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The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index for working class

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Number for working class for the month of July 1981, with Average Prices for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 459, 490, 459 respectively. The Pune, Jalgaon, Nanded and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Number for working class for the month of July 1981, with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 428, 467, 524, 495 respectively.

All India Average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers

All India Average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers (General) base 1960 = 100 for July 1981 was 447 as compared to 439 in June 1981. The Index Numbers for July 1981 on Base 1949 = 100 derived from 1960 based Index worked out to 543 as against 534 for June 1981.

Industrial Disputes in Maharashtra State

During the month of June 1981, there were 78 disputes involving 37,547 workmen and time lost of 2,22,624 working days as compared to 44 disputes in May 1981, involving 7,168 workmen and time loss of 1,03,007 mandays.

Further particulars of Industrial Disputes are given at pages 109 and 110 of this issue.

Benefits under the Employees State Insurance Scheme

During the month of July 1981, 22,544 Insured persons received Rs. 51,03,547.54 as cash Benefits due to Employment Injuries. This includes 5,684 persons who were in receipt of Pension for Permanent Disablement Benefit and 2,152 persons who were in receipt of Dependents Benefits as dependents of deceased Insured Persons. During the month 13,150 accidents were reported against 13,550 during the preceding month.

Current Notes

Gratuity Fund for Workers

The two-day State Labour Ministers' Conference which ended on August 5, 1981, has suggested the setting up of a gratuity fund on the lines of the employees' provident fund. The suggestion, to be examined by a working group, was made since it was felt that workers did not get the gratuity dues easily. If employers could be asked to remit a fixed amount periodically, as they did in the case of provident fund, this would help the workers. Another working group would study the details of a proposal for unemployment insurance for workers rendered idle as a result of sudden closure of an establishment or the unit going sick. The intention was that the insurance could help the workers to be paid during the interim period up to a maximum of one year, when the unit either remains closed or until it restarts or until they found alternative employment, whichever is earlier.

Labour Courts in all Districts

The study group appointed by the Government of Maharashtra under the chairmanship of Mr. H. H. Kantharia of the Industrial Tribunal has suggested an increase in the number of judges and the setting up of labour courts at all district levels and also industrial courts at the headquarters of every revenue division in Maharashtra. The study group was appointed to look into the feasibility of reducing the delays in labour and industrial disputes.

Ordinance to curb Indiscipline—Ban on strikes in Essential Services

Summary Trial, Arrest without Warrant for Offenders

The Central Government in a determined bid to put down indiscipline and wild-cat strikes and improve the industrial climate assumed drastic powers on July 27 under a Presidential ordinance to prohibit strikes in a wide range of essential services and to dismiss, arrest without warrant and summarily try strikers and organisers of strikes.

The ordinance signed by the President around midnight after a Cabinet meeting provides for punishing strikers with a maximum of six months' imprisonment and Rs. 1,000 fine.

The punishment provided for organisers of a strike declared illegal is a minimum of one year's imprisonment and Rs. 2,000 fine. The same punishment is provided for any one giving financial aid to strikes declared illegal.

The measure has been by and large welcomed as one aimed at irresponsible forces creating unwarranted industrial unrest and holding the country to ransom.

The President, Shri N. Sanjiva Reddy, simply said in his proclamation that he is satisfied that 'circumstances exist' requiring immediate action to maintain essential services and normal life of the community.

The 'essential services' in which strikes can be declared illegal by the Government range from telecommunication, rail, road and air services, ports, defence establishments, Food Corporation of India, banks and oil refineries to hospitals and public conservancy services in areas controlled by the Centre.

The ordinance essentially covers services over which the Central Government has control and extends to the entire territory of India barring Jammu and Kashmir.

The ordinance makes special provision for banning strikes in the 'essential services' in Assam over which the State Government, now being run from the Centre, has control. Particular mention is made of State Government and Legislative Assembly Secretariat staff.

The Central Government, in addition, can prohibit strikes in 'any section of any industrial undertaking,' which is declared a scheduled industry under the industries (development and regulation) Act, provided the work of that section is essential for the safety of that unit and its employees.

The Government proposes to replace the ordinance by a bill in the monsoon session of Parliament commencing on August 17, it is proposed that it should be valid for three years.

The ordinance, virtually amounts to the revival of the Maintenance of Essential Services Act of 1968 which was in force for three years.

The present measure in addition, incorporates certain provisions of a new law enacted for Assam last year for the Maintenance of Essential Services in the State.

The ordinance was signed by the President on the eve of his departure for London.

Specified as 'essential services' are railways, posts and telegraphs, telephones, ports, aerodromes, airports, banking, production and refining of petroleum, supply and distribution of petroleum and petroleum products, public conservancy and sanitation, hospitals under the Central Government and defence undertakings.

The Presidential ordinance was made public in the morning although it was strongly rumoured that such a move to assume powers to ban strikes in essential services had been under consideration for sometime as part of the package of measures to tackle the economic situation.

Government's earlier moves to impound part of additional dearness allowance and limit declaration of dividends were deferred when the first set of measures was announced on July 10 and 11 these mainly related to revision of petroleum product and in the bank rate, higher rate of compulsory deposit for incomes above Rs. 50,000 and amendment of the Income Tax Act to curb black money and ostentations living.

The ordinance, according to a Home Ministry press note, also empowers the Central Government to declare any service connected with matters with respect to which Parliament has power to make laws, an essential service.

The ordinance defines what amounts to a strike. The Central Government is empowered under the ordinance to issue an order prohibiting strikes in any essential service. Such an order will be valid for six months, but may be extended further for another period not exceeding six months.

Provision has been made for punishment with imprisonment or fine of persons commencing or remaining on or otherwise taking part in any illegal strike. Besides this, the offender is also made liable for disciplinary action including dismissal.

Incitement instigation of persons who resort to illegal strike, have also been made punishable and liable for disciplinary action.

Offences under the ordinance are cognisable.

The offences under the ordinance are triable summarily.

A bill will be introduced in ensuing session of Parliament to replace the ordinance, the press note adds. The duration of the Act which will replace the ordinance will be three years.

ESI Scheme for Seasonal Workers Soon

The Centre is considering extension of the Employees State Insurance (ESI) scheme to seasonal factories, now excluded from its purview.

This was stated by Planning and Labour Minister Narian Dutt Tiwari, while inaugurating a ESI hospital at Naini, on July 31.

The extension would especially cover the sugar factories, he added.

The Naini hospital is the 75th ESI hospital in the country. With this the ESI hospitals have more than 16,000 beds.

The ESI scheme started in 1952 now covers nearly six million employees. The total number of beneficiaries come to about 27 million. Shri Tiwari said.

Shri Tiwari said with the opening of the Naini hospital the number of beds available in ESI hospitals in Uttar Pradesh would be around 900.

There was a proposal to extend the ESI scheme to Dalla, Khamaria, Obra, Harduagang, Haldwani and Kathgodam to cover 12,000 workers in these areas, he added.

The ESI Corporation has agreed in principle to provide its own building to house the hospitals in Uttar Pradesh, Shri Tiwari said.

Government Plan to Enforce 'Discipline'

The Government has decided to utilise the climate created by the promulgation of the Essential Services Maintenance Ordinance to impose 'strict discipline' among the employees of the public sector banks and public financial institutions like the Life Insurance Corporation (LIC) and the General Insurance Corporation (GIC), it is learnt.

The Government has already instructed the managements of these institutions not to permit any trade union activity during office hours.

Several bank and insurance company managers have been complaining that trade union work by employees during office hours had been not only hampering normal working of banks but was also affecting customer service.

The Government has also given the green signal to the managements of the banks and the insurance companies to cut down overtime payments drastically. For the last several years overtime payments in these institutions were running to several crores.

Deputy Minister for Finance, Maganbhai Barot, who held series of meeting with the heads of the nationalised banks and the insurance companies at Bombay last week-end, is understood to have assured the managements the full support of the Government in enforcing discipline and improving customer service in these institutions.

During the discussion the managers have reported that a new climate for taking strict measures have been created as a result of the ordinance.

Shri Barot is understood to have impressed upon the managements the urgent necessity to cut down overtime.

He said over the years overtime payments had become almost a 'right' like wage increases or payment of dearness allowance.

Tiwari Hints Act Changes In ESI Act

A Bill to amend Employees State Insurance Act is likely to be introduced in Parliament by the end of the current year, Union Minister for Labour and Industries N. D. Tiwari said here on August 22.

Shri Tiwari who was inaugurating a new ESI hospital at Sarojini Nagar said the amending bill would include provision of cash benefit for those suffering disability during employment accidents.

Shri Tiwari said the Employees State Insurance Corporation has decided in principle to include the workers employed by sugar mills under the purview of its functioning.

The Union Minister regretted that in many cases the ESI facilities were misused by workers sometimes in connivance with the doctors.

The ESI scheme was a co-operative endeavour of several parties, employees, workers, medical profession and the Government and it is necessary for all to ensure that the funds are not misused, he added.

Shri Tiwari said at present over two crore dependents of 72 lakh workers were covered under the ESI scheme and the Government proposed to extend it to others.

However, he said, delay in acquisition of land many a time caused hindrance in the establishment of ESI hospital's and the State Governments should ensure that the land acquisition process for implementing Government's welfare schemes was quickened.

ESIC Scheme to be extended

The Corporation, at its meeting here on August 21, decided that state units employing one or more persons will be brought under the scheme. For beedi units, the extension will cover concerns employing 10 or more persons.

The Corporation has drawn up a plan to construct several hospitals in Uttar Pradesh.

Gist of Important Notifications on Labour Laws

I. BOMBAY INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS ACT, 1946.

Appointment of Commissioner of Labour.—Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the Powers conferred by sub-section (1) of section 4 of the Act has appointed Shri Ajit M. Nimbalkar, to be the Commissioner of Labour, for the State of Maharashtra.

II. BOMBAY RELIEF UNDERTAKINGS (SPECIAL PROVISIONS) ACT, 1958.

Declaration of the Relief Undertaking under the Act.—(a) Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act has declared that the industrial undertaking called Messrs. Kulkarni Foundries Limited, Pune to be relief undertaking, for a period of six months commencing on the 29th day of April 1981, be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief subject to the directions mentioned in the notification.

(Notification No. BRU. 1081/(1478)-Ind-5, dated 29th April 1981, published in *M.G.G.*, Part I-L, dated 2nd July 1981 Page 3428).

(b) Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act, declared that the industrial undertaking called the Phoenix Mills Limited, Bombay shall for a further period of one year commencing on 4th day of May, 1981 and ending on 3rd day of May 1982 (both days inclusive), be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief subject to the fulfilling the conditions specified in the schedule.

(c) Government of Maharashtra, in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act, declared that the industrial undertaking called "the Bradbury Mills Limited, Bombay" shall for a further period of five months commencing on the 9th day of May 1981 and ending on the 8th day of October 1981 (both days inclusive), be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief subject to fulfilling the conditions specified in the schedule.

(d) Government of Maharashtra, in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act, declared that the industrial undertaking called the Rajan (Textile) Mills Private Limited, Barsi (District Solapur) shall, for a further period of six months commencing on the 1st day of June 1981 and ending on the 30th day of November 1981 (both days inclusive), be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief subject to fulfilling the conditions specified in the schedule.

(e) Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act declared that the industrial undertaking called, "the Ogale Glass Works Limited Oglewadji (District Satara)" shall, for a further period of four months commencing on 8th day of June 1981 and ending on 7th day of October 1981 (both days inclusive), be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief, subject to the directions mentioned in notification).

III. *SHOPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1948.*

1. *Amendments to the Rules.*—The Government of Maharashtra, in exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) and clause (m) of sub-section (2) of section 67 of the Act has made following rules further to amend the Maharashtra Shops and Establishments Rules, 1981 the same having been previously published as required by sub-section (3) of the said section 67, namely :—

1. These rules may be called the Maharashtra Shops and Establishments (Amendment) Rules, 1981.

2. After rule 20 of the Maharashtra Shops and Establishments Rules, 1961, the following new rule shall be inserted, namely —

“20A. *Name board to be in Marathi.*—The name board of every establishment shall be in Marathi in Devanagari script :

Provided that, it shall be permissible for the employer to have the name-board in any other language or script (in addition to Marathi in Devanagari script) which is known to the majority of the people residing in the locality in which the establishment is situated”.

EMPLOYEES PROVIDENT FUND AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS ACT, 1952

(b) for the figures and words, "120 days within a period of six months or less" wherever they occur, the figures and words, "60 days within a period of three months or less", shall be substituted;

(c) in Explanation II of the same paragraph,—

(i) for the figures and word "120 days", the figures and word "60 days" shall be substituted;

(ii) in the first proviso of the same paragraph, for the figures "120" and the words "six months" wherever they occur, the figures "60" and the words "three months" shall respectively be substituted.

2. In sub-paragraph 3 of paragraph 80 of the said Scheme :—

(a) for the words "six months continuous service", wherever they occur, the words "three months continuous service" shall be substituted;

(b) for the figures and words, "120 days during a period of six months or less" wherever they occur, the figures and words, "60 days during a period of three months or less" shall be substituted;

(c) in Explanation II, for the figures and word "120 days" the figures and word "60 days" shall be substituted.

PAYMENT OF WAGES ACT, 1936.

(A) *Publication of the draft Rules.*—Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) of Section 26 of the Act read with Section 22 of the General Clauses Act, 1897 has published as required by sub-section (5) of said section 26 for information of all persons likely to be affected thereby. Notice is given that the said draft will be taken into consideration by Government of Maharashtra after the expiry of three months from the publication of said Notification. Any objections or suggestions which may be received by the Commissioner of Labour, Commerce Centre, Tardeo, Bombay 400 034, from any person with respect to the said draft before the aforesaid date will be considered by Government.

DRAFT RULES

1. These rules may be called the Payment of Wages (Procedure) (Maharashtra Amendment) Rules, 1981.

2. In rule 6 of the Payment of Wages (Procedure) Rules, 1937 (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal rules"),

(a) in sub-rule (1), for the words "documents relevant to an application", the following shall be substituted, namely :—

"documents, if any, relevant to the application together with a list thereof in Form A1;

(b) sub-rule (2) shall be deleted.

3. After rule 6 of the principal rules, the following rule shall be inserted, namely :—

"6A. Preliminary section on application—(1) On receipt of an application under rule 6, the Authority shall examine it or cause it to be examined on the following points, namely :—

(a) whether it is in proper form and is properly signed;

(b) whether it is barred by limitation ;

(c) whether it is accompanied by the documents on which reliance is placed along with a list and copies thereof and whether the documents are in proper condition.

(2) Where, upon an application being examined, it is found to be in order, it shall be registered and the clerk or officer concerned shall make an endorsement thereon "examined and registered" with a date and his signature.

(3) The application shall then be entered in the register in Form 'H'.

(4) Where an application is found to be defective in any material particular, the Authority may direct the applicant to rectify the defect within a specific period or such further period as may be allowed by the Authority and on compliance with the direction by the applicant, the application shall likewise be entered in the register, in Para 'H'.

(5) If the applicant fails to comply with the direction issued under sub-rule (4), it shall be competent for the Authority to dismiss the application."

4. In rule 8 of the principal rules,

(a) for sub-rule (1), the following shall be substituted, namely :

"(1) If the application is not dismissed under sub-rule (5) of rule 6A and is registered in the register in Form 'H', the Authority shall, by issuing a notice in Form 'G', call upon the applicant as well as the employer to appear before him on a specified date, time and place, either by himself or through his authorised representative together with all relevant documents, if any, a list thereof in Form 'A1' and also witnesses, if any ;

(b) after sub-rule (3), the following sub-rule shall be added, namely :—

"(4) Any relevant document or documents other than those appended to the application under sub-rule (1) of rule 6 or produced in response to the notice in Form 'G', which any party desires to tender in evidence, shall be produced on or before the first date fixed for hearing along with a list thereof in Form 'A1' and with as many copies thereof as there are opposite parties.

(5) Except when a document is being produced for the purpose of cross-examining a witness or handed to a witness to refresh his memory at the time of hearing, a party shall not be allowed to rely on any documents other than the documents produced under sub-rule (1) of rule 6 or as the case may be, sub-rules (1) and (4) of this rule, unless an application showing good cause for not producing the same earlier is made by the party for permission to do so and such permission is granted by the Authority.

(6) If any document is written in pencil or defaced, torn or in any way damaged, or where its condition or appearance requires special notice, a clear note to that effect shall be made in the list and any such document shall be brought to the notice of the authority by the clerk whose duty is to receive it and the Authority, may, if he deems it desirable ask the party concerned to produce a photostat copy or true copy thereof either written in ink or typed, for placing it on the record along with the document.

(7) The documents which are admitted by the other party, or which are not admitted but are proved and admitted in evidence shall be immediately marked for identification and shall be detached from the list and shall be assigned the proper exhibit numbers and any reference to any of such documents in the deposition, proceeding or order shall be made with its respective exhibit number".

5. In rule 9 of the principal rules, after sub-rule (1), the following shall be inserted, namely :—

"(1-a) Every finding and order, unless dictated in the presence of parties or their representative, shall be pronounced by the Authority on the day fixed for that purpose.

(1-b) Every finding and order shall be signed and dated by the Authority on the day of its pronouncement and thereafter no addition or alteration, other than correction of clerical or arithmetical mistakes arising from any accidental slip or omission, shall be made thereto."

6. After rule 9A of the principal rules the following shall be inserted, namely :—

"9B. *Maintenance of Roznama.*—(1) The Authority shall maintain a Roznama of the proceedings of every application.

(2) The Roznama shall clearly show the course of the proceedings from the beginning till the end datewise in chronological order. It shall show in concise form the progress of the proceeding from day to day. The reasons for every adjournment shall also be stated therein. The Roznama shall be faithful, complete and shall state the concise history of the case and of all proceedings taken in it. It shall contain a correct list and description of the exhibits, the date of the delivery of the order, the date of signing of the order and the date or dates of any application for review of the order or for amendment of the order. It shall show in chronological order all proceedings subsequent to passing of the order, if any, and also contain a note of other proceedings, if any, such as report of the Commissioner for examination of witnesses.

(3) The Roznama shall be kept from day to day as an original document by the clerk on duty. Entries other than these made at the time of institution of the proceedings shall normally be signed by the Authority.

(4) Every document admitted in evidence and exhibited shall be mentioned in the Roznama in chronological order. The description of the documents, the dates of documents shall also be mentioned in the Roznama. At the end of the Roznama of each case, the clerk concerned shall make a note that all stamps have been punched and shall sign that note.

7 After rule 10 of the principal rules, the following rule shall be inserted, namely :—

" 10A. Procedure for obtaining certified copies.—(1) Any person desiring to obtain certified copies of any records including certified copies of an order or decision of the Authority may make an application in writing to the Authority.

(2) On receipt of such application and on payment of fees for copying a document at the rate of fifty paise per hundred words or fraction thereof, a copy of the document shall be supplied by the Authority.

(3) Certified copies of the document may be supplied on urgent basis on payment of one and half times the fees payable under sub-rule (2).

(4) No copy of any notes, recorded by the Authority for its own use or of any exhibit or document which the Authority may consider to be confidential shall be supplied. "

8. After Form A appended to the principal rules, the following Form shall be inserted, namely —

" FORM A1 "

(Title) e.g. Description, subject, name of the Authority etc.

In July, 1981, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (1960 series) for the Nagpur Centre with base January to December 1960, equal to 100 was 454, being 5 points higher than in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Nagpur City.

The index number for the food group increased by 6 points to 495 due to a rise in the average prices of wheat, jowar, arhar dal, gram dal, gingelli oil, groundnut oil, linseed oil, fresh fish, eggs, dry chillies, onions, garlic and groundnut.

The index number for the pan supari tobacco etc. group increased by 25 points to 475 due to a rise in the average price of pan leaf only.

467—A rise of 2 points.

In July 1981, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for Jalgaon Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 467, 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life maintained during the year 1958-59 family living norms at Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 1 point to 525 due to a rise in the average prices of turdal, gramdal, uriddal, groundnut oil, onions and other vegetables.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 2 points to 509 due to a rise in the average price of kerosene only.

Six monthly house rent survey was conducted by the Office of the Commissioner of Labour, Jalgaon in the month of July, 1981. Accordingly the index number for housing increased by 4 points to 178.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 5 points to 448 due to a rise in the average price of long cloth, coloured poplin, bata shoes and bata chappals.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 1 point to 343 due to a rise in the average price of cinema only.

In July 1981, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New series) for Nanded Centre with base year January to December 1961 (New series) to 100 was 524 being 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Nanded Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 3 points to 581 due to a rise in the average prices of wheat, beef, ghee, dry chillies, onions, brinjal tomatoes and banana.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 7 points to 634 due to rise in the average price of kerosene only.

Six monthly house rent survey was conducted by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay, in the month of July 1981. Accordingly the index number for housing remained steady at 274.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group decreased by 7 points to 456 due to a fall in the prices of saree and coloured fabrics.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 3 points to 456 due to a rise in the average prices of pan-leaf and utensils.

EMPLOYEES' STATE INSURANCE CORPORATION, MAHARASHTRA REGION

Press-note showing the progress during the month of July 1981

The Employees' State Insurance Scheme applies to 34 centres in the State of Maharashtra and provides protection to 17,47,453 workers in the event of Employment Injury, Sickness and Maternity. This protection is made available in various ways namely by provision of medical care and cash benefits when required. During the month of July 1981, 22,544 Insured Persons received cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 5,10,447 24 persons who were in receipt of pensions for Permanent Disablement and 2,152 persons who were in receipt of Dependents Benefit as beneficiaries of deceased Insured Persons. During the month, 13,150 accidents were reported against 13,350 during the preceding month.

Comparatively fewer persons need the employment injury benefits, but a fairly large number needed Cash benefit in the event of Sickness. During the month, 1,15,183 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 1,20,76,904.17 was paid as sickness benefit. During the preceding month, 1,34,194 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 1,23,95,984.05 was disbursed as sickness benefit.

Some Insured Persons suffering from T.B., Mental, Malignant, other long term ailments require more attention and they are being paid additional benefit called Extended Sickness Benefit. During the month, an amount of Rs. 10,45,964.00 was paid towards this benefit.

During the month, 348 Insured Women claimed Rs. 5,23,995.90 by way of Maternity Benefit.

The attendance at the dispensaries as per certificate received was 3,67,211 during the month.

During the month, Funeral Benefit in 149 cases amounting to Rs. 14,900.00 was paid.

During the month, confinement charges in respect of wives of Insured persons amounting to Rs. 64,830.00 was paid.

During the month an amount of Rs. 9,064.00 was paid as enhanced sickness benefit to 67 Insured Persons who had undergone sterilisation operation for family planning.

For recovery arrears of contribution under the Scheme, Legal proceedings were initiated in 12 cases against defaulting employers.

The Scheme has been implemented in Chandrapur Area, Vidharbha Region with effect from 26th July, 1981.

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
