hereby directs that for a period of one year commencing from the 1st day of January 1977 the provisions of the said Act, shall not apply to the employees employed on part-time basis in the scheduled employments mentioned in the Schedule hereto:—

Explanation.—For the purpose of this entry, the expressions “Shop” and “Commercial Establishment” shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them in the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948.

14. Employment in Potteries.
15. Employment in rubber manufacturing.
16. Employment in paper and paper-board manufactory.
17. Employment in any industry in which any process of transforming plastics into various solid shapes, through moulding, forming, extrusion or casting by application singly or together with heat and/or pressure or both or other similar work or work incidental to such processing is carried on.
18. Employment in any brick or roof-tiles manufactory.

19. Employment in any premises wherein buffalos or cows or both are kept for milking, cleaning or feeding and for all other ancillary processes.
20. Employment in automobile repairing workshops and garages.
21. Employment in canteens and clubs not falling under entry 13 in part I of the Schedule of the Act.
22. Employment in the film production industry.
23. Employment in any industry engaged in saw milling.
24. Employment in powerloom industry.
25. Employment in any industry in which wooden furniture making or other similar work or any work incidental to such process is carried on.
26. Employment in any industry in which wooden photo or pictures frames making and other similar work incidental to such process is carried on.
27. Employment in bakeries.
28. Employment in cashew processing industry.
29. Employment in Engineering industry (not being an employment following under entry 26 of the Schedule).
30. Employment in Salt Pan Industry.
31. Employment in Laundry Industry.
32. Employment in cloth dying and/or cloth printing.

Minimum Wages Act, 1948

Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. MWA. 5376/1267(i)/Lab.-7, dated 3rd February 1977.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 26 of the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 (XI of 1948), in its application to the State of Maharashtra, the Government of Maharashtra hereby directs that for the period ending 31st March 1977, the provisions of the said Act shall not apply to the employees employed on part-time basis in the scheduled employments mentioned in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by proviso to sub-clause (vi) of clause of section 2 of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 (XIV of 1947), the Government of Maharashtra hereby declares the Industries specified in the Schedule hereto annexed to be a public utility service for the purposes of the said Act, for a period of six months from the date of publication of this Notification in the *Maharashtra Government Gazette*.

(2) Dairies employing 20 or more workmen including activities of and connected production, collection, processing, transport and distribution of milk.

Industrial Disputes Act, 1947

N. A. Kadam, Judge, Labour Court, Solapur, and for that purpose amends the said principal notification as follows :—

Labour Legislation

L. C. BILL No. III OF 1977

A BILL

further to amend the Maharashtra Mathadi, Hamal and other Manual Workers (Regulation of Employment and Welfare) Act, 1969*

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Maharashtra *Mathadi, Hamal* and other Manual Workers (Regulation of Employment and Welfare) Act, 1969 (Mah. XXX of 1969) for the purposes hereinafter appearing ; It is hereby enacted in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Republic of India is follows:—

1. *Short title and commencement.*—(1) This Act may be called the Maharashtra *Mathadi, Hamal* and other Manual Workers (Regulation of Employment and Welfare) (Amendment) Act, 1977.

(2) It shall come into force on such date as the State Government may, by notification in the *Official Gazette*, appoint.

2. *Amendment of section 3 of Mah. XXX of 1969.*—In section 3 of the Maharashtra *Mathadi, Hamal* and other Manual Workers (Regulation of Employment and Welfare) Act, 1969 (Mah. XXX of 1969) (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Act"), in sub-section (2),—

(a) in clause (c), the words "and provision for appeal against such removal to the prescribed authority," shall be deleted ;

(b) after clause (d), the following clause shall be inserted, namely :—

"(d-i) for providing the time within which registered employers should remit to the Board the amount of wages payable to the registered workers for the work done by such workers ; for requiring such employers who, in the opinion of the Board, make default in remitting the amount of wages in time as aforesaid, to deposit with the Board, an amount equal to the monthly average of the wages to be remitted as aforesaid ; if at any time the amount of such deposit falls short of such average, for requiring the employer to make good the amount of such average, and for requiring such employers who persistently make default in making such remittances in time to pay also, by way of penalty, a surcharge of such amount not exceeding 10 per cent of the amount to be remitted as the Board may determine ;" ;

(c) in clause (j), after the words "manner in which," the words and brackets "the day from which (either prospective or retrospective)" shall be inserted ;

(d) after clause (k), the following clause shall be inserted, namely :—

"(k-i) for specifying the powers and duties which the person or authorities referred to in clause (k) may exercise or perform, for providing

appeals and revision applications against the decisions or orders of such persons and authorities ; and for deciding such appeals and applications and for matters incidental thereto ; ”.

3. *Amendment of section 6 of Mah. XXX of 1969.*—In section 6 of the principal Act, after sub-section (7), the following sub-section shall be inserted, namely :—

“(7A) There shall be paid to every member (not being a member representing the State Government) from the fund of the Board, travelling and daily allowances for attending meetings of the Board at such rates as may be prescribed. ”.

4. *Substitution of new section for section 13 of Mah. XXX of 1969.*—For section 13 of the principal Act, the following new section shall be substituted, namely :—

“ 13. *Determination of moneys due from employers and workers.*—(1) The Board or such officer as may be specified by it in this behalf may, by order, determine any sum due from any employer or worker under this Act or any scheme made thereunder, and for this purpose may conduct such inquiry as the Board or such officer may think to be necessary.

(2) The Board or such officer conducting the inquiry under sub-section (1) shall, for the purposes of such inquiry, have the same powers as are vested in a Court under the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (5 of 1908), for trying a suit in respect of the following matters, namely :—

- (a) enforcing the attendance of any person or examining him on oath ;
- (b) requiring the discovery and production of documents ;
- (c) receiving evidence on affidavit ;
- (d) issuing commissions for the examination of witnesses ;

and any such inquiry shall be deemed to be a judicial proceeding within the meaning of sections 193 and 228, and for the purpose of section 196, of the Indian Penal Code (45 of 1860).

(3) No order determining the sum due from any employer or worker shall be made under sub-section (1), unless the employer or worker, as the case may be, is given a reasonable opportunity of representing his case.

(4) An order made under this section shall be final and shall not be questioned in any Court.

(5) Any sum determined under this section may, if such sum is in arrear, be recovered as an arrear of land revenue.”.

5. *Amendment of section 14 of Mah. XXX of 1969.*—In section 14 of the principal Act, after sub-section (6), the following sub-section shall be added, namely :—

“(7) The member of the Advisory Committee (not being a member representing the State Government), shall receive travelling and daily allowances for attending meetings of the Committee at such rates as may be prescribed. ”.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

It is proposed to amend the Maharashtra, *Mathadi, Hamal* and other Manual Workers (Regulation of Employment and Welfare) Act, 1969, with a view to making the working of the Act more effective, and implementing certain recommendations of the Committee on Subordinate Legislation.

2. The following notes on clauses explain the provisions of the Bill:—

Clause 2(a) and (d).—The various schemes made under the Act provide for appeals and revisions against orders of personnel officers of the Boards. The Committee on Subordinate Legislation took objection to those provisions on the ground that there was no enabling provision to provide for such appeals, etc., in the Act. It is proposed to insert such an enabling provision in the Act by inserting a new clause (*k-i*) in sub-section (2) of section 3 of the Act and to make consequential amendment in clause (c) of that sub-section.

Clause 2(b).—There is a tendency amongst registered employers to make habitual defaults in remitting to the Board in time, the wages payable by them to the registered workers. In order to curb that tendency, it is proposed to insert a new clause (*d-i*) in sub-section (2) of section 3 of the Act, for taking power to the State Government to provide in a scheme for keeping of deposits with the Board by the defaulting employers and for the levy of a surcharge by way of penalty on those employers who are, in the opinion of the Board, persistent in making such defaults.

Clause 2(c).—The cost of operating the schemes made under the Act are defrayed partly from the registered employers. It is noticed by several Boards that employers who are required to get themselves registered under the schemes within the time specified therein avoid registration till they are prosecuted or otherwise compelled to do so. Under the existing provisions of the Act, such employers cannot be compelled to pay retrospectively, the cost of operating the schemes from the dates from which they were required to get themselves registered under the schemes. It is proposed to take such power by suitably amending clause (j) of sub-section (2) of section 3 of the Act.

Clauses 3 and 5.—Rule 5 of the Maharashtra *Mathadi, Hamal* and other Manual Workers (Regulation of Employment and Welfare) Rules, 1970 and rule 5-A of the Maharashtra *Mathadi, Hamal* and other Manual Workers (Advisory Committee) Rules, 1969 provide, respectively, for payment of travelling and daily allowances to non-official members of the Board, and for the payment of such allowances to members of the Advisory Committee. The Committee on Subordinate Legislation has pointed out that those rules are not covered by any enabling provision in that behalf in the Act. It is, therefore, proposed to insert such an enabling provision in the Act by suitably amending sections 6 and 14 of the Act.

Clause 4.—This clause provides for the substitution of a new section 13 for the existing section 13 with a view to empowering the Board or its officers to determine the sums due to the Board from any employer or worker after holding an inquiry and to invest them with certain powers of a Court under

the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 for the purpose of conducting such inquiry. Any sum which is declared to be due to the Board, will be recovered as an arrear of land revenue.

MEMORANDUM REGARDING DELEGATED LEGISLATION

The Bill involves proposals for delegation of legislative powers, as explained below:—

Clause 2.—By sub-clauses (a) and (c) of this clause, section 3 is being amended to empower the State Government to provide for the following additional matters in a scheme to be made under that section, namely:—

(i) the time within which the wages payable by the registered employers to the registered workers shall be remitted by the registered employers to the Board,

(ii) requiring the defaulting employers to keep a deposit with the Board and requiring the persistently defaulting employers to pay to the Board a surcharge by way of penalty.

(iii) specifying the powers and duties of persons or authorities who are responsible for the administration of a scheme or of the funds constituted under the Act and providing for appeals and revisions against decisions or orders of such persons or authorities.

Clauses 3 and 5.—By these clauses, sections 6 and 14 are being amended to take power to the State Government to prescribe by rules, the rates of travelling and daily allowances payable to the members of the Board and members of the Advisory Committee for attending meetings of the Board or, as the case may be, of the Advisory Committee.

The above proposals for delegation of legislative powers are of a normal character.

Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for February 1977

BOMBAY*

309—A rise of 8 points

In February 1977, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base: January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 309 being 8 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Bombay City.

The index number for the food group increased by 13 points to 335 due mainly to a rise in the average prices of rice, bajri, arhardal, gramdal, moogdal, masurdal, uriddal, groundnut oil, goatmeat, fish, fresh pamsret, turmeric, chillies dry, chillies green, garlic, coconut, kalimiri, zeera, lavang, tea leaf, and cold drink.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased by 8 points to 345 due to a rise in the average prices of pan-leaf, pan finished, supari, katha and chewing tobacco.

The index number for the fuel and light group decreased by 1 point to 378 due to a fall in the average price of firewood only.

The index number for housing remained unchanged at 143.

The index number for the clothing, bedding, and footwear group increased by 1 point to 305 due to a rise in the average prices of saree, shirting, long-cloth, trouser cloth, markin, full pant and vest.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 1 point to 247 due to a rise in the average prices of barbercharges, toilet soap, tooth powder, umbrella, laundry charges and washing soap.

In February 1977, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Jalgaon Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 301 being 7 points higher than that in the preceding month. The Index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 12 points, to 328 due to a rise in the average prices of turdal, gramdal, moongdal, uriddal, ground nut oil, vanaspati, fish fresh, potatoes, onions and other vegetables.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 1 point to 304 due to a rise in the price of electricity charges only.

The index number for housing remained steady at 144.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group decreased by 6 points to 301 due to a fall in the prices of dhoti and saree.

The index number for the miscellaneous group decreased by 1 point to 254 due to a fall in the price of katha only.
