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The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of December 1977 with the average price for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 323, 336 and 324 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Pune and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of December 1977 with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 315, 334, 312 and 329 respectively.

Industrial Disputes

During September 1977 there were 43 strikes involving 43,691 workmen and a time-loss of 69,757 working days, as compared to 35 disputes in August 1977 involving 8,872 workmen and time-loss of 55,227 mandays. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages 624 and 625 of this issue.

NEW DEAL FOR LABOUR

What distinguishes man from the rest of the animal world is his capacity to be organised in the activities he undertakes for the purpose of production. There are various factors of production such as man, machines, material, capital, power and services. But since the human being is the universal and crucial resource, he has the centre of interest in general economic analysis. Human labour alters our material environment and by doing so, it also creates a new world. To labour and thus to give a new shape to nature itself seems to be part of the vocation and destiny of man. Along with the rest of the Indian Society, labour too had been deprived of its rights and privileges during time of emergency.

The new Government lost no time in restoring fundamental freedoms to the people. Immediate action was taken to rest ore the fundamental and inalienable rights of the working class. The tripartite machinery in our country had been put out of use and had been allowed to rust for many years. Within weeks of taking over the responsibility, the Government declared its dedication to the principles of triapartitism, revived the tripartite machinery, and initiated the process of tripartite consultations to achieve a national consensus on all major issues relating to labour policy.

The Emergency and the total suppression of civil rights had given us an opportunity to discover ourselves. It provided an opportunity for self-introspection, even as the subsequent revolution gave us an opportunity for national catharsis. We would not have learnt any lession from the agonising exposure of the vulnerability of democratic institutions that we had witnessed in our country, if we did not show that we have imbibed a new spirit.

THE NEW SPIRIT

The new spirit is the spirit of real democracy, the spirit of equality, the spirit that stems from the conviction that democracy is the rule of the people, that people can rule only if they can participate as partners in the processes of decision-making, whether it be in the field of politics or in the activities that govern their economic lives. It is a truism to say that the processes of democracy cannot prosper in the field of public life if they are denied in field of the economic activities of citizens. What we have witnessed in our country is a re-assertion of the will of the masses to be partners in decision-making in all spheres.

The hopes that had been aroused with the success of the mass movement for the restoration of democracy are indeed colossal. Our people were impatient for ending poverty and destitution. 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Prime Minister has shown acute awareness of the expectations of our people when he declared that the Government would attempt to end poverty and dist tution in our country within a specific span of 10 years.

It is now nine months since the new Government took over the responsibilit of running the administration at the Centre. Immediately there were report of industrial unrest from many parts of the country. These reports of demonst trations and stoppages of work did cause the Government some concern There was, however, the recognition that those were days during which th country was emerging from the long dark night, which every section of th people had experienced.

TWO-PRONGED EFFORT

As an earnest effort to identify the causes for restiveness, a two-pronged effor was made—one to identify and remove the immediate irritants that were th legacy of the emergency, and the other to evolve a more effective machinery and procedure that would ensure speedy and just redressal of individual grievance and expedite an equitable resolution of collective disputes.

One of the promises that had been made to the people was that Governmen would undo the wrongs that were done during the Emergency. A number o workers or employees had lost their employment. The services of quite a few of them had been terminated merely on the ground that they were arrested o detained under the MISA or DIR, or because the then Government suspected that they belonged to, or were sympathetic to, organisations that had been banned. There were many instances of employers abriding the due processe of law and terminated the services of the employees. Immediate action wa taken to correct these wrongs. Directives were issued to all the State Govern

A look at the development that have been achieved in the last three decades leaves one with the feeling that precious little of the benefits of the process of development has percolated to our rural At the National Tripartite Labour Conserence held in May 1977, it was decided that a special conference should be held to devote exclusive attention to the needs and problems of workers in the rural sector. This conference is being held this month.

Though a very large infrastructure has by now been built for rendering social security services to the workers in the organised sector, there are complaints about the unsatisfactory nature of medical services, rendered to the workers, particularly under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme. The common complaints are indifferent treatment, unhygienic conditions in hospitals and dispensaries, non-availability of medicines prescribed by doctors, inconvenient timings at the out-patient departments, and the like. Necessary action to remove the causes of these complaints, have been initiated. Special emphasis have been laid on frequent inspections and supervision by senior officers, both medical and non-medical. A Committee to examine how far the integration of our many social security schemes can reduce administrative expenditure, increase efficiency, increase coverage and promote the diversification of services is being constituted.

In spite of the removal of all major causes of irritation to the working class, there are certain areas where unrest seems to have become endemic. In these areas one witnesses not only a trial of strength on the economic planes but also ugly instances of gheraos and of physical violence as well.

Violence in Settling Disputes

This is a most unfortunate trend that is being witnessed today in some areas of our country. Every well-wisher of the working class and of industry will deeply deplore the use of violence in the settlement of industrial disputes. An atmosphere of anarchy, uncertainty and indiscipline in industrial establishments will not serve the interests of the working class of the industry or the community. No Government can be silent spectator to the use of violence or activities of either party that may lead to physical confrontation or offer grave provocations to the other party.

The Government is deeply committed to promote healthy industrial relations in the country. It will not seek to serve any partisan ends or try to derive only dividends by dividing the trade union movement, nor will it adopt a policy of bolstering any particular trade union irrespective of the support that it may enjoy from the workers. It believes that trade unions should seek their strength from the workers and from the services they render to them, and not from the support they expect from the Government for political reasons.

The Government has to provide an effective legal machinery for bipartite negotiations, collective bargaining and the settlement of industrial disputes. This machinery and the personnel that operates the machinery must be such as can secure the confidence of the workers as well as the managements. While making such a machinery available to the workers and protecting the legitimate

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rights of the workers, the Government has also to protect the life and property inside the industrial plants.

Wider Responsibility

There is no doubt that the primary responsibility of trade unions is to the working class which it tries to organise and serve. But no one can ignore the fact that the economic interests of the working class are themselves integrally linked with the development and viability of industry and general economic interests of the community of which the workers form a part. Trade unions organise workers and claim the right to speak and act on behalf of the workers. It is quite clear, therefore, that trade unions and the leadership of the trade unions must be anxious to preserve democratic processes and submit their claims to the processes of democratic verification. There are many trade unions in our country. Each of them exercises the right to talk on behalf of the working class. Surely, there must be a means that permits the working class to pronounce on these claims and to indicate their approval or disapproval of the demands that are made on their behalf and the actions that are taken on their behalf.

This is an age in which persuation has to take the place of dictation, consultation and cooperation have to take the place of coercion; participation and partnership have to take the place of promotion of sectional benefits.

UNDP/ILO Project on Vocational Training

The Government of India, the International Labour Organisation and the United Nations Developing Programme signed recently an agreement concerning an Advanced Vocational Training System. With this the country enters a new phase of advanced and sophisticated vacational training on a nation-wide basis.

The project for which the United Nations Development Programme is providing U.S.S. 6.4 million is the largest to be executed by the ILO anywhere in the world and also the largest UNDP-financed scheme. This marks a turning point in the long history of the ILO's association with the Indian Government in the whole field of vocational training.

With the Indian industries entering into more complex areas, the demands for accuracy and sophistication in skills have grown rapidly. In order to meet the emerging demand for highly skilled cadres of craftsmen, Government decided to set up in 1967, with UNDP/ILO assistance, the Advanced Vocational Training Institute at Madras. The Institute has so far trained more than 2800 full-fledged craftsmen for industrial undertakings throughout India. During the same period, the Central Institute for Plastics Engineering and Tools at Madras and the Central Institute of Tool Design at Hyderabad were established with the technical and financial support from ILO/UNDP. As part of these efforts in the specific field, of the fast growing electroines activities in India, the Union Labour Ministry, in collaboration with the Swedish International Development Agency (SIDA) and the ILO, launched the Advanced Training Institute for Electronics and Process Instrumentation at Hyderabad last year.

efforts to eliminating the disparities in employment, income and social opportunities which deny the Indian women their fuller role in the economic and social life of the country.

Based on the highly successful project at the Advanced Vocational Training Institute in Madras, the Advanced Vocational System Project which has been formally approved is expected to upgrade 5 Central Training Institutes into fullfledged Advanced Training Institutes and further modernise 16 selected industrial training institutes and develop a net work of existing training centres throughout the country. The project will provide 15 international experts, a number of short term consultants and 80 fellowships for Indian technical persosonnel for advanced training abroad. Nearly half the financial contribution of UNDP will be utilised for import of sophisticated and specialised equipments which are not available in the country. The project envisages a target of training 12,000 skilled workers and technicians by the model Industrial Training Institutes and Advanced Training Institutes.

The Agreement was signed by Mr. M. M. S. Srivastava, Joint Secretary, Department of Economic Affairs, on behalf of the Government of India, Mr. Henry Kaufman, Deputy Resident Representative of the United Nations Development Programme and Mr. Bimal Ghosh, Director of the International Labour Organisation New Delhi, on behalf of the ILO.

Workers' Profit-Sharing Linked with Attendance and Productivity

Under recent regulations for the application of the Act on the participation of workers in the profits of undertakings in Iran, such participation is made dependent on the productivity and regularity of attendance of the workers. The workers' shares of profit will henceforth be calculated on the basis of the wages, seniority, discipline at work and absences of the workers concerned, each factor will be expressed as a coefficient; these coefficients, added together, will be used to calculate the amount to be paid to the worker.

Special committees will be set up in undertakings in order to determine the coefficients. They will be composed of two representatives of the workers and three representatives of management, and will be responsible for supervising the application of the contract of participation; their decisions will be binding.

In calculating the absenteeism coefficient, statutory holidays will be considered as days worked, while authorised absences without pay and sick leave (whether on account of occupational disease or other illnesses) will be deemed absences.

Some 400,000 workers at present benefit from profit-sharing schemes, which were introduced in Iran 14 years ago. A further 35,000 workers in public and private undertakings are parties to workers' shareholding agreements instituted under a Imperial Decree of 24th April 1975.

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More Items for Small Sector

The new industrial policy statement placed before Parliament on December 23rd seeks to promote cottge and small industries and guide the growth of the large scale sector on well demarcated lines keeping in view the country's socioeconomic goal.

Presenting the statement, Industry Minister George Fernandes said so far the emphasis had been on large industries and cottage and small industries had been neglected." It is the firm policy of this Government to change this approach", he said in the Lok Sabha.

The new policy envisages inclusion of 324 additional items in the existing list of 180 for exclusive development in the small scale sector.

District headquarters would be made a focal point for development of small scale and cottage industries. Restrictions would be imposted on setting up of new industrial units around large metropolitan and urban areas." The Policy statement proposes wide dispersal of cottage and small scale units in rural areas and small towns.

Shri Fernandes said no business group would be allowed to acquire a dominent or monopolistic position. The Government would not favour large scale industry merely for demonstration of sophisticated skills or as monuments of irrelevant forign technology.

In the past the growth of large business groups had been disproportionate to the size of internally generated resources and it largely depended on borrowed funds from public financial institutions and banks, he said.

This process will be reversed, Shri Fernandes said and added that hereafter large houses would have to rely more on their own internally generated resources for finacing new or expanding existing units.

Assuring maximum financial assistance to rural industries, his present statement made significant departures from the 1956 resolution in many respects.

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ESI Raises Pension for the Disabled

The Employees' State Insurance Corporation has allowed an increase of 20 per cent in the pension of permanent disabled and to the dependents of insured persons, who died due to employment injuries on or before March 31, 1974. It has also enhanced the pension by 10 per cent if disablement or death has occurred between April 1, 1974 and March 31, 1975. These payments will be payable from October 1, 1977.

Wage Hike for T. N. Plantation Workers

Over 75,000 plantation workers will get a wage rise of 38 paise per day per worker as a result of an agreement reached between the management and the labour unions on January 2. As a result of this agreement, the tea and coffee estate workers will get a daily wage of Rs. 7.12 from January, 1, 1978. It will mean for the Tamil Nadu plantations an additional commitment of Rs. 3 crores per annum. The new revised wages will also entail corresponding revised commitments towards provident fund., leave wages, gratuity etc.

Union Worker-Directors are Unpopular, says CBI

A survey indicating that only a third of people in full-time jobs favour the appointment of union worker-directors has been published by the CBI in support of its continuing compaign against the Bullock proposals.

The reasearch, carried out by an independent group, Research Services Limited, was composed of two surveys, one of 440 chief executives of CBI firms, and one of 1,892 adult members of the general public.

The general public whittled down to 1,100 people in full-time jobs, gave these responses:

Nine percent strongly favoured and 24 per cent tended to favour trade union representatives on the board.

88-30 percent strongly, 58 per cent moderately-preferred consultation through procedures involving all employees rather than unions only.

72-24 per cent strongly, favoured collective bargaining to be handled by union representatives.

45 per cent thought union worker-directors would play a valuable part in board discussions, but 49 per cent thought they would be out of their depth, and 51 per cent that the real decisions would be made in their absence.

About a third of the public thought worker-directors would improve working relations, productivity, decision-making and profits, but about 40 per cent believed worker-directors would make no difference in these areas.

A staggering 47 per cent thought they had no way of influncing company decisions at present and this included 27 per cent of senior professional staff and over half of all other grades.

This was remarkable in view of the responses of the chief executives, who believed consultation was extensive in their firms.

Over 80 per cent said their firms consulted employees before taking decisions on changes in working conditions, and 70 per cent before altering production and work methods. Nine out of 10 compaines employing 2,000 plus said they

included collective bargaining with unions, works councils, participation a agreements—8 per cent and less formal consultation arrangements giving workers rights to be consulted 59 per cent. Four per cent had employee representatives on the board, but only a third of the companies responding favoured workers on the board. When they did, they prepferred a voluntary system, and representation on a unitary board.

However, the CBI warned companies not to assume that their shop floors will not want board level representation in future just becuause they do not want it now.

14-Point Programme set to Expand on the job Protection of Workers

Los Angeles—Both the federal government and the labour movement must make added efforts to achieve the protection workers need from occupational injury and health hazards, the convention declared.

Although improvements have been made in federal enforcement and administration of job safety this year, the convention noted, much more remains to be done to meet the full intent of the 1970 law.

A 14-Point resolution spelled out labour's commitment and goals in making workplaces safer, including the creation of an "institute or other appropriate structure within the AFL-CIO as a permanent means of more adequately meeting our responsibilities to protect the safety and health of workers."

It also pledged with the co-operation of AFL-CIO affiliates to expand union training and education programmes aimed at curbing occupational hazards.

The federation will continue to press for needed appropriations in Congress for the safety, health and environmental programmes under the Departments of Labour and Health, Education and Welfare and the Environmental Protection Agency, the resolution stressed.

A vital step in achieving the goals of a national safety programme is the expansion of enforcement authority for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, the convention said. This includes federal preemption in the promulgation and enforcement of OSHA standards in all states.

It called for OSHA coverage to be extended to all federal, state and local Government workers who are now excluded. A federal funding and staffing commitment will be essential in meeting this end, the resolution noted.

The convention also called for:

States operating under the OSHA federal programme to enact legislation and to provide needed resources in extending coverage to public employees.

Workers and their unions to have the right to contest OSHA citations, a right now limited to employers, and to give them equal status with employers in contesting citations before the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission.

Amending the federal safety law to assure that workers are not docked for

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Retention of wage rates and all benefits for workers transferred to another job because medical examinations indicate their health is threatened by continued exposure to toxic substances. This protection should be incorporated into all OSHA standards.

Federal legislation placing job safety authority under the Labour Department for railroad workers and employees of federal contractors working on projects for the Energy Research and Development Administration and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Extending OSHA jurisdiction to petroleum resource development on the Outer Continental Shelf.

Upgrading the HEW's National Institute for Occuipatonal Safety and Health, including the expansion of its programmes, facilities and staff.

Broadening OSHA's capabilities in the development of new standards and lessening its dependence on outside sources.

Denial of federal contracts to employers who fail to provide adequate safety and health programmes under the Walsh-Healey Act.

The convention also urged Labor Sec. Ray Marshall and Assistant Labour Sec. Eula Bingham to improve enforcement by:

Withdrawing state OSHA plans that have failed to match the protections provided in the federal programme and to re-evaluate all phases of existing state plans.

Speeding up the processing of complaints of workers who have been victims of discrimination by their employers for exercising their OSHA rights.

Expanding safety training programms for workers, upgrading compliance officers and improving coordination between OSHA and NIOSH.

Accelerating the development of occupational health standards without downgrading safety regulations.

Seniority Protected In Maternity Leaves

The Supreme Court ruled unanimously that a working woman cannot be deprived of her accumulated seniority if she takes a maternity leave.

At the same time a court majority reaffirmed its 1976 stand that employers need not provide sick leave pay to pregnant women even if the employer has a company plan providing coverage for other types of disabilities and injuries.

Justice William Rehnquist, speaking on behalf of the majority, wrote that an employer may not deprive a female worker of her seniority when she returns to work after having a baby. In such a case, he said, the employer "has not merely refused to extend to women a benefit that men cannot and do not receive, but has imposed on women a substantial burden that men need not suffer."

The court's position was that, because only women can become pregnant and be required to take maternity leave, depriving women of seniority in this instance is a case of sex discrimination prohibited under the Civil Rights Act

On the other hand, the court majority said, refusing sick leave pay to pregnant women is not sex discrimination. This is because an employer acting in this manner is only withholding a benefit from women that men do not receive

The AFL:-CIO and the Auto Workers jointly field a brief in June supporting the court's ultimate decision on the seniority question. In part the brief argued that more than mere temporary disability benefits were at issue in the case since loss of seniority was a permanent bar to promotions and increased the possibility of layoffs long after the maternity leave was over.

The reasoning behind the court's ruling would appear to rule out practices similar to denying seniority because of pregnancy, such as firing women for becoming pregnant, and refusing to hire, promote or grant women certain tenure rights for the same reason.

The court's position on sick leave benefits would be nullified if the House passes a labourbacked bill that would require employers to include pregnancy benefits in their workers' disability plans. The Senate passed the legislation by a 75-11 vote in September.

Splitting a fine hair between the two issues of seniority and maternity benefits, Justice John Paul Stevens wrote "Although some discrimination against pregnancy—as compared with other disabilities —its permissible, discrimination against pregnant or formerly pregnant employees is not."

Manpower Training in Sweden

Manpower training forms an important part of the selective labour market policy that began to take shape in the 1950s, with Gosta Rehn and Rudolf Meidner among the architects, and which has underlined labour market policy both in Sweden and other countries. Manpower training is also considered to be an employment-creating measure. By any logical criterion, it is better for people to use a period of unemployment to upgrade their skills through training than to sit around doing nothing.

Extent of Programme

Each year over 1,00,000 people in Sweden are enrolled in the public manpower training programmes (AMU, Arnets Marknads Utbilding). The programme has a twofold aim: to provide vocational training that will help unemployed persons find work; and to meet the need of firms or companies for trained manpower. It is of nearly the same extent in times of boom or recession. In February 1977, however, the highest number of AMU participants was recorded so far for any one month-no less than 60,000.

What is AMU?

Manpower training is mainly organised in the form of special courses given at separate schools known as AMU centres. There are some 50 such centres in Sweden, with more than 300 courses from which to choose. Most of them are vocationally oriented throughout and may either be basic courses supple-

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The basic rule says that a person must be at least 20 years old, but in recent years more and more unemployed teenagers have been enabled to participate in manpower training. A necessary condition is for the employment service to judge that the training will make it easier for the applicant to land a steady job. One exception from the rules is made for the "bottleneck skills," i.e. trades where manpower is in short supply. Eligibility for such training is extended to persons who already have jobs.

Training Allowances

No charge is made for the training and the participants receive training allowances. The amount of the allowance is geared to previous income. A smaller stimulation allowance is added. In addition, allowances twoards travelling and subsistence expenses are payable for courses taken outside the home town. The allowance, which is taxable and pensionable, is paid out through the local social insurance office. Responsibility for training at AMU centers is vested in the National Board of Education, which also oversees vocational training in the ordinary school. The courses are planned in close cooperation with the National Labour Market Board (AMS), trade unions and employer associations. Every AMU center is also staffed by employment counselors who help the course participants find jobs after completion of training.

A Profile of the Course Participants

Around half the course participants are women. Some of them are about to enter the labour market after several years of home-making. About one-fourth of the participants have applied for training owing to some form of work handicap. The participants include a fairly large proportion of immigrant who are given the opportunity to study Swedish before they take vocational training. At the largest AMU center in Stockholm, 60 different nationalities are customarily represented at the same time.

Training—and then....

Around 20 per cent interupt the training they have started to take. Of those who completed a vocational training course in 1974-75 (the last year of follow-up), 88 per cent landed jobs within three months after finishing the course. This calculation includes all forms of manpower training. In—plant training, i.e. training conducted on the premises of industrial firms, forms a growing part of the manpower training programme. This means that the state or central government gives grants to these firms for their training. The persons to be trained must be employees of the firm and thus enjoy contractual benefits.

Instead of Layoffs

Training grants intended to prevent layoffs or dismissal take on special interest when economic activity is at a low level. This grant was sharply raised for a time in spring 1977, when a great many firms gave notice of short-term layoffs. The grant was then set at Skr 25 per hour for at most 160 hours pe person, which in very round figures can be said to represent the average wag of a fact ory worker. The training must be approved by the local trade unions.

as an instrument of regional development policy. Experiments with sex quotas are in force, which means that at least 40 per cent of the new hires must be women and at least 40 per cent must be men. This rule holds for all branches of economic activity. The intention is to bring about a more equitable distribution of the sexes within the firms. So in order to qualify for assistance under regional policy a firm must plan for a more even sex distribution.

The costs of manpower training are currently estimated at about Skr 2,000 million per year, of which approximately one-fifth consists of training costs alone and the rest of allowances to course participants and grants to firms. The training programme is financed out of the government budget and through a special charge levied non employers.


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
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
