The Month in Brief

Consumer War Index Numbers for Working Class-

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the Month of June 1981, with Average Prices for the year respectively. The Pune, Jalgaon, Nanded and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of June 1981, with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 428, 465, 522, and 481 respective.

All India Average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers -

All India Average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers (General) base 1960 100 for June 1981 was 439 as compared to 433 in May 1981 The Index Numbers for June 1981 on Base 1949 100 derived from 1960 based Index worked out to 543 as against 526 for May 1981.

fedustrial Disputes in Maharashtra State -

During the month of May 1981, there were 44 disputes involving 7,168 workmen and time loss of 1,03,007 working days as compared to 35 disputes in April 1981 involving 12,576 workmen and time loss of 61,233 mandays.

Besefits under the Employees State Insurance Scheme-

During the month of June 1981, 22,150 Insured Persons received Rs 48,16,875.55 as Cash Benefits due to Employment Injuries. This include 5323 persons who were in receipt of pension for Permanent Disablements Benefit and 2,036 persons who were in receipt of Dependents Benefit as dependents of deceased Insured Persons. During the month 13,550 accidents were reported as gainst 13,235 aduring the preceding month.

Current Notes

Gujarat Jobless to get Allowance

The Government of Gujarat has enacted the Gujarat Payment of Unemploy. ment Allowance to Workmen in Factories Act, 1981. The Act provides for payment of unemployment allowance to certain workers in factories who are rendered unemployed on account of failure, refusal or inability of an employer to provide employment due to shortage of power. The rate of such allowance will be equal to 50 per cent of the total of the basic wages and Dearness; Allowance that would have been payable to him per day. No unemployment allowance will be paid to any workman if he is entitled to any lay-off compensation under the Industrial Disputes Act, or if he refuses to accept any alternative employment in the same factory in which he is employed and if he is not provided employment on any day due to strike.

Discipline and Production for Nation's Stability and Security

"Discipline, higher production and increased productivity is the need of the hour and more so in the Defence establishments, on the performance of which depends the stability and security of the country", said the Prime Minister Smt. Indira Gandhi here on July 8.

Addressing a massive rally of Defence Workers drawn from different parts of the country, organised under the INTUC and the Indian National Defence Workers Federation in the lawns of the Prime Minister's house' the Prime Minister exhorted the INTUC workers to continue their constructive role for building the economy of the country.

She assured the workers that whatever legitimately and reasonably could be done for the workers will be looked into with all sincerity and all efforts will be made to give justice to them. She cautioned the workers about the role of destructive forces active in the country and asked them to be vigilant to guard the hard earned freedom of the country.

The Prime Minister assured the workers that such of the demands of which discussions have already taken place, the decision will be taken soon. Agitational approach has no place in democracy, more so when the Goverment is prepared to stand by the workers to solve their difficulties. the defence workers had a special place and as such she called upon to observe discipline and cooperate with the administration to meet the needs of the Army.

Earlier, a memorandum on the pressing problems of the employees in various defence establishments was presented to the Prime Minister by the INTUC President, Shri N. K. Bhatt, M.P.

Besides Shri N. K. Bhatt, Shri R. N. Pathak, Minister of State for Labour, 11 P. Government and General Secretary of INDWF, Shri Madan Sengupta loigt Secretary, INDWF, Shri R.P.L. Das, Secretary of INDWF, Smt. Vimal Nagl of the Co-ordination Committee and Members of the Working Committee of the INDWF were present on this momentous occasion.

Maharashtra Ordinance Free's Security Guards

Over 70,000 security guards employed by contractors to serve various industrial establishments in the State were freed last week from the clutches of greedy contractors by an Ordinance promulgated last week by the Maharashtra Government. The Ordinance abolishes contract system in employing security

Security guards constitute most exploited and unorganised lot among the whan workers. Most of the Government and semi-Government establishments, industrial units and private firms prefer to hire contractors to avail of security guards. These firms enter into agreements with the contracting companies who is tuen provide security services.

Though the contractors charge Rs. 600 to 1,000 or more from the firms, the security guards are paid less than Rs. 250 per month. These guards work under deplorable service conditions. Young men coming to the city seeking employment are recruited by the contractors with an 11 month agreement and after the expiry of that period they are terminated and reemployed. Even the meagre salaries are not paid in time. For the slightest alleged dereliction of duty, subtantial deductions are made from their wage packets.

Shri A. R. Antulay, State Chief Minister said that the Government would set up a board to eliminate middle men and other agencies. The Ordinance envisages that private firms and even government establishments would have to hire security services through the board which would ensure fair wages and better service conditions to the security guards.

Among those establishments which hired contractors included Air India, MLA's Hostel and Labour Commissioner's office.

The Ordinance has been welcomed by all trade union centres.

Shri Annasaheb Patil, the mathadi workers leader congratulated the Government for this bold action. In a statement, he said that he had piloted a nonofficial bill seeking protection for security guards. He expressed satisfaction that the Government had lived to its assurance given to him in this connection.

Shri Patil, however, cautioned the security guards organisation against certain vested interests likely to cause hinderances in the constitution and and functioning of the proposed board.

Shri L. V. Subramaniam, Secretary General of the All India Confederation of Bank Officer's Organisations, welcoming the decision said: "The bonded labour had been freed." Criticising the contract labour system, he said hanful of contractors were thriving on the hardship of thousands of security guards, whose working hours have no stipulations.

Defaulters on PF Face Action

The central board of trustees of the employees provident fund on July 2 recommended the attachment of the bank accounts of industrial establishments in case of failure to pay provident fund arrears and other dues of workers.

The board, which concluded its two day meeting at Simla on July 2, felt that the details of the bank accounts, maintained by the covered establishments should be kept in the Regional Office of Provident Fund Commissioners. These would help detect defaulters.

The board decided to utilise the services of State Government revenue officers to recover arrears.

The Deputy Labour Minister, Shri P. Venkata Reddy, who presided, said the services of these officers would be asked for in Maharashtra, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Punjab, Haryana and Andhra Pradesh initially. The highest number of arrears and revenue recovery cases are pending in these States.

The Welfare Commissioner, Beedi Workers Welfare Organisation, 290-C, Napier Town, Jabalpur (M.P.) will award Scholarships to the sons and daughters of Beedi workers in Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra and Goa Region for general and technical education of different values depending upon the class of the recognised educational institutions in which the student concerned is reading for the academic year 1981-82 as noted below

- 1. Student for Classes V and VI Rs. 10 per month.
- 3. Student for Classes IX and X and for technical Rs. 30 per month. education of lower standard.
- Student for Class XI and XII, P. U. Classes, I. A., Rs. 50 per month. I.S.C., B.A., B.Sc., B.Com., New Degree Course and technical education where admission is open to students who have passed Matriculation.
- Student Joining M.A., M.Sc., M.Com., M.B.B.S., Rs. 75 per month. B. Eng., or other higher technical course.

of Agricultural Labour in India

Of late, the economic condition of the agricultural labourers and the marginal small farmers who form a major segment of the socialled 'weaker' or sections of the society has attracted considerable attention of the policy less and academicians as well. This item forms a general belief that the section of development are not shared by the rich and poor alike but it has sarued more to be former than to the latter.

One suggested approach to the problem of uplifting this poorer section depends on a rapid overall growth of the economy along with direct and indirect transfer of income and wealth. This is based on the faith that the overall growth through huge investments mainly in non-agricultural section will enlarge employment opportunities and help to absorb a section of the arrecultural workers.

Judging by past experience, this approach does not seem to hold much hope.

Also various socio-economic measures such as implementation of land reforms.

In additional acreage under irrigation, provision of shelter to landless

abour, fixation of mainimum wages, etc. did not prove effective. The recents

mnouncement of various policy measures has given a new life and colour to such

ghemes and it may be hoped that from now atleast would prove effective.

The deplorable living conditions of the casual labourers in agriculture and a large segment of the cultivators who are equally poor as the labourers, are attributable to the backwardness in agriculture. Limited demand for wage mud labour confined to the seasonal operations in agriculture is a consequence of agricultural backwardness. There is, therefore, the problem of providing of season.

Though, it is not possible to define the term agricultural labour' precisely, but various difficult attempts have been made in this connection by experts. However, the term agricultural labourer refers to rural laboureres employed. on wages in agricultural occupations.

First, Agricultural Labour Enquiry Committee (1950-51) defined agricultural labour as "those people who are engaged in raising crops on payment of wages "Second Agricultural Labour Enquiry Committee (1956-57) extended the definition to cover all those persons who are engaged in other agricultural occupations like dairy farming, horticulture, raising of live-stocks, poultry etc. But all these definitions do not explain meaning of this term. Therefore, to remove such

impediments and define clearly the meaning of agricultural labour, agricultural labour, Labour Enquiry Committee used the concept of "agricultural household."

If half or more members of a household have wage employment in then the household should be termed as 'Agricultural labour household.

This concept was based on the occupation. But the Second Agri Labour Enquiry Committee substituted income criteria and said that an 'agricultural labour household' is one whose main source of income is wages for agriculture. The 1961 census defines agricultural labourer as follows: agricultural labour is one who works in other persons land only as a laha (without exercising any supervision and direction in cultivation) for ages in cash, kind or share of produce. He should have been working as agricultural labourer in the last or the current working seasons."

Types of Agricultural Labourers

Labourers in agricultural sector mainly falls into following categories

- (a) Attached labourers.—Despite the fact that women, children are engaged in certain states as regular workers, permanent labour force is larged composed of men. Women workers are mostly employed in South India The period of contract and other conditions of employments are settled between workers and employers. Such type of workers are empoyed on yearly basis. These workers are, in certain cases employed on quarterly, half yearly or monthly basis. According to The Agricultural Labour Enquiry Committee 1950-51, attached workers in some Zones of Uttar Pradesh and employed for a period of five months. Average monthly earnings of attached workers in different States generally ranges from Rs. 38 to Rs. 50 from Rs. 25 to Rs. 44 and from Rs. 15 to Rs. 60 in different regions.
- (b) Casual Labourers.—Casual workers, according to the first Agriculture Labour Enquiry Committee form the major portion of agriculture labour force. Such labourers are usually empoyed during busy seasons and are pad piece rate wages or time rate wages. Men, women and children are all engaged as casual workers but the employment of women is rare in the states of Jammu and Kashmir and Tripura. Women and children are usually employed in weeding, transplanting, harvesting and threshing. Women are employed for ploughing in certain villages in Assam. Orissa, Hyderabad, Mysore. Children are frequently employed in ploughing in States of Bhiar, Madhya Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Orissa and Uttar Pradesh.
- (c) Bonded Labour.—It is very difficult to define bonded labourers, yet efforts have been made in this direction. Those agricultural labourers, who have been working on the field of their 'Malik' or at the residence of 'Malik' without getting prevailing wage rates in the area and due to the loan or coercion of the Malik they are not in a position to work on other's field, such type of labourers will come under the purview of bonded labour.

Conditions of Agricultural Labourers

daily earnings of agricultural labourer was 207 paise in 1950-51, M paise in 104-11 and 297 paise in 1964-65. The average daily wage for male agricultural labourer was Rs. 1.9 in 1950-51, Rs. 0.90 in 1956-57, Lt. 43 in 1964-65 and Rs. 1.79 in 1968-69. During this period of 18 years, that was some increment in wage rate but the real increment in wages was assemble and the average per capita annual income from all sources was Rt. 104 in 1950-51 and Rs. 99.4 in 1956-57. The income of agricultural bounded during this period fell from Rs. 447 to Rs. 437.5 but increased to Rs. 670.2 by 1964-65.

According to Minimum Wages Act, 1948 minimum wages of the agricultural labour has been fixed but due to lack of labour organization, illiteracy of the working class people and lack of the implimenting staff that provision is not properly being enforced in the agricultural sector in India.

Problems of Agricultural Labour

There are the following problems of agricultural labourers in India:

- (1) Low economic standard.—Average per-capita income of agricultural labour is much less than that of industrial counter-part. This difference is highly responsible for their deteriorating economy. Due to their deteriorating economic condition they have acted day things in the hands of rich cultivators.
- (2) Bonded Labour.—The system of bonded is very much in vogue in the country. This system is creating so many problems before the agricultural labour.
- (3) Seasonal Demand of Agricultural Lobour Generally the demand for the agricultural labour is during busy seasons, when they are employed on daily wages. They hardly get 7 months work in single crop area and 9 months in double crops area of the country.
- (4) Lack of Non-agricultural job.—Lack of other jobs in the villages is another important factor for low wages and poor economic conditions.

- (5) Decline of cottage industries.—Due to the bad attitude of the Mughal emperors and Britishers cottage industry had declined during their periods. They are greatly responsible for increasing the number of agricultural labourers.
- (6) Lack of education and Technical knowledge.—Illiteracy is one of the chief characteristics of agricultural labour. It is because of this handicap that they have to live on agriculture. Moreover, because of their ignorance, they are exploited and are unable to reap the benefits of scientific advancement.
- (7) Uncertainty and Risks involved in Agriculture.—Uncertainty and rish are also responsible for the deteriorating conditions of agricultural labour Excessive and scanty rainfalls, drought etc. all have made the future of agricultural labour in India uncertain.
- (8) Lack of organization.—Agricultural labourers are unorganised and scattered in villages. Accordingly it is difficult for them to bargain with land owners for securing good wages. Unity, stability and solidarity are the domand of the 20th century. It is hardest truth that not a single labour can bargain with management for uplifting his economic and social status. So, due to lack of organization they have to suffer a lot.

Remedial Measures

For ameliorating the grievances of agricultural labour, there is need to adopt various measures. Such a strategy is called for because of the miserable state in which labourers find themselves today. It is the outcome of varied economic, social, historical and institutional factors. It should be remembered that following suggestions have been made for the improvement of agricultural labour:

- (i) Abolition of serfdom.—Agricultural serfdom which exists in many parts of the country should be abolished. The education of rural mass and better employment opportunities are some of the remedies for the removal of serfdom. It is expected that with the introduction of other measures serfdom shall come to an end.
- (u) Implementation of Minimum Wages Act, 1948.—Agricultural Labourers are getting miserably low wages except in Punjab. There are not adequate labour inspections in Bihar for better implementation of this act. One Inspector has to visit more than two blocks in a few districts of Bihar. Besides this, vehicles and officer have not been provided to this department. So, there must be improvement by the government regarding the same. Minimum wages Act, 1948 is alone sufficient to enforce it. Therefore, there is no need to pass a series of law.

Rehabilitation Landless Agricultural Labourers.—In order to the social conditions of agricultural labour, landless labourers be provided with land.

(b) Improvement in Agriculture.—Agricultural labourers do not have full time employment because of the seasonal character of Indian agriculture and extensive and extensive cultivation and extension of irrigational fedities and multiple crops more employment opportunities can be created.

- (r) Public Works Programmes.—The construction of public works programme by the government is a good method providing employment to associatival labourers. Such projects include constructions of roads, digging and deeping of tanks and canals etc.
- (vi) Co-operative Farming.—It includes the creation of co-operative village system, wherein all, including present agricultural labourers, will have equal rights, duties and opportunities.
- (vil) Organization of Labour Co-operatives.—During Second Five-Year Plan, efforts were made to encourage the formation of labour co-operatives. These labour co-operatives provide employment to agricultural labourers daring stack and off-seasons and also eliminate the possible exploitation of workers by private contractors.
- (Mi) Employment Guarantee Scheme.—Government of Maharashtra introduced such scheme, according to which able bodies persons in villages can apply for a job to a collector of his district and the latter will provide him job within 5 kms. of his place of residence. This scheme is to be mitoduced throughout the territory of India.

In the last but not least, India does not need more legislation for the conome and social upliftment of agricultural labourers but it requires more and more attention for the proper implementation of the existing laws.

Labour Legislation

MAHARASHTRA ACT NO. XXII OF 1981.—An Act to amend the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and the Maharashtra Unemployment Allowance Payment to Workmen in Factories (for Temporary Period) Act, 1976,

The following Act of the Maharashtra Legislature, having been assented to by the President on the 25th April 1981, is hereby published for general information.

MAHARASHTRA ACT No. XXII OF 1981

(First) Published, after having received the assent of the President in the "Maharashtra Government Gazette" on the 2nd May 1981).

An Act to amend the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and the Maharashtra Viewployment Allowance Payment to Workmen in Factories (for Temporary Period) Act, 1976.

WHEREAS, it is expedient to amend the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, XIV of 1947, in its application to the State of Maharashtra and the Maharashtra Unemployment Allowance Payment to Workmen in Factories (for Temporary Period) Act, 1976, Mah. XIV of 1976, for the purposes hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted in the Thirty-second Year of the Republic of India as follows:—

"or on account of discontinuance or reduction of the supply of power to the industrial establishment for contravention of any provisions of the Bombay Electricity (Special Powers) Act, 1946, Bom. XX of 1946, or of any order or directions issued thereunder."

- 3. Amendment of section 25C of Act XIV of 1947.—In section 25C of the Industrial Disputes Act,—
 - (a) after the words "had he not been so laid off:" the following proviso shall be inserted, namely:—

"Provided that, where the lay off is on account of discontinuance or reduction of the supply of power to the industrial establishment for contravention of any provisions of the Bombay Electricity (Special Powers) Act, 1946, Bom. XX of 1946, or of any orders or directions issued thereunder, the compensation payable to the workman shall be equal to hundred per cent of the total of the basic wages and dearness allowance that would have been payable to him had he not been so laid off:";

- (b) in the existing first proviso, for the words, "provided that" the words, "Provided further that" shall be substituted;
- (c) in the existing second provisio, for the words "Provided further that" the words "Provided also that" shall be substituted.
- 4. Amendment of section 3 of Mah. XIV of 1976.—In Section 3 of the Maharashtra Unemployment Allowance Payment to Workmen in Factories (for Temporary Period) Act, 1976 Mah. XIV of 1976.—
- (a) in sub-section (1), for the portion beginning with the words "due to short working" and ending with the words "the temporary period", the following shall be substituted, namely:—

"With employment therein on any days during the temporary period, due to short working of factories on account of shortage of power or on account of discontinuance of reduction of the supply of power to the factory for contravention of any provisions of the Bombay Electricity (Special Powers) Act, 1946, Bom. XX of 1946 or of any orders or directions issued thereunder.":

(b) in sub-section (2), after the words "during the temporary period". The following proviso shall be inserted, namely:—

"Provided that, where the unemployment is on account of discontinuance or reduction of the supply of power for the reasons stated in sub-section(1), the rate of allowance payable shall be hundred per cent. of the total of the basic wages and dearness allowance."

The index number for the food group increased by 11 points to 498 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, jowar, bajra, bread, arhardal, masurdal, unidal, groundnut oil, vanaspati, goat-meat, fish-fresh-bumblows, pamfret, eggs, milk, ghee, dry chillies, onion, garlic, bhajia, tea-ready-made, cold drink and vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc., group increased by 2 points, to 492 due to a rise in the average prices of pan leaf and katha.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 4 points to 517 due to a rise in the average prices of fire-wood and charcoal.

The index number for housing remained steady at 158 being a six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing bedding and footwear group increased by 8 points to 447 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti, saree, shirting long-cloth, trouser's cloth, markin, bush-shirt, and full pant.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 3 points to 349 due to a rise in the average prices of hair oil, umbrella, durrie, bucket, laundry charges, washing soap and tailoring charges.
