The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class

The Bombay, Sholapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of January 1971 with the average prices for the year 1960 equal to 100 were 181, 187 and 188, respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Poona and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of January 1971 with the average prices for the year 1961 equal to 100 were 189, 197, 173 and 189, respectively.

Industrial Disputes

During November 1970, there were 72 strikes involving 20,275 workmen and a time loss of 2,38,462 working days, as compared to 99 disputes in October 1970 involving 1,45,170 workers and time loss of 5,29,118 mandays. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages 869 to 870 and 896 to 903 of this issue.

Absenteeism

During December 1970, the average absenteeism in the textile industry in seven important textile centres in the State Viz. Bombay City, Nagpur, Sholapur, Jalgaon, Nanded, Akola and Aurangabad amounted to 18.01 per cent. as against 18.35 per cent. in November 1970. For further particulars see page 872 of this issue.

Production of Cotton Yarn Spun and Manufacture of cloth

During September 1970 mills in Bombay City produced a total of 1,41,81,000 Kgs. of yarn, 1,96,000 Kgs. of Miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery goods and knitted fabrics and packed 2,79,000 metres of cotton goods mixed with silk, wool terene etc. and packed 9,19,59,000 Kgs. wearable and non-wearable cloth and those in rest of Maharashtra produced 46,44,000 Kgs. of yarn 1,24,000 Kgs. of miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery and knitted fabrics and packed 2,53,32,000 metres of wearable and non-wearable cloth. The total production of cotton yarn, miscellaneous goods and mixed with silk, wool terene etc. packing of wearable and non-wearable cloth for the whole State of Maharashtra amounted to 1,88,25,000 Kgs. 3,20,000 Kgs, 2,85,000 metres and 11,72,91,000 metres respectively.

ILO Chief recommends a vigorous social policy

A vigorous social policy is vital to India's unity as a nation and her capacity to play a leading role in promoting the unity of Asia, said the Director-General Wilfred Jenks of the International Labour Office, who was on a short visit to India as an honoured guest of the Government.

Accepting an honorary doctorate of laws at a special convocation of the University of Delhi on January 25, 1971, Dr. Jenks spoke of the diversity which had made possible the richness of Indian culture.

"In days gone by, race, religion, language, social habit have all contributed their quotas to the tensions which have accompanied, and perhaps been the price of, the richness of your diversity, "he said. "In the present-day secular state, with a constitutional mandate to promote equality of status, and opportunity for all, these historical factors, while not yet wholly negligible, have become much less significant than the extent to which economic and social policy binds together those whom tradition and interest may tend to keep apart."

The International Labour Organisation would continue to contribute to the unity of India. of Asia and of all mankind, Dr. Jenks declared. "The accent of our contribution, he said, "has been upon enlarging human freedom, the freedom which the whole concept of an organised world community is designed to preserve and expand". He expressed the belief that a vigorous and realistic social policy within and among nations, executed with competence and imagination, had a decisive part to play in building freedom for all mankind.

Employment Orientation of Development Plans—First General Meeting of Economists—Prof. D. R. Gadgil's Address—

The need for giving greater attention to the definition of "employment orientation" of plans of development and to the concretisation of the concept stressed by Prof. D. R. Gadgil, Deputy Chairman, Planning Commission.

Prof. Gadgil was addressing the first general meeting of economists convened by the Planning Commission in New Delhi 15th February 1971 to discuss the report of the Committee of Experts on Unemployment Estimates.

Prof. Gadgil observed that it was often said and generally agreed that our plans should be employment oriented. Employment orientation, he added, could be related to the plan as a whole or its various apects. It would directly affect the size of the Plan if, for example, employment orientation in a particular direction led to an increase in the totality of resources available for implementing the plan.

To the extent that employment orientation affected the strategy of the Plan at would influence its structure, the sectoral allocations and allocations as between different programmes. Employment orientation could influence the types and levels of technology adopted and could lead to a change in the spatial

distribution of economic activity. It could also indicate important alterations in the fiscal, financial and economic regulatory policies of Government. It might thus affect the entire strategy and the basic structure of plans or influence to a greater or less degree important aspects or details.

In the context of development planning, the Deputy Chairman said, the relief aspect of the unemployment situation would not be considered important. The main emphasis would be on utilisation of redundant labour for capital formation or for further activising the economy. Obviously the orientation, whether as a comprehensive package or as indivisual proposals, would be examined in relation to its propriety or effiacy as compared with possible alternatives in the short and the long run.

Prof. Gadgil pointed out that this field was still largely unexplored. At the same time the situation in the country urgently demanded not only that intensive work would be undertaken on the subject but also that its results were so formulated that the possibilities and limitations of action in relation to planning effort were brought out clearly.

The Deputy Chairman said that the Planning Commission was interested in arriving at a fuller understanding of the employment situation and of possible ways of dealing with its various aspects. This would help in shaping the approach to the formulation of the Plan and in elaborating the details of Plan proposals.

Referring to the implications of the approach to the problem of unemployment, incorporated in the Fourth Plan, Prof. Gadgil said that the main assumption was that securing a minimum rate of growth of the economy on a self-sustaining basis was a pre-requisite for formulation of programmes for dealing effectively with any specific aspects of unemployment. This meant that the first priority had to be given to resuming the process of growth and development of the economy and for ensuring its continuance at a given rate significantly above the rate of growth of population.

Therefore, though the strategy of the Fourth Plan, with its emphasis on rural development and small-scale industries, was based on integration of opportunities of employment creation with economice development, the Plan did not contain any massive proposals for a frontal attack on the problem of unemployment.

Prof. Gadgil said that it was also considered that the problem was not homogeneous and that the diversity of conditions in the field was very large. There was not only basic difference in the nature of the problem as between the rural and urban areas but also wide variations in conditions as between district and district. In view of this and in view of the paucity of experience and lack of purpose fully designed and documented experiments in the past, it was thought that it would be better to take up, in the first instance, pilot projects as related to specific situations rather than to embark upon generalised solutions on a large scale.

The Deputy Chairman pointed out that a number of pilot projects have been included in the Fourth-Five Year Plan. They were directed, in the main, to

he improvement of economic conditions of the weaker sections in our population; in the process they had also to tackle problems of under-employment and unemployment.

The small farmer's development agency was concerned with providing a broader base of production to small farmers and making their operations viable. The marginal farmers' and landless labourers' schemes had the objective of increasing the production base of these classes. The schemes had to be mainly oriented to increasing employment opportunities for them. It was expected that some of these schemes would lay emphasis on providing full employment to local landless labour and thus yield useful experience in relation to alternative methods of giving fuller employment to them.

Perhaps the most significient project from the employment point of view were those of rural works in drought prone areas. Presumably, the drought prone areas were among those that suffered most from rural under-employment and unemployment. These schemes represented an attempt to integrate the provision of employment to unemployed or underemployed labour with programmes of development of local resources for securing a broader and surer base to the economy of the area.

It was expected that the programmes would, in course of time, be fully integrated with District development planning. Though the finance for the schemes in the drought prone areas came from a non-plan source, the organisation of work under them and its total direction and supervision were integrated with those of the other plan schemes. Schemes in urban areas were related mainly to apprenticeship and training and to provision of credit and other facilities for self-employment. Government had recently decided also to launch a series of specific employment schemes spread over all districts of the country.

Prof. Gadgil observed that though there was no single large programme dealing in a massive way with the problem of unemployment as such, a large number of pilot projects directed towards specific situations had been launched in all States of the country during the Fourth Plan. It was expected that these schemes would yield important results on the basis of which larger and bolder programmes could be effectively undertaken during the next plan period.

"Historically, business management in this country as elsewhere has been associated with the ownership of wealth. But in more dynamic societies the nexus between ownership and management broke as the size of business increased and as its operations became more and more complex. The emergence of professional management has been the result of these developments.

In India professional management is still in its early phase of development. It, therefore, gives me great satisfaction to find that the All India Management Association and its affiliates are consciously trying to promote the growth of professional management.

The Government has also been anxious to promote professional management. The abolition of managing agency system was an attempt to replace hereditary management by the professional one. The managing agency system, as you

know, was evolved to meet management needs during the early stages of industrialisation. But it got extended in a manner which vested the control of industry in a few family and financial groups. The abolition of the managing agency system has made it possible to move from personal to functional management. I am, therefore, anxious to encourage the growth of professional, managerial and supervisory groups who will not be in control merely by virtue of heredity, but whose efficiency will be judged by actual performance.

I am glad to note that a major purpose of this Convention is to highlight the dynamic role of management and to stress the need for adopting it to the changing needs of our social environment.

Management in India today is called upon to act and to plan for the future in the face of political and economic changes. The new environment in India is an environment of change, a change brought by an awakening among the people of India who demand a fair deal for themselves and for their children. This new situation constitutes a great challenge for managers. All managers, whether they are managing businesses or offices, farms or factories private businesses or public undertakings, whether they are called business executives or civil servants will have to measure up to this challenge.

As I see it, there are two ways of looking at this changing environment. One is that of morbid fear, a feeling of being overwhelmed by problems and of seeking refuge behind status quo. The other is to see in this challenge a geat opportunity to do things that things that have remained undone and to face the future with confidence in the rising generation of managerial talent.

You managers have, therefore, a tremendous responsibility. You have to constantly provide answers—answers for your colleagues, answers for your workers, answers for your consumers. You have to sense and understand the needs of the people with whom you work. Management has been defined as the art of getting work done through others. To be effective managers, you have to mostivate your work force, improve productivity, find ways and means of increasing the real wages of workers and maintain harmonious industrial relations.

The problems that face you here are not only the technical-managerial problems that face managers in developed countries. You have also to contend against unfavourable factors resulting from the backlong of under-development. You have to adjust to and allow for the inadequacies of your environment. We cannot merely transplant concepts and practices from elsewhere and adopt them here mechanically. While we must always be prepared to learn from others, we should not imagine that ready-made solutions for Indian problems can be imported. You will have to evolve concepts and practices of your own on the basis of your experience.

As economic growth proceeds, the environment changes and instead of inhibiting growth, it acts as an accelerator. In bringing about this transition, the manager has not only to be efficient in his work but he has also to be responsive to the environment in which he functions. He is certainly responsible to his employers but he also owns responsibility to the public at large.

What does this larger responsibility mean? To me it means working for the objective of achieving a 'social basic minimum' for every individual. Unless this is attained, there can be no stability. And without stability business itself cannot flourish. Investment in the welfare of the masses is a guarantee of the long run business survival itself.

Holding Price line

The representatives of the Indian Sugar Mills Association have had a series of discusions with the Department of Food on the problems being faced by the sugar industry. It was pointed out to them how necessary it is to contain inflation and hold the price line. Keeping this in mind they were assured that the difficulties pointed out by them including bank finances are receiving the consideration of Government and that decisions would be taken as early as possible.

The representatives of the industry were advised to refrain from taking any action which may aggravate the situation and adversely affect the public interest including the interest of the industry itself, of cane growers and of labour.

New Statistics to Help immigrant Employment

Statistics of unemployed immigrants under the age of 18 are to be compiled in Britain for the first time from May 1971 to help the Government's plans for equal opportunity in employment for all.

Announcing this, the Department of Employment said the statistical return which produces totals of unemployed adult immigrants from selected Commonwealth countries would be extended to the Youth Employment Service in May.

The Department pointed out that there was currently no comprehensive information available on unemployed immigrants under 18. It drew attention to a Commons statement by the Minister of State, Mr. Paul Bryan, on December 10 last that the Government was determined to promote equal opportunity in employment for all, and that in doing so it was necessary to know the extent and location of unemployed coloured immigrants.

The new statistics will cover immigrants, and those whose parents are immigrants, of all ages from India, Pakistan, Africa and the West Indies. They will be published in the Department of Employment Gazettee.

British Efforts for improved Relations in Industry

The British Government is determined to create a new environment in industry by raising standards of industrial relations conduct and establishing new rights for individuals and institutions, the Secretary of State for Employment, Mr. Robert Carr, told a luncheon meeting of the Foreign Press Association n London on 17th February 1971.

It was particularly important, he said, to raise the standard of management and its capability for handling homan relations, since management alone could take the initiative for reform mandividual plants.

Outlining the aims and scope of the Industrial Relations Bill currently on its way through the House of Commons, Mr. Carr said that the objective of the legislation was "very simply to make strikes in Britain a last resort rather than the first resort they so often are today."

Mr. Carr pointed out that the Bill would raise the status of trade unions which registered under its provisions, encouraging them to keep in closer touch with their members and to service them better. But it would place restraints on unofficial groups of wildcats who, as unregistered organisations, would be become liable in court for their actions, "whereas today they have absolute protection for breaking contracts by going on strike."

Mr. Carr whose speech was read by Mr. Paul Bryan, Minister of State at the Department of Employment, added that he would be "very surprised and disappointed" if within a few years British trade unions had not come to appreciate the benefits of the new legislation both to themselves and to their members. He did not believe that present declarations of hostility by trade union leaders would necessarily be reflected in future actions, and he recalled the "long and honourable record of the British trade union movement as a whole, of respect for the law and the constitutional authority of Parliament."

Nixon proposes Health Insurance for all Americans

The Health Plan President Nixon sent to Congress in February 1971 would make comprehensive Health Insurance available to all Americans, particularly those who do not have enough Income to pay for the medical care they need.

For low-income families, the Government would pay the full premium. Workers and Employers would share the costs of health insurance for most other Americans. The Government would set minimum standards of coverage.

For most employed Americans, the Health Insurance would be provided through private Insurance Organizations rather than directly by the Government.

At present, 87 per cent of all Americans have Health Insurance coverage of some kind, and Insurance benefits already pay for 60 per cent of all medical bills in the United States. Other Americans are eligible for health care under various Government Assistance programms.

The new programms, however, would eliminater emaining gaps in Health Insurance coverage

To provide further assurances that the interests of the buyers of Health Insurance will be well served, president Nixon plans to propose United State Government regulation of the private Health Insurance Industry.

When Health Insurance for the aged (Medicare) and free medical care for needy persons (medicaid) were introduced in the United States a few years ago the demand for hospital rooms and other medical services rose sharply. No provision has been made in advance for increasing the supply of Doctors, Nurses and hospital rooms to meet the increased demands. As a result, prices of health services soared.

Another problem has been created by the fact that many Americans have Insurance covering hospital services but do not have insurance covering other medical services — such as those rendered in a Physician's Office. The result has been that some patients seek expensive hospital treatment when they could have been cared for just as well, but at less cost, elsewhere.

To avoid cost-increasing problems such as these, Mr. Nixon's Health Plan lays great stress on programms to increase the supply of trained health manpower, to make more efficient use of the available supply of health care personnel, and to provide incentives for avoiding wasteful and unnecessarily costly practices.

The President's message to Congress advocated more emphasis on prevention of illness rather than treatment. This approach would increase the effectiveness and decrease the costs of health care, Mr. Nixon said.

As one means to achieve this shift in emphasis, the Administration's health plan would encourage Americans to buy the services of "Health Maintenance Organizations," in which groups of Physicians charge, a fixed annual fee for all Medical care needed by their clients, rather than ordinary health insurance, which pays physicians and hospitals on the basis of the amount of service Health Maintenance Organizations have a powerful incentive to prevent their clients from becoming ill, since each additional day of medical treatment required will add to the organization's expenses without bringing in any more fees.

Mr. Nixon also provided more Government Financial aid for the training of Medical personnel. Existing programms for aiding medical schools would be revamped so that the amount each school receives from the federal Government would be determined by the number of Physicians it graduates annually, thus giving the schools an incentive to increase their output of qualified physicians.

Diversity is Feature of Nixon's Health Plan

The Health Insurance Programm proposed by President Nixon in February 1971 would contain several elements:

Low-Income families with children would be eligible for a new family Health Insurance Plan. Eligibility would vary with the size of the family. A family of four would be eligible as long as its income did not exceed 5,000 dollars a year, and it would pay nothing for the Insurance if its Income was under 3,000 dollars. Above 3,000 dollars, the family would pay gradually increasing percentages of the cost, to a maximum of 25 per cent. The Government would pay the rest. This programm would largely replace the present medicare program of free medical care for the needy, which is more limited in scope and excludes most employed persons.

Medicare would continue for certain elderly and disabled persons and other needy individuals not eligible for Health Insurance under any other programms.

A National Insurance Standards Act would require all employers to make Health Insurance available to their employees. Employers would eventually pay 75 per cent of the cost, and the workers would contribute the other 25

per cent. The Federal Government would set minimum sandards of coverage, just as it now sets minimum standards for wages and hours. The Insurance would be purchased from Private Insurance.

The Medicare Programme of Health Insurance for the aged, administered through the Social Insurance System, would be improved by providing both Hospital Insurance and General Medical Care Insurance, without additional charge, to all persons eligible for medicare. At present persons who want the Medical Care Insurance must pay a modest monthly fee.

The purpose of these programmes, as stated by Mr. Nixon in his State of the Union Message to Congress last month, would be "to ensure that no American family will be prevented from obtaining Basic Medical care by inability to pay.'

INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES IN THE MAHARASHTRA STATE

ANNUAL REVIEW FOR THE YEAR 1969

The statistics of industrial disputes in Maharashtra State are compiled by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay on the basis of the reports received from the District Magistrates, the Government Labour Officers and the Commissioners of Police at Bombay, Poona and Nagpur. These statistics cover industrial disputes (strikes and lockouts) resulting in work stoppages. Sympathetic strikes and certain other work stoppages, which do not strictly come with in the definition of "industrial disputes", as contained in the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, are not included in these statistics. Further, these statistics cover only industrial disputes involving 10 or more workers, irrespective of the duration or the time loss involved.

During the year 1969, there were 616 disputes in the State, involving 1,82,430 workers, with a time loss of 12,08,484 man-days. The corresponding figures for the year 1968 were 618 disputes, involving 2,03,563 workers, and a time loss of 16.14,744 man-days. Thus compared to the position in the year 1968, the number of disputes, workers involved and man-days lost in the year 1969, decreased by 0.32 per cent, 10.38 percent and 25.16 per cent respectively. The average man-days loss per disputes decreased from 2,613 in the year 1968 to 1962 in the year 1969. There was also a decrease in the average duration per work stoppage from 7.93 days in the year 1968 to 6.62 days in the year 1969.

Important Strikes and Lockouts

The work stoppage of the largest magnitude during the year under review resulted from the strike followed by lockout involving 3,713 workers employed in Voltas and Co. situated in Thana and Bombay, which lasted from June 11, 1969 to September 16, 1969 over the workers' demand for 20 per cent bonus. Due to this strike along 2.70 lakh man-days were lost. The next important work stoppage was due to the strike of 748 workers employed in Bharat Bijlee Ltd. situated in Bombay and Thana, which lasted for 92 days. From June 7, 1969 to September 17, 1969. The strike was in connection with the workers demand regarding recognition of union, etc. It resulted in a time loss of 0.68 lakhs man-days.

During the year under review there were 19 lockouts, involving 7,019 workers, which accounted for a time loss of 3,38,285 man-loss of 3,38,285 man-days, that is 27.99 per cent of the local time loss resulting from all the disputes. Four important lockouts during the year 1969 which accounted for a time loss of 3,18,385 man-days were as follows:—

The month of July 1969 recorded the highest time loss during the year, there being 1,71,028 man-days lost, which works out to 14:15 per cent. of the total time loss recorded for the year 1969.

It will be seen from this table that there was a decrease in the industrial unrest during the year under review, as compared to the position in the previous year.

Nearly 13.74 per cent of the total time loss was recorded by Textile Industry during the year, which accounted for 12.01 per cent of the total number of disputes. The Engineering Industry accounted for 44.67 per cent of the total time loss. The Miscellaneous Industries recorded the highest number of disputes (i.e. 55.68 per cent of the total disputes) and accounted for 41.59 per cent of the total time loss during the year.

The disputes occurring in the year 1969 were spread over in 84 centres in the State as against 94 centres in the year 1968. Greater Bombay, the most important centre in the State, recorded, as usual, the highest number of dispute viz. 324 during the year under review as against 330 in 1968. The disputes in Greater Bombay along affected about 64.68 per cent of the total workers involved during the year and accounted for 62.20 per cent of the total time loss.

The following table shows the locality with industrial disputes in the State according to industries workers involved and man-days lost, during the year, under review.

Causes of Disputes

A variety of reasons were reported to be responsible for the strikes and lockouts that occurred in the State during the year under review and, in several instances, more than one issue were stated to be involved in each case. However, for the purposes of statistics, such cases have been classified according to what appeared to be the principal issue in the dispute. The causes of disputes are classified into pay and allowances, bonus, leave and hours of work personnel and others. Table V given below shows the causewise classification of the disputes, for the year 1969. It will be noticed that " grievances regarding personnel" constituted the leading cause of industrial disputes and accounted for 38.64 per cent of the disputes during the year 1969 involving 27.96 per cent of the total workmen. "Pay and allowances" formed the main issue in 32.47 per cent of the total disputes, involving 41.01 per cent of the total workers. Though the demand for "bonus" accounted for 13.31 per cent of the total disputes, it recorded the highest time loss of 31.75 of the total mandays. The demand for leave and hours of work accounted for 3.57 per cent of the total disputes, while the disputes on account of miscellaneous causes recorded 12.01 per cent of the total disputes involving 12.00 per cent of the workers and causing a time loss of 7.88 per cent of the total man-days lost.

It would be noted from the above table that during the year under report the disputes relating to "Personnel" were the highest in number, followed closely by disputes concerning "Pay and Allowances". These two together formed about 71·11 per cent of the disputes that occurred during the year 1969. The corresponding figures of disputes on account of these two reasons, for the year 1968, were 75·24 per cent. As compared to the position in the year 1968, there was rise in the proportion of disputes due to "bonus" and the "Leave and hours of work" during this year while there was a full in the proportion of disputes due to "other causes" in the year. The table below shows the comparative position in this respect, for the years 1968 and 1969.

Results of work stoppages

For the purposes of these statistics, the results of work stoppages are classified from the view point of employees, i.e. to what extent the employees succeeded in achieving the purposes for which the agitation was launched by them.

In 279 or nearly 46.81 per cent of the 596 disputes, which terminated during the year under review representing 37.21 per cent of the total workers affected, the workers were entirely unsuccessful. Further in 219 or 36.75 per cent of the disputes that terminated during the same year, affecting about 46.11 per cent. of the total workers the workers were either partially or fully successful. In 92 or 15.43 per cent of the total disputes that terminated during the year under review the result was indefinite, i.e. work was resumed pending final settlement of the dispute. In six cases the result was 'inconclusive' as the Managements of those concern as closed down their respective concerns permanently.

As compared to the previous year, the proportion of disputes which were either successful or partially successful recorded a rise of 4.31 per cent while full of 3.52 per cent in the proportion of unsuccessful disputes during the year under report. In the proportion of disputes which were indefinite in result, there was nominal full from 16.23 per cent in 1968 to 16.43 pr cent in the year 1969. The following table classified the disputes according to results:—

During the year under review the workers were reported to be completely successful in 64 disputes in which "pay and allowances" was the principal issue and in 55 disputes in which "grievances about personnel" was the main issue.

Workers involved

Analysing the disputes according to the number of workers involved, the 10-100 workers group accounted for 56 49 per cent of the total disputes. However the time loss caused by those disputes was only 12·19 per cent of total time lost. Further 8 disputes involving over 3,000 workers, accounted for nearly 27·77 per cent of the total time lost. It will be seen from the following table that in the year 1969 the highest number of man-days lost was recorded in the workers group of 3001-4000 workers involved.

Working days lost

The year under review recorded 12,08,484 man-days lost, as against 16,14,744 man-days lost during the previous year. The 1-100 slab of time loss recorded 186 disputes, involving 6.26 per cent of the total workers, while 41 disputes with a loss of more than 5,000 man-days, involved 33.11 per cent of the total worker involved and accounted for 69.24 per cent of the total time-loss, as will be seen from the following table.

Duration of disputes

During the year 1969 the number of industrial disputes, classified by duration is given in the table XII below. It may be clarified here that "duration" in these cases represents potential working days lost during the period of an industrial disputes. It does not include weekly-offs and schedule holidays. It will be seen from the following table that 402 or 65·27 per cent of the total disputes did not last for more than 5 days. Even amongst them, there was heavy concentration, in the class of disputes lasting for a day or less. It will be seen that nearly 33 per cent of the total disputes, involving 34·84 per cent of the total workers lasted for a period of day or less. However, 214 disputes or 34·73 per cent of the total disputes, which lasted for more than 5 days accounted for 84·38 per cent of the total time loss. The average duration of disputes obtained by dividing the total number of man-days lost by the total number of workers involved decreased from 7·93 in the year 1968 to 6·62 in the year 1969.

And whereas, from time to time, the then Government of Bombay and thereafter the Government of Maharashtra, made declarations as aforesaid in relation to the said relief undertaking with a view to extending the period for which the said relief undertaking shall be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief;

And whereas, by Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department, No. BRU. 1068/105664-Lab-I, dated the 26th February 1970, the Government of Maharashtra last made a declaration as aforesaid in relation to the said relief undertaking with a view to extending upto the 27th February 1971 the period for which the said relief undertaking shall be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief, and directed under section 4 of the said Act that in relation to the said relief undertaking and in respect of the period for which the said relief undertaking continues as such, the provisions of the sub-section(1) of section 42 clauses (ai), (i), (ii), and (iii) of sub-section (2) of section 46 and section 98 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 (Bom. 187—Index remained stationary

In January 1971, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Sholapur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 187 being the same as that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Sholapur City.

The index number for the food group decreased by 2 points to 199 due mainly to a fall in the average prices of rice, arhardal, gramdal, masurdal, ghee, gur turmeric, tamarind, onions, coconut, and a fall in the index number for the vegetables and fruits sub-group.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased by 20 points to 189 due to a rise in the average prices of pan, leaf, pan finished and supari.

The Six Monthly House-Rent Survey was conducted by the Director, Labour Bureau, Simla during the period ending December 1970. Accordingly the index number for housing increased by 1 point to 133.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 10 points to 180 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti, long-cloth, shirting, markin and trousers cloth.

The index numbers for the fuel and light and the miscellaneous groups remained steady at 171, 160 respectively.

The index number for the food group decreased by 6 points to 208 due mainly to a fall in the average prices of wheat, arhardal, goatmeat, ghee, chillies dry, onions, gur and a fall in the index number for the vegetable and fruits sub-group.

The Six Monthly House-Rent Survey was conducted by the Director, Labour Bureau, Simla during the period ending December 1970. Accordingly the index number for housing increased by 1 point to 131.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 2 points to 191 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti, shirting, trousers cloth, long cloth and markin.

The index number for the pan-supari, tobacco etc., the fuel and light and the niscellaneous groups remained steady at 173, 164 and 146 respectively.

In January 1971, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the Aurangabad Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 189 being 2 points lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Aurangabad Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 6 points to 202, due to the decrease in the average prices of wheat, jowar, turdal, gramdal, turmeric tamarind, mixed spices bojwar, jira, potatoes, onions, brinjals, tomato and banana and a fall in the sub-group of other vegetables.

The index number for the fuel and light group decreased by 1 point to 162 due to the decrease in the average prices of firewood and chips (mixture and babhool).

The index number for housing increased by 5 points to 176 as a result of the Six Monthly house-rent Survey conducted by this office at Aurangabad during January 1971.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 10 points to 180 due to an increase in the prices of dhoti, saree, cloth for trouser and long cloth.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 2 points to 159 due to an increase in the average prices of pan leaf, supari, hair oil and cinema

NANDED*

197—A rise of 2 points

In January 1971, the Consumer Price Index Number for working Class for the Nanded Centre with base year January to December 1961, equal to 100 was 197 being 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Nanded Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 1 point to 211 due to an increase in the average prices of rice, groundnut oil, salt, chillies-dry, tamarind, banana (small) and tea-leaf (Brooke-Bond) and a rise in the sub-group of mutton, fish and eggs.

The index number for the fuel and the light group remained stationary at 189. The Six Monthly House-Rent Survey ending December 1970 was conducted by this office, in the month of January 1971, at the Nanded Centre. The index number for housing however, remained the same at 136 as that in the previous months.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 4 points to 181 due to an increase in the prices of dhoti, saree, cloth for trousers, long-cloth and coloured fabrics.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 2 points to 173 due to an increase in the average price of pan finished.

189-A rise of 1 point

In January 1971, Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Jalgaon City with base calendar year 1961 equal to 100 was 189 being 1 point higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the consumption of a pattern revealed during the year 1958-59 family living survey for Jalgaon City.

The index number for the food group decreased by 1 point to 206 due to a fall in the average prices of turdal, gramdal, fresh fish, milk, ghee, turmeric, dry chillies, jira, potatoes, onions, other vegetables, sugar and gur.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained unchanged at 177. The Six Monthly House Rent Survey ending December 1970 was conducted by this office, in the month of January 1971 at the Jalgaon Centre. The index number for housing however, remained the same at 136 as that in the previous months.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 13 points to 170 due to a rise in the prices of dhoti, saree, cloth for trousers, long cloth and coloured poplin.

The index numbers for the miscellaneous group increased by 1 point to 161 due to a rise in the average prices of supari, katha, jarda and cinema charges.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained stationary at 164

The index number for housing increased by 3 points to 119, as a result of the six monthly house rent survey conducted during January 1971.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 6 points to 171 due to a rise in the prices of dhoti, cloth for trouser, long cloth and coloured poplin.

The index number for the miscellaneous group remained unchanged at 155

The Madras Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the month of January 1971, with base 1960 equal to 100 was 173 being one point ower than that in the preceding month. The number of Strike and wage earners affected due to strikes activity in Maharashtra State during the month of November 1970 have declined as compared to the previous month.

The figures for the month under review show 72 disputes in progress involving 20,275 workers and a time loss of 2,38,462 mandays as compared to 99 disputes in October 1970 with 1,45,170 workers affected and a time loss of 5,29,118 mandays.

Ten of the total disputes in progress during November 1970 were in the Textile Industry, 26 in the Engineering Industry and the remaining 36 were in other industries.

Forty-five of the total disputes involving 10,638 workers were actually recorded during the month while 27 disputes involving 9,637 workers were carried over from the previous month.

PROGRESS OF IMPORTANT INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES IN MAHARASHTRA STATE DURING THE MONTH OF **NOVEMBER 1970**

Bombay

The Bombay Gas Company Ltd.—The total complement of 1,620 workers employed in the Bombay Gas Company Ltd., Bombay resorted to strike from November 11, 1970 demanding increase in basic Wages. On account of intervention of Minister for Labour, Maharashtra State intervened in the dispute and an agreement was reached between the Management and the Bombay Gas Company employees Union. The strike came to an end on November 19, 1970. Due to this strike 12,150 mandays were lost.

Carona Sahu Co. Ltd.—The Management of Carona Sahu Co., Bombay, locked out their concern with effect from October 10, 1970, as some of the workers resorted to rioting causing damage to lives and property of the company. The lockout was in progress till November 1970.

National Machinery Mfg. Ltd.—The lockout affecting 3901 workers declared by the Management of National Machinery Mfg. Ltd., Kalwa, Thana, from October 10, 1970 due to go slow tactics adopted by the workers continued throughout the month without change.

EMPLOYMENT SITUATION IN MAHARASHTRA STATE FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY 1971

Job opportunities available to Employment Exchanges and the number of ob seekers placed by them in January 1971 registered a fall.

1507 applicants were placed in employment by Employment Exchanges in enuary 1971 as against 4339 in December 1970. Total vacancies notified to employment Exchanges during the month declined to 7557 from 7986 in the ast month.

A steep fall in placements is observed in the Private Sector. 616 applicants were placed in private establishments as against 1378. There was also a slight fall in placements effected in State Government and Quasi Government estadishments. Placements in State Government establishments numbered 1410 against 1462 whereas placements in Quasi Government establishment for stood 569 as compared to 625. The steep fall in placements is attributed to the obsence of bulk demands to some of the Exchanges as in the previous month.

An analysis of vacancies notified showed a rise in Central and Ouasi Government Sectors and a fall in State Government and Private Sectors.

2069 vacancies were notified by Central Government establishments as painst 1261, 2024 by State Government establishments as against 2397, 1261 Ouasi-Government establishments as against 997 and 2203 by private mployers as against to 3331 in the last month.

Registrations effected during the month declined to 38884 from 40036. There were 343075 applicants on the Live Registers of Employment Exchange at the end of January, 1971.

Individual Programmes at Employment Exchanges.

During the month of January 1971 in all 1873 applicants received Individual information of these 926 were applicants, 660 were students, 287 were parents/guardians.

In all 60 postal inquiries in Occupational Information were received during the month.

Out of the applicants who received individual guidance 605 were fresh candidates and 7 were review cases.

8267 applicants were given guidance at the time of registration.

Group Programme at Employment Exchanges.

486 group discussions were conducted during the month of January 1971.

3844 applicants attended these group discussions.

Programme outside the Exchanges.

TEXTILE EMPLOYMENT (DECASUALISATION) SCHEME FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY 1971.

During the month of January 1971 the Decasualisation Scheme enroll 2,975 workers, Demands, for 2,369 workers were received from the Cotto Textile Mills. 3,410 workers were submitted to the mills against these demands Placements of 1,358 workers were obtained from the mills against the submissions.

Appreciation of Statistics Rendered

- (1) Registration.—2,369 workers were registered under the scheme in Januari 1971 as against 2,922 in December 1970.
- (2) Demands notified.—2,369 vacancies were reported to the scheme office by the mills as against 2,069 in December 1970.

Cases Under Labour Laws

BEFORE SHRI B. A. EKBOTE, ADDITIONAL AUTHORITY THE PAYMENT OF WAGES ACT, BOMBAY

APPLICATION Nos. 2225 of 1968 AND 4337 OF 1969

Stantaram Devu Parab & others versus Messrs. Gansons Pvt. Ltd., Bombas

of Wages Act, 1936 Claim for wages for Sundays/Weskly off days—Under Orders, weekly holidays are paid holidays—Daily rated workers, paid monthly whether contribed to paid weekly holidays—Interpretation of certified Standing Orders in an incidental question to be dealt with by the Authority under the Payment of Wages Act. Claim dism seed for want of jurisdiction.

These are two applications Nos. 2225 of 1968 (Restd. No. 26 of 1969) and 337 of 1969 in which the applicants claim their wages for the period from 27th Merch 1967 to 30th June 1969. First application is filed on 3rd July 1968 and the claim for wages for the months of March to May 1967 is held time. Samilarly, the second application is filed on 10th December 1969 for the claim of wages for the period from 1st July 1968 to 30th June 1969 and the claim for the months of July to November 1968 is held time-barred. The case of the applicants is that they are employed in the Opposite Party Factory and that according to the certified Standing Order to the employer should have paid the applicants full gross wages for all the Sundays or the weekly days. Under the said Standing Order 10(a) weekly holidays are paid holidays. That the Standing Orders came into force from 27th March 1967. The Opposite Party has refused to pay for Sunday weekly offs. Hence the claim. In the first application there are in all 167 applicants and in the second there are only 119 applicants. The total amount claimed in the first application is Rs. 78,639-84 P. and in the Second application Rs. 48,843-72 P.

- (2) Opposite Party admits the employment of the applicants but denies the claims of the applicants in toto, contending inter alia that the claims are misconceived and incorrect and that the contention of the applicants that under the Standing Order, weekly holidays are paid holidays is untrue and that the applicant had not demanded or requested at any time upto the filing of these applications for payment of any such weekly off wages nor the Opposite refused to pay the same. Opposite Party objects to the legality and/or justifiability of the applications and states that the interpretation placed on the said Standing Order by the applicants is utterly misconceived and the applications are vexatious and malafide.
- (3) Applicants had first examined one Laxman Mahadeo Parab, who could not be made available for cross-examination by the Opposite Party and so he was given up and another applicant Rampad Lotan Vishwakarma has been

examined subsequently. There is no dispute on the points that the applicants are daily rated workers, paid monthly, and that the certified Standing Orders are applicable to the Opposite Party factory. Rampad says that he gets daily wages paid at the end of the month for working 26 days. He is not getting wages in lieu of weekly offs and that they have claimed weekly off wages on the basis of certified Standing Orders. In his cross-examiantion he says that they are paid for the days they work in a month. Standing Orders were passed on 25th March 1967. The witness further says that they had raised a demand for weekly off wages and that they claimed weekly off wages under the Standing Orders several times. First the claim was made orally and then a letter was delivered to Opposite Party Company. Applicant's witness has given inconsistent and self-contradictory statement on this point. First he says that he himself delivered the letter to the Opposite Party Company on 10th July 1968. Then he states that it was in the month of June 1968. No copy of the said letter is retained and no acknowledgement receipt was obtained from the Opposite Party Company. The witness goes a step further and says that they did not think it necessary to keep any record thereof as a matter of proof. The evidence of the witness does not prove that any demand or request was made to the Opposite Party Company at any time for payment of weekly off wages under the certified Standing Orders. The evidence of Rampad is common in respect of all the applicants. No evidence was led on behalf of Opposite Party.

- (4) Both the parties rely on the Standing Order 10. It is the basis for the claims of applicants on the one side and on the other it is contended on behalf of the Opposite Party Company that the said Standing Order does not allow paid weekly off wages as claimed by the applicants. The certified Standing Orders are brought on record. They are applicable to daily rated workers employed in the establishment. Under the provisions of the Factories Act and before the certified Standing Orders came into force, the applicants were not entitled to any weekly off wages. The claim of the applicants for wages in lieu of weekly offs is based on the Standing Order applicable to the Company. Before discussing Standing Orer 10, I may refer to Standing Order 6 which reads as follows:—
- 6 (1) Notices specifying (1) the weekly holiday, (ii) the dates on which compensatory holidays, if any, will be allowed and (iii) the days on which wages are to be paid, shall be displayed on the notice boards maintained for the purpose at the time-keeper's office or at or near the main entrance of the establishment.
- 6 (2) Any workman required to work on a weekly holiday in accordance with law, shall be notified to that effect in advance. The workman deprived of any of the holidays notified under clause (1) as a result of his working on such holidays shall be allowed, as soon as circumstances permit and at the discretion of the Manager, compensatory holidays equal in number to the holidays so lost."

From this Standing Order 6 read as a whole it is clear that weekly holidays had been allowed to the workman as a day for rest as is done under the Factories Act and if any workman is required to work on weekly holidays in accordance with law, he shall be allowed compensatory holidays in equal number of the

holidays lost; but this is at the discretion of the Manager. The Manager his discretion may not allow compensatory holidays when the workman required to work on weekly holidays. The work man is paid for the days he work If a workman is required to work on a holiday and is not given compensator holiday, there is no provision in the Standing Orders for payment of overtime wages for being required to work on weekly holiday. In other words no are payable for weekly holidays. If the workman is not required to work such holidays, and vice versa, if he is required to work on weekly holidays and no compensatory off days are allowed, the workman gets only ordinary dail wages for working on weekly holidays and nothing more, and this is the reason why in Standing Order 10(a) the expression "where admissible" has been used after the words weekly holidays and compensatory holidays, and Standing Order 10 is made subject to the provisions of clause (1) of the Standing Order 1 Both the clauses (a) and (b) of Standing Order 10 are subject to the provision of clause (1) of Standing Order 11. If the object of Standing Order 10 was allow full wages for all the weekly holidays and compensatory holidays th expression "where admissible" would be redundant. The learned advocate the applicants arugued that the words of Standing Order No. 10, viz. "subject to the provisions of clause (1) of the Standing Order 11" relate to clause of the said Stnaindg Order only and not to clause (a). Had it been so, the two clauses would not have been apphabetically and serially entered as (a) and (b) and the clause (b) relating to leave, under the general principal of proximing of clauses, would have proceeded the clause (a) which relates to week off days and compensatory holidays so as to be covered by the expression subject to the provision of clause (a) of Standing Order 11. Clause (1) of Standing Order says that grant of leave to a workman shall depend on the exigencies of the establishment and shall be at the discretion of the Manager. Standing Order 6(2) is almost to the same effect and therefore Standing Order 10 (a) and (b) must be deemed to be subject to the provisions of caluse (1) of the Standing Order 11. When once this interpretation of Standing Order 10 is possible, the applicants are not entitled to wages in lieu of weekly offs as of right.

(5) The parties have interpreted the Standing Order 10 in different ways. The scope of jurisdiction of this Court is very limited. It cannot go into the question of interpretation of Standing Orders. The proper forum for the same is the Labour Court. The claim of the applicant does not fall under section 15 of the Payment of Wages Act. It is not a claim for delayed or deducted wages, Section 13-A of the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1946 prescribes the venue of proceedings for interpretation, etc. of Standing Orders. It lays down that if any question arises as to the application or interpretation of a Standing Order certified under the Act, any employer or workman may refer the question to any one of the Labour Court, to which the question is so referred, shall, after giving the parties opportunities of being heard, decide the question and such decision shall be binding on the parties. The Union, representing the applicants, can also raise an industrial dispute on the point involved. This is explained in 1968 I. LL. J. S. C. 555 at page 565. The Authority appointed

ader the Payment of Wages Act cannot decide dispute questions of foundational cels. Applicants' claim is based on certified Standing Order 10 and Opposite party challenges and disputes this very basis of their claim. The scope of Section 13-A of the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act is explained by the Bombay High Court in 1968 II. LL. J. 193. It lays down that the Labour court has got the jurisdiction to deal with applications under section 13-A of he said Act. The interpretation of certified Standing Order 10 is not an incidental question which can be dealt with by this Court under section 15 of the payment of Wages Act. It is independent of the main question of delayed or soducted wages. The learned labour consultant of Opposite Party has interereted the expression "where admissible" in certified Standing Order 10(1) meaning as " when not prohibited According to the learned advocate of the applicants, clause (a) of Standing Order 10 is not at all subject to the provisions "Standing Order 11 (1). Thus there is foundational dispute regarding the interpretation of Standing Order 10 and in view of the recent Supreme Court authority 1969 I. LL. J. 762 S. C., the jurisdiction of this Court being very limited, it cannot enter into such disputed questions. The long and the short of the above discussion is that the applicants' claims are not mintainable and this Court has no jurisdiction to bear and entertain the claims. In the result, both the applications fail and must be dismissed.

Order

Applications Nos. 2225 of 1968 (Restd. No. 26 of 1969) and 4337 of 1969 are dismissed. No order as to costs.
