Chief Minister said that of late there had been considerable improvein industrial relations since the outbreak of strikes and lockouts after nergency. Earlier this month there were strikes in 38 concerns and lockin 11 firms, involving in all 11,700 workers.

Rural Labour Welfare Fund

Member in the Rajya Sabha on May 5th. The Bill, first of its kind, profor constitution of a fund to be called Rural Labour Welfare Fund which be applied for provisions of water supplies, housing recreation and improve of educational facilities, standards of living and nutrition and amelioration conditions. The Bill also makes it obligatory for the Central Goment and State Government to appoint Advisory Committees for the administration.

A non-official bill for promoting the welfare of labour employed in agricu

tration of this fund which shall consist of equal representatives of the concernment, employers and rural labour. It also provides for the appoint of Rural Labour Welfare Fund Commissioner. The Statement of Oland Reasons says that the number of rural and agricultural workers in its 47.48 million and Central Legislation is necessary to appoint the Boar

The Bill does not provide for any levy or coing of cess for this purpose as is done in the case of industrial workers in conting Labour Welfare Boards, but the Central Government may provide for expenditure from the Consolidated Fund of India after the appropriation by law.

Training to Handicapped in Factories

The Government of India have started, from 1976-77, a scheme of intraining for the blind, the handicapped, the deaf and the dumb between the group of 18 to 40. Under the scheme, handicapped persons are given train factories, cotton textile mills, printing presses and other Government mised industrial units.

The factories receive from the Government grants of Rs. 1,200 to be patrainees at the rate of the stipend of Rs. 100 per month per trainee.

ILO Survey Reveals Need for New Social Service for Women

WOMEN'S place in the labour market, away from an exclusively role, has been more firmly established over recent years, says a repo International Labour Conference (Geneva, 7-28 June 1978). B and better social services are needed to bolster new attitudes tov employment of working mothers.

The report by an independent committee of experts, which reviews in ILO member countries since ILO Recommendation No. 123 on the ment of women with family responsibilities was adopted 13 years as that in spite of "exceptional" advances some countries are still about women's role in society. Men, it says, are often not aware of labour force (34·1 per cent), participate increasingly in trade union and activity.

ILO Recommendation No. 123 sought to give working women two

- —facilities designed to help them deal with immediate day-to-day due to their dual tasks at work and in the home, and
- —guidance and training to help girls and working mothers avoi discrimination on grounds of sex.

Adoption of both kinds of measures has been most frequent in the i lised world. Growth of special services has been considerably s developing countries, where few of the 360 million workers are wage and where relatives often help to take care of the children.

But almost all countries have experienced a serious strain on c facilities owing to changing attitudes towards the employment of mothers. Important resources have to be mobilised and countri have other development priorities.

The ILO report, however, stresses that women are not the sole ber of such policies. Measures to help them find and keep employment of directly to the development of the national economy, by making polynomial expansion of the labour force. It is increasingly accepted that "the of family responsibilities should be considered as problems of the fam society, and not just as those of the working woman". Action should be pursued at all levels, including governments and employers' and organisations.

Other suggestions for revision of Recommendation No. 123 are that include such measures as flexible working hours for all workers, a recommendation working hours for persons with family responsibilities, special leave a worker to take care of a sick child, and the development of communations.

The ILO report points out that helping women to handle their dual bilities of home and work should not affect their right to stay at hon care of their family, although, it adds, this "freedom" is limited by the constraints of having to contribute to the family income.

It also shows wide divergency on the question of when the necessary for working women ends, and when discrimination starts. Many prohibit overtime or night work for women so that they will have a available at home, whereas others have repealed existing prohibition kind in order to remove a possible source of discrimination against visual starts.

Labour administration is a complex affair, grouping together administration activities in the field of national labour policy. In as well as industrialised countries, social policy can be conceived or tion to national economic and social objectives, and with the active par of employers and workers in decisions which affect them. It is in this fit that the structures of labour administration must be built and its organised.

Acute Unemployment In Developed Western Countries

Many eminent capitalist economists who believed in the past that 'safe' level of unemployment was necessary for the 'normal' function capitalist system of economy, now prefer to forget their "formulation" ment agencies have had to make a full study of the problem of enbecause the army of jobless has attained threatening proportions in capitalist countries.

According to official figures, 62,43,000 people were unemployed in Common Market countries in January 1978. In Britain 1.5 million less, in Italy 1.7 million, in France 1.19 million, and in the FRG 1. Almost half of them are young people.

These are overall figures but in separate branches, most strongly crisis, the percentage of unemployed is much above the overall avera country.

Over six million people are jobless in the United States or 6.2 per centire active population. For Negroes this figures is much higher-cent—and for young Negroe's over 39 per cent.

The dry statistical figures conceal the tragedy of millions of people deprived of the most vital right—the right to employment. The actu of people without means of existence is always much bigger than the figure, for the number of dependants should be added to the night.

Unemployment spells not only poverty; but is a grave moral proble while getting unemployment relief, people feel they are redundant and

Economists and experts in leading Western countries are working grammes to create fresh employment. But all these half-measur solve the basic problem that stems from social injustice and perperconomic inequality.

BENEFITS UNDER THE EMPLOYEES' STATE INSURANCE SCHEME—REVIEW FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL 1978

The Employees' State Insurance Scheme applies to 26 Centres in the State Maharashtra and provides protection to 13,79,400 workers in the event employment injury, sickness and maternity. This protection is made available in two ways, namely by provision of medical care and cash benefits when needed During the month of April 1978, 12,413 Insured Persons received Rs. 19,53,527.95 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 4,266 persons who were in receipt of Pensions for Permanent disablement at 1,550 persons who were in receipt of Dependent Benefit as dependant's deceased Insured Persons. During the month 9,831 accidents were report as against 9,917 during the preceding month.

Comparatively fewer persons need the employment injury benefits be a fairly large number need Cash Benefit in the event of Sickness. During Ap 1978, 97,345 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 68,35,482.85 was particle out as Sickness Benefit. During the preceding month 1,08,011 claims we received and an amount of Rs. 72,08,038.45 was disbursed as Sickness Benefit.

Some Insured Persons suffering from T. B., Mental, Malignant, other lotterm diseases etc., require more attention and they are being paid addition benefit called Extended Sickness Benefit. During the month an amount Rs. 5,79,947.65 paid towards this benefit.

During the month 255 Insured Women Workers claimed Rs. 3,52,944 by way of Maternity Benefit. The attendance at the dispensaries as per certicates received was 2,78,749 during the month.

During the month Funeral Benefit in 154 cases amounting to Rs. 15,394 was paid.

During the month Confinement Charges in respect of wives of Insured Perso amounting to Rs. 73,590.00 were paid.

During the Month an amount of Rs. 9,532.00 was paid as Enhanced Sickne Benefit to 57 Insured Persons who had gone under sterilisations operation framily Planning.

For recovery of arrears of Contribution under the Scheme, Legal proceeding had to be initiated in 35 cases against defaulting employers.

Book Review

Every industrial worker at one time or the other has to face a charge sheet and subsequent enquiry for any of the misconducts committed by him. Government has also described the procedure for holding such enquiries as well as the misconducts likely to be committed by industrial workers in the Standing Orders settled under the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 or the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1947. A large number of books in English are available for guidance of the workmen, his defendant, the Enquiry Officer as well as the Management. However, necessity was keenly felt to have such a book in Marathi because majority of the workers working in industrial undertakings only know Marathi language. Shri Upadhaye's book fills this gap and gives in a nut shell all the important points required to be noted at the time of the enquiry. He has also discussed a number of connected matters and the defects likely to take place at the time of the charge sheet, show cause notice or the enquiry. He has also examined the provisions of the Indian Evidence Act, law of pleadings as well as the burden of proof and the responsibilities to prove the same. He has also examined in detail the existing case law on the matter and has also discussed as to when violation of principles of naturael justice takes place and when the findings of the Enquiry Officer can be treated as perverse. It will be seen from the list of cases referred to by him that he has examined about 159 Court decisions on this issue before undertaking the woer of writing this book. In the end he has also given how the proceedings of the enquiry should be drawn. He has also given a draft form for issuing suspension order to the workmen, a form for giving show cause notice and model form for charge sheet.

It will be seen from the above that the book serves as a very useful purpose for understanding the procedure of departmental enquiries and will be very helpful to the defendant workmen, trade unionists appeared to defend him as well as the Enquiry Officer. As the book is in Marathi, it can also be used for conducting courses under the Workers Education Scheme and by trade unionists in their various programmes. The price of Rs. 18.00 also appear to be reasonable in these days.
