The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for working Class for the month of October 1979 with the average prices for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 365, 376 and 362 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Pune and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for working class for the month of October 1979 with average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 358, 391, 343 and 396 respectively.

All India average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workings

All India Average Consumer Price Index Number for Industrial Workers (General) on base 1960=100 for October 1979 was 365 as compared to 363 in September 1979. The Index Number for October 1979 on base 1949=100 desired from 1960 based index worked out to 444 as against 441 for September 1979.

Industrial Disputes in Maharashtra State

During September 1979 there were 31 disputes involving 13,870 workmen and time loss of 13,269 working days as compared to 17 disputes in August 1979, involving 4,472 workmen and time loss of 36,723 mandays. Further particulars of Industrial Disputes are given at pages 324 and 325 of this issue.

Benefits under E. S. I. Scheme

During the month of October 1979, 13,286 Insured persons received Rs. 29,19,890.91 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 4,455 persons who were in receipt of Pensions for Permanent Disablement and 1,837 persons who were in receipt of Dependant Benefit as dependant's deceased Insured Persons. During the month 10,092 accidents were reported as against 10,383 during the preceding month.

Current Notes

Sixth Plan Envisages 50 Million Jobs

The final draft Sixth Plan visualises provision of 50 million jobs mostly in rural areas, according to the Planning Commission Member, Shri J. D. Sethi.

He said of the 50 million man-years (job) envisaged, two thirds would be in rural areas.

He told newsmen here that the final draft Plan, scheduled to be published by the end of next month, would have a public sector outlay of Rs. 77,000 crores and private sector investment of Rs. 35,000 crores making a total outlay exceeding Rs. 1,00,000 crores.

He said the Plan envisaged an average annual growth rate of 4.7 per cent and a little over five per cent at the end of the plan period at 1978-79 prices.

Dr. Sethi said the draft Plan laid greater emphasis on rural sector with an allocation of 43 per cent against 30 per cent to the previous Plan.

He said priority would be accorded for rural water supply for which Rs. 1,500 crores had been set apart, twice as much as the allocation in all the previous plans put together.

The main thrust would be the minimum needs programme which would correct the imbalance in investments made in urban and rural development.

Dr. Sethi said it was not correct to say that the Planning Commission had been functioning as a super-cabinet.

India unable to Stop Child Labour

Though India piloted the resolution banning child labour at the Geneva Convention of the International Labour Organisation (ILO), the Government now admits that it is in no position to put an end to child labour in the country.

The ILO Convention stipulates that children under 14 should not be employed in public or private agricultural undertaking.

At a committee of conventions held here recently a Government spokesman admitted that many children in rural areas drop out of school at an early age to help in farming. The representative said that, considering the socio-economic conditions prevailing in the country, it was not practicable to implement the convention.

The minimum age under the Convention for industrial workers is 15. India ratified it in 1955. It is applicable to mines and quarries, manufacturing industries, transport and construction works.

For India, the convention lowered the age limit down to 12.

In the case of non-industrial undertakings like shops, the minimum age under State Acts varies between 12 to 15. The Centre's stand is that, since the matter is left with the States' it can do very little about it.

Realising its inability to tackle the situation, the Government has now set up a National Committee for Child Labour. The Committee will examine the adequacy of existing laws and suggest corrective action to be taken.

The committee has been asked to prescribe a uniform, minimum age for employment of children under all acts. It will also identify hazardous occupations and ban employment of children in such occupations. It will recommend laws, rules, regulations, acts and legislations for protecting children in employment and progressive elimination of child labour.

An official spokesman said the Government is keen on the progressive elimination of child labour. But he cautioned that in a country like India distinctions had to be made in case of "unpaid family workers".

Productivity-Linked Bonus for Railwaymen

The Union Government announced on November 13, 1979, productivity linked bonus for over 17 lakh railwaymen with effect from the current financial year. This brings to an end the protracted negotiations on the knotty bonus issue which had evaded solution for so long. The railwaymen will straightaway get an *ad-hoc* payment equal to 15 days wages before March next. This will cost the exchequer about Rs. 35 crores.

The incentive payment will be linked to productivity with the base year 1977-78 when 1,59,996 million traffic units were carried by the railways. For future, the overall productivity will be measured in terms of railway productivity indices like revenues net tonne kilometres achieved each year. However, greater weightage will be given to the goods traffic.

Both the recognised unions—All India Railwaymen's Federation and the National Federation of Indian Railwaymen have accepted the scheme of productivity-linked bonus in lieu of payment of bonus under the Payment of Bonus Act, 1965 or payment of *ex-gratia* amounts as prevalent in the sector "excluded" from the purview of this Act.

The scheme requires that additional payments linked with higher productivity achieved over the base year would be made if the achievement exceeds the base year performance. However, if the performance goes below 90 per cent of that of the base year, no payment will be made. The first payment of the productivity-linked bonus will be made for the performance of 1979-80 sometime after October 1980 when the figures for the year would be available.

The settlement entitles railwaymen to be 'paid production-linked bonus equivalent to 25 days' wages with the base year 1977-78. It provides for a provision of additional payments for higher performance. With the projected traffic over the coming years, the annual bonus payable may be upto 40 days' wages. The first payment of the productivity-linked bonus, to be made by October 1980, is expected to cost Rs. 62 crores. Even the casual labour totalling 2.42 lakh would be entitled to the bonus along with 15 lakh regular railway employees. The inclusion of 67,000 railway protection force personnel was under Government consideration. The ceiling of salary for payment of the bonus has yet to be fixed. The ceiling under the Bonus Act which is not linked to productivity is Rs. 1,600 per month.

The ad-hoc payment of 15 days' wages which was being given as an earnest of accepting the productivity-linked bonus, was not linked to productivity and would not be recovered when the bonus for the year is to be calculated. Everybody connected with the running of the railway system would be covered.

Ad-Hoc Payment of 15 day Wages Mooted

Bonus For Defence, P & T Staff

The Government of India—in an attempt to soften the feelings of the employees of Defence (Civilian) and P & T has decided to give an ad-hoc payment of 15 days wages in lieu of bonus this year just as on the lines prescribed for the railwaymen.

It is learnt that a scheme of productivity linked bonus benefiting all the eligible employees of P & T and Ordnance factories in the country is on the anvil.

This was stated here by the concerned ministers on November 16.

The modalities of the scheme will be only determined on the outcome of talks to be held with the representative of the employees.

The talks are likely to be held in the first week of December.

Meanwhile, the Union Government has asked the defence civilian workers' organisations, including also those working in ordnance factories, and the P. & T employees unions to submit their respective proposals with a view to working out modalities for a productivity linked bonus.

It is stated that about seven lakh employees of P & T will be benefited if this productivity linked type of bonus is extended to all categories of staff, extra departmental employees and casual labourers. Departmental employees alone number about five lakhs.

The Government's effort is now to find out a suitable base year in both the departments similar to the base year of 1977-78 in the formula already prescribed for the railway worker's, so that from 1979-80 onwards productivity can be pegged to the base year for the computation of bonus.

For this purpose, the Government has constituted a high-level committee of secretaries to prob into this matter and submit their report by the end of this month so as to pave the way for a talk with TU leaders in the beginning of next month.

There has been two separate press announcements by the two ministries concerned in which they have assured their employees that the underlying main objective of the said scheme is to achieve and improve upon higher productivity just as has been decided for railwaymen of late.

It is hoped that the Government will be able to evolve soon such a scheme which would improve the performance on similar line.

Such a decision was highly welcomed by the federations and they have further decided to call off their proposed strike threats so as to make a smooth sail for the ensuing dialogue to be held here between representatives of worker's organisations and the Government in early December.

The INTUC, General Secretary, Shri G. Ramanujam, in a statement has heartily welcomed the decision of the Union Government and expressed his happiness that at last the concept of bonus had been conceded.

Shri Ramanujam said that the claim for bonus by the employees of the ordnance factories under the ministry of defence as well as the employees of P & T also rests on an equal footing.

He further hoped that the Government of India would extend the right to bonus to these workers also based on some formula which would be mutually acceptable.

Shri Ramanujam recalled the decision to link bonus to production/productivity which could also be covered by the Payment of Bonus Act, 1965, as the said Act provides for bonus linked to productivity in lieu of profit sharing bonus.

The General Secretary of the Indian National Defence Workers' Federation (INTUC), Shri R. N. Pathak, said that all the defence civilian workers in the country cannot be denied their legitimate right for bonus, while giving the same to others.

Shri Pathak welcomed the decision and hoped that Government would soon reach to an amicable settlement on the score and announce an ad-hoc relief to nearly five lakh workers.

Pay rise for TN Electricity Workers

Employees of the Tamilnadu Electricity Board will get increased wages from next month as a result of the agreement signed by the worker's representatives and the management. The INTUC affiliated Tamilnadu National Electricity Workers Union represented the workers.

In a press statement, Shri S. Thandavarayan, President of the Union, said that the INTUC Demand for a socialistic wage revision beneficial to all workmen had been accepted by the Board. The management conceded

the maximum benefit of fitment for workers above 25 years of service as Rs. 80. Workmen will get additional DA at the rate of Rs. 1.30 per point above 340 points. New HRA and CCA will be on par with state Government rates.

Shri Thandavarayan stated that this was the first time in the history of the state electricity workers to have a revision settlement before the due date. The new agreement will be in force till December 1, 1984.

Benefits of Collective Bargaining to U.S. Workers during 1978

Fringe benefits improved significantly as a result of 1978 collective bargaining efforts. One area that received particular emphasis was improved pensions for future retirees. In an attempt to limit the number of years a union member must work in order to receive a pension, more unions are negotiating "30 years and out" clauses.

The length of the work year was reduced by several contractual agreements made in 1978. These gains not only offer the union members more leisure time, they also tend to reduce the unemployment rate by spreading the work load.

The work year was also shortened in 1978 through improved vacation eligibility and duration. The International Brotherhood of Electrical workers (IBEW) secured three weeks of vacation after five years of service with Collins Radio in Iowa; Graphic Arts (GAIU) members have four vacation weeks after seven years of service in Minneapolis-St. Paul; the steelworkers have five weeks of vacation after 16 years of service with the Outboard Marine of Milwaukee; the Retail Clerks have six weeks of vacation after 25 years with Thorofare Markets in Pennsylvania and West Virginia; and the Paperworkers have seven weeks of vacation after 30 years with American Can in Wisconsin.

Total paid holidays have also increased for many unions members as a result of the 1978 collective bargaining rounds. The Rubber Workers' contract with Geneva Rubber of Geneva, Ohio, the Retail Clerks' agreements with New Jersey and New York supermarkets and the Steelworkers' contract at Rexnord, Inc., of Milwaukee each provides 14 holidays annually. The Mine Workers expanded their holiday schedule in Bituminous coal with a plan that provides four paid floating days after one year of service; one more after six years and so on to a maximum of 13 paid days after 18 years of service. This is in addition to the regular holiday schedule.

Provisions for funeral leave were also liberalized by some agreements negotiated in 1978. The Paperworkers' contract with Champion International in North Carolina now grants five days of paid leave for the death of a spouse or children, an increase of two days. The woodworkers' contract with Bois Cascade in Minnesota extends funeral leave coverage to grand-children, grand-parents and brothers or sisters-in-law. In one of their Chicago contracts, the Machinists extended coverage to all in-laws.

Under other 1978 agreements, workers who do not use leave time can get paid for it if their attendance record is in good standing.

Income working conditions and job protection provisions were also areas of 1978 collective bargaining advances. At Northwest Airlines, the Air Line Pilots won guaranteed pay for all monthly scheduled flights, regardless of cancellations, and full pay while in transit from one airport to another to take an assigned flight. The Teachers in Los Angeles have succeeded in limiting their classroom size to 27 pupils in grades four through eight.

The depth and breadth of health care was also expanded significantly during 1978 negotiation rounds. Contracts negotiated by the Bakery Workers contained prepaid drug plans which cover all prescription drugs.

Educational and training benefits for union members were also established under 1978 contracts. For New York City building employees, SEIU initiated a safety training programme funded by an employer contribution of \$ 10 per employee per year. A related advancement was the creation of a Farm Workers, education fund financed by 5 cents per hour per employee from Delano growers. Titled the Martin Luther King Jr. Farm Workers' Fund, this benefit is intended to help workers overcome language and cultural barriers in obtaining medical and retirement care, preparing income tax or disability and social security forms and tutoring for school aged children. Prepaid legal services were features of such contracts as a Retail Clerk's agreement with New Jersey supermarkets, where the plan is financed by an employer contribution of \$ 5 per month per employee. The fund also covers dependents.

Voluntary payroll deductions for political contributions have been subject to a major effort by organised labour since 1976 election law amendments first made such checkoffs possible. Such a system was bargained in 1978 in the railroad industry. Contributions are deducted on a monthly basis, with the amount and periodic renewal remaining a choice of the individual worker.

The bargaining provisions described here represent some of the notable advances during 1978 bargaining, with contracts covering 1,000 or more workers receiving the major emphasis. Other significant advancements were made in smaller units-reflecting the needs and desires of workers in a particular location or industry. Indeed, some of the gains by smaller units are neither feasible nor accessible to larger bargaining units.

Important Role for Women in East Germany

Women in the German Democratic Republic can now look back on three decades of equal rights with men. The first GDR constitution which came into force in 1949, enshrined equal rights for men and women. Equal pay for equal work, the right to equal education, holidays and recreation and not lastly stipulations enabling women to take an equal part in political and social life were the first legal stipulations facilitating their emancipation in the years to come against a host of traditional prejudices.

What was laid down in the constitution was legalised and perfected in 1950 when a law on mother and child welfare and on rights of women was enacted. It provided, for example, for payment of maternity benefits and for setting up kinder grants and day nurseries or creches. Women's rights were further extended by laws and regulations passed later and by family and labour codes which became effective in 1966 and 1978, respectively. They provided for the creation of conditions enabling women to take full use of their equal rights.

Women accounted for the majority of the people of working age in East Germany at the end of World War II in 1945. Hundreds of thousands of them took part in reconstruction and in materialising democratic changes. Million of women whose husbands had fallen or were prisoners of war were compelled to enter professional life to keep their families.

As equality for women became more and more reality and their educational and living standards improved, more and more women found satisfaction in their jobs. About 87 per cent of GDR women are today gainfully employed. Two-thirds of the women working in the state-owned economy are skilled workers or have graduated from institutions of higher education. Women occupy key industrial, agricultural, cultural or intellectual positions. More than a third of the elected deputies as well as one in four mayors and one in two judges are women. Over 25 per cent of GDR schools have women principals.

Every woman in the GDR gets 26 weeks paid maternity leave. Abortions come under the comprehensive medical insurance system they are free of charge and paid sick-leave is granted for as long as the doctor thinks necessary. It is the woman and only the woman who decides whether she wants to have the baby or an abortion.

Gist of Important Notifications Under Labour Laws

(A) Bombay Electric (Special Powers) Act, 1946 and Factories Act, 1948

I. DURATION OF THE WEEK

Chief Inspector of Factories, under powers vested under section 2(f) of the Factories Act, 1948, approve in writing, as follows :—

“ All the consumers specified in column 2 of the Schedule I appended to the Maharashtra Electrical Energy (Regulation of Distribution, Supply, Consumption or Use) Order, 1972, which are factories within the meaning of sections 2(m) and/or 85 of the Factories Act, 1948, located in the different areas of the State of Maharashtra shall observe a “ Week ” as meaning a period of seven days beginning at midnight on the days previous to the days specified against them in column 4 of the said Schedule (as amended or which may be amended in future) of the said Order ”.

This approval shall come into force immediately, and shall remain in force until further orders.

(B) Indian Boilers Act, 1923

I. EXEMPTIONS OF BOILER UNDER THE ACT

(a) Government of Maharashtra hereby exempts the boiler bearing No. MP/2504 and belonging to the Maharashtra State Electricity Board, Ballarshah Power Station, Ballarshah, from the operation of clause (c) of section 6 of the said Act, for the period of three months from the 21st September 1979 to 20th December 1979 (both days inclusive).

(Notification No. IBA. 1079/CR.2960/Lab-5, dated 14th September 1979, published in *M. G. G.*, Part I-L, dated 4th October 1979, page No. 5261).

(b) Government of Maharashtra hereby exempts the boiler bearing No. MR-9595 and belonging to the Maharashtra State Electricity Board, Nashik Thermal Power Station, P. O. Eklahare viz. Nashik Road, from the operation of clause (c) of section 6 of the said Act, for the period of three months from the 24th September 1979 to 23rd December 1979 (both days inclusive).

(Notification No. IBA. 1079/CR.2959/Lab-5, dated 14th September 1979, published in *M. G. G.*, Part I-L, dated 4th October 1979, page No. 5261).

(c) Government of Maharashtra hereby exempts the Economiser Registry No. MR/E-356 and belonging to Messrs. Hindustan Antibiotics Ltd., Pimpri, Pune 411 018 from the operation of clause (c) of section 6 of the said Act, for the period of one month from the 29th August 1979 to 28th September 1979 (both days inclusive).

(d) Government of Maharashtra hereby exempts the boiler bearing No. MR-767 and belonging to the Co-operative Oil Industries Ltd. (in liquidation), Latur, Nanded Road, Latur, District Osmanabad, from the operation of clause (c) of section 6 of the said Act, for the period of two months from the 21st September 1979 to 20th November 1979 (both days inclusive).

(C) Industrial Disputes Act, 1947**I. CORRIGENDUM**

(a) In exercise of the powers conferred on the Deputy Commissioner of Labour, Thane, vide Government Notification, Industries, Energy and Labour Department, No. IDA. 1379/3496(i)/Lab-9, dated 20th April 1979, the following Corrigendum is issued :—

In para. 2 of the Order of even number, dated 2nd June 1978, issued by the Deputy Commissioner of Labour (Administration), Bombay, for the words "Industrial Tube (India) Mfg. Co. Pvt. Ltd." the following words should be substituted, viz. "Industrial Tubes Manufacturers Private Ltd."

365—A rise of 5 points

In October 1979, the Consumer Price Index Number for working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base year January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 365 being 5 points higher than that in the preceeding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Bombay Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 5 points to 391 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, jowar, grinding charges, goat-meat, eggs green chillies, onion, garlic, and a rise in the sub-group index number for vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased by 7 points to 389 due to a rise in the average prices of supari, pan-ready made and chewing tobacco.

The index number for the fuel and light group decreased by 3 points to 470 due to a fall in the average price of kerosene oil.

The index number for housing remained steady at 158 being a six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing bedding and footwear group increased by 7 points to 378 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti, saree, shirting, gents shoes and ladies chappal.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 5 points to 296 due to a rise in the average prices of ex. book, durrie, laundry charges and washing soap.

The index number for the Pan Supari tobacco etc. decrease by 2 points to 348 due to a fall in the average price of pan leaf only.

The index number for the fuel and light group decrease by 3 points to 438 due to a fall in the average price of kerosene only.

The index number for the clothing bedding and footwear group and housing remains steady at 403 and 207.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increase by 7 points to 290 due to a rise in the average prices of bus fare, toilet soap, ornaments washing soap and tailoring charges.

In October 1979, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Aurangabad Centre, with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 396 being 6 points higher than that in the preceeding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Aurangabad Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 9 points to 434 due to a rise in the average prices of wheat, jowar, mutton, zinga, salt and dry chillies.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 6 points to 463 due to a rise in the average price of firewood.

The index number for housing remained steady at 272 being the six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 3 points to 358 due to a rise in the prices of shoes.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 2 points to 296 due to a rise in the price of sunlight.

In October 1979, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the Pune Centre with base year, January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 443 being 6 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Pune Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 7 points to 377 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, wheat, jowar, eggs, dry chillies and onions.

The index number for the fuel and light group decreased by 3 points to 452 due to fall in the average price of kerosene.

The index number for housing remained steady at 130 being a six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 3 points to 369 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti, saree, cloth for trousers and long cloth.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 12 points to 270 due to a rise in the average prices of pan-leaf, utensils, brass, toilet soap, tooth powder and blades.

BENEFITS UNDER THE EMPLOYEES' STATE INSURANCE SCHEME—REVIEW FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER 1979

The Employees' State Insurance Scheme applies to 26 Centres in the State of Maharashtra and provides protection to 15,45,742 workers in the event of employment Injury, Sickness and Maternity. This protection is made available in two ways, namely by provision of medical care and cash benefits where needed. During the month of October 1979, 13,286 Insured Persons received Rs. 29,19,890.91 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 4,455 persons who were in receipt of Pensions for Permanent Disablement and 1,837 persons who were in receipt of Dependant Benefit as dependants of deceased Insured Persons. During the month 10,092 accidents were reported as against 10,383 during the preceding month.

Comparatively, fewer persons need the employment injury benefits but a fairly large number need Cash Benefit in the event of Sickness. During October 1979, 93,771 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 71,80,871.75 was paid out as Sickness Benefit. During the preceding month 1,10,912 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 84,08,081.35 was disbursed as Sickness Benefit.

Some Insured Persons suffering from T. B., Mental, Malignant, other long term diseases etc., require more attention and they are being paid additional benefit called Extended Sickness Benefit. During the month an amount of Rs. 7,07,394.30 was paid towards this benefit.

During the month, 321 Insured Women workers claimed Rs. 4,47,396.00 by way of Maternity Benefit. The attendance at the dispensaries as per certificates received was 3,05,483 during the month.

During the month Funeral Benefit in 163 cases amounting to Rs. 16,297.00 was paid.

During the month Confinement charges in respect of wives of Insured Persons amounting to Rs. 71,940.00 were paid.

During the month an amount of Rs. 18,144.00 was paid as Enhanced Sickness Benefit to 134 Insured Persons who had gone under sterilisation operation under Family Planning.

For recovery of arrears of Contribution under the Scheme, Legal proceedings had to be initiated in 25 cases against defaulting employers.
